My Lord,

I have the honour to submit the following idea with extreme diffidence as I do not know quite whatbauthority or right I have so to do. But I saw in the last Times received a short item concerning the issue of medals at the end of the war. It dealt with civil and merchant marine rewards,

2. If a civil war medal were to be issued, and were made eligible for civil war work in the Colonies, it seems to me that Governors would be in a very difficult position in making their recommendations.

3. For instance civil war work in the Falkland Islands might be of great value locally and very meritorious, but it could not possibly compare with civil war work in such war-ridden Colonies as Malta or Hong-Kong or others.

4. My suggestion is that if such an issue is ever contemplated this great difficulty could be over-come by each Colony having a special bar with the name of the Colony thereon, and this simplify the Covernor's task of recommendation and make clear generally the relative value of its earning.
