

CIRCULAR

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that the King has decided to institute a medal to commemorate His Majesty's Coronation on the 12th of May. Details of the medal have not yet been decided, but it is probable that it will be of silver and will be worn on a ribbon in the same way as a military medal. A document to accompany the medal, similar to the one distributed to recipients of the King George V Silver Jubilee Medal, will also be issued.

2. It is recognized that there cannot be an exactly uniform distribution, and it has been decided that it will be best to make a definite allocation of medals to each Colonial Dependency, and to leave the Governor to settle the actual selection of individual recipients in the light of general principles which I will proceed to indicate. The number of medals thus placed at your disposal will be *eleven.*

3. In the case of the Colonial Empire it has been decided that the main criterion for the award of the medal shall be the holding of certain positions - official and unofficial - at the date of the Coronation, and not, as

was the rule in the case of some other commemorative medals, presence at, or participation in, a particular ceremony. Medals will, however, be awarded, from a special allotment, to persons who attend the Coronation ceremony as representatives of the Colonial Dependencies and to the wife of each such person, if accompanying him on that occasion, and to the members of the Colonial military contingent in the Coronation procession. The medals placed at your disposal should therefore be awarded to persons in the Service of the Colonial Government, and to other persons, such as members of the Legislature and Native Rulers or Chiefs, who are regarded as eligible for the award by virtue of being participants, at the date of the Coronation, in the work of government.

4. It may assist Colonial Governors in deciding on the distribution to members of the Civil Service if I indicate in outline the approved scheme for the distribution in this country. Under that scheme the medal will be awarded to every member of the administrative staff in this country of or above a certain grade, and to all professional, scientific and technical staff holding posts of comparable status. In addition, a number of medals will be allotted to each Government Department in respect of the remainder of its employees, and this allocation will be based on a small percentage of the staff in each grade; the percentage will vary with the grade, being three per cent. in the case of administrative, professional and executive staff below the rank to all members of which an award will be made, and a half of one per cent in the case of clerical and subordinate employees. The Colonial equivalent of the civil servant in this country who is to receive the medal by virtue of his rank would be the head of an important Department or, in the Administrative

Service, officers of the status of Provincial Commissioner and above. In the case of other officials, I do not feel able, in view of the diversity of local circumstances, to offer any definite guidance beyond observing that the distribution should be effected in such a way that as far as possible all branches and grades of the public service obtain some share of recognition.

5. A definite allocation, which will also be based on percentages of total establishments, will be made in this country to the fighting services and to police forces, and the medal will be awarded to the principal representatives at the time of local authorities. The same principles, where they are applicable, might be followed in the Colonial Empire, but no medals need be reserved from the quota allotted to Colonial Governors for members of any Imperial Forces stationed in or based on a Colony.

6. As a general rule the medal should not be awarded to an officer who has retired before the date of the Coronation, or to an officer having less than five years' continuous public service on that date.

7. You will, no doubt, settle in the light of the principles which I have indicated the list of persons in the territory under your administration to whom the medal should be awarded. (A Governor will, of course, receive the medal from the allotment made to the territory under his administration unless he is to attend the Coronation, in which case the award will be made from the special allotment mentioned in paragraph 3 of this despatch.)

8. It is hoped that the medal may have been prepared and that supplies may be available for despatch from the United Kingdom on or about the day of the Coronation. Issues to individuals outside the United Kingdom will be made some time after the Coronation. This has been the

usual custom in connection with past Coronations and is obviously the practical method if an emblem worthy of the occasion is to be presented. Each Colonial Dependency should therefore arrange its own time for internal distribution which should, where practicable, be made on one day. The medals, which will be sent direct to you from the Royal Mint, will not bear the names of recipients, but recipients may have their names engraved on them at their own expense.

9. Three types of medal will be issued:-

- (a) civil pattern for men, fitted with a ribbon and a brooch for the attachment of the medal;
- (b) military pattern for men, intended for uniformed personnel, to be issued not with a brooch but with a loose length of some inches of ribbon; and
- (c) ladies' pattern, to be issued with a bow.

When ladies have already received medals worn on a bar it will be permissible for them at their own option to wear the Coronation Medal on the medal bar.

I shall be obliged if you will let me know as soon as practicable (and in any event not later than the 12th of April) the respective numbers of the medals placed at your disposal which you will require in the military pattern and in the ladies' pattern. If there is any doubt, the number required for ladies should be overestimated rather than underestimated, as it is proposed to send with them alternative ribbons (i.e., both the bow and the ordinary straight ribbon) so that they may be issued either to men or to women. The medals with the loose length of ribbon, i.e. the military pattern, cannot in the absence of a brooch, be so easily adapted, and any requirement of these should therefore be estimated as accurately as possible.

10. It will be convenient if in due course you will transmit to me for record purposes a list of the persons to whom the medal is presented. Details of the procedure to be observed in preparing these lists will be sent to you in an open circular despatch at an early date.

