**CENSUS, 1901.**

**INSTRUCTIONS to ENUMERATORS.**

1.—In the course of the week ending 30th March, but not later than 12 hours before the Census night, it is the Enumerator's duty to deliver to every occupier of a house or tenement in Stanley or its vicinity, one or more Householder's Schedules. If the house is inhabited by more than one occupier, he must leave a separate Schedule with each occupier. When the family of any single occupier (including relations, visitors and dependants) shall exceed 15 in number, two Schedules must be left. The Enumerator shall keep an account in writing of all those houses where he may have left Schedules with one or more occupiers, stating the number he left at each house.

2.—The Enumerator in Stanley will similarly deliver Schedules to the Master of any ship in harbour on the 31st of March.

3.—Managers of Stations will proceed in the manner indicated in Instructions 1 and 2, except that they may deliver the Schedules at any time between the date they receive them from the Supervisor of Census and the 31st of March.

4