11. The number of medals available for the Colonial Empire will not permit of any substantial increase in the number placed at your disposal, but if you should have any special reason for suggesting a small supplementary allocation, I should wish to be so informed (if necessary by telegraph) not later than the middle of April. Any request for such an increase should, of course, include a full statement of the reasons for which it is made.

12. If any of the medals placed at your disposal are not awarded, they should be returned to me before the end of September next for transmission to the Royal Mint.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that as the nominal rolls, to be rendered by the various Colonial Dependencies, of those to whom the King George VI Coronation Medal is awarded are to be incorporated in one roll for the whole Colonial Empire, it is desired that they may be prepared in a uniform manner.

2. I have accordingly to request that the list of the persons who receive the medals placed at your disposal may be prepared on the forms of which a supply is enclosed. That list should be sent to me in duplicate, and in preparing it the following procedure should be observed:-

(1) Only one name should be entered in each space on the form;

(2) The Governor's name should appear first: other names should be in alphabetical order throughout;

(3) Each entry should be complete in itself. References to other entries on the list (such as "wife of the above") should be avoided;

(4) Any title or description which may be applicable to two or more successive names should be entered against all the names.

The Officer Administering
the Government of

Abbreviated markings signifying repetition (such as "ditto") should not be used;

(5) In the case of members of the Defence Services the rank should be shown in the third column of the form and the unit and any regimental number in the fourth;

(6) In the case of civil officers, the appointment held will be a sufficient entry in the fourth column of the form which should be used, in the case of unofficials, for a brief description of his services for which his medal was awarded.

The last column, headed "Section", is for use in the Colonial Office and should be left blank.

3. I enclose a memorandum setting out various principles to be observed in placing names in alphabetical order. In view of the diversity of native names, it is not possible to lay down rules for their arrangement; it would, however, be of assistance if that part of the name under which the entry should be incorporated alphabetically in the single roll for the Colonial Empire could be indicated by underlining or by entering it in capitals.

KING GEORGE VI CORONATION MEDAL

Principles to be observed in arranging
names in alphabetical order in the

Nominal Rolls

(a) Christian names and initials of Christian names

Full Christian names should be given if possible in every case. If, in any particular instance, initials only are available, full Christian names and initials of Christian names should be treated in the same manner alphabetically. The following example will make this clear:

Jones - A
Jones - A.B.
Jones - Albert
Jones - Albert Harry
Jones - A.M.
Jones - Arthur Frank
Jones - Arthur W.
Jones - A.S.
Jones - A. Thomas
Jones - Aubrey.

(b) Hyphenated surnames

Hyphenated surnames should be shown under the second half of the name, thus -

Thomas Richard Evan-Jones would appear as
Jones, Thomas Richard Evan-

If there are more than two hyphenated parts then the surname should be shown under the last part.

(c) D' d' or De

Names with the prefix D' or d' should appear, not under the vowel which follows, but under the letter D. Names with the prefix De, as a separate word, should be shown not under the first letter of the word which follows, but under De. For example -

D'Amrie
Deacon
De Boyse
D'Egan
Degville
De Lonsell
De Merry
d'Osbert

(d) La or Le

Names with the prefix La or Le shown as a separate word should appear, not under the first letter of the word which follows, but under the letters La and Le respectively. For example -

La Feveroux
Laming
La Neothe
Lazarus
Leath
Le Bois

(e) M'-. Mac, or Mc-

Names with the prefix M'-, MAC-, Mac-, or Mc-, whether this is followed by a capital or a small letter, should always be treated as though the first three letters were Mac-. For example -

McArthur Charles
MacBride Charles
Macleod Charles
McPherson Charles
Macpherson Harry
MacPherson John
M'Pherson Philip
McPherson Thomas

(f) St.

Names with the prefix St. should be placed not under Sa, or under the first letter of the word which follows, but under St.-. For example -

Squires

Street
St. Symon

(g) Van, van, Von and von

Names with the prefix Van, van, Von or von shown as a separate word should be placed, not under the first letter of the word which follows, but under Van - and Von - respectively. For example -

Van Brandt
Vanderstein
Van Kerrin
van Mulche
Von Prad
Vonschell.

Sir,

With reference to previous correspondence regarding the institution of a Medal to commemorate the Coronation of Their Majesties King George the Sixth and Queen Elizabeth, I have the honour to inform you that this Medal has been classified as an official Medal to be worn on all occasions on which Decorations and Medals are worn.

2. The Medal will be worn on the left breast after War Medals and all Jubilee, Coronation and Durbar Medals, in order of precedence. Ladies will wear the Medal on the left shoulder of the dress, the ribbon in this case being in the form of a bow, but ladies who are already in possession of official Medals worn on a bar may, if they wish, add the Coronation Medal to the bar instead of wearing it separately on a bow.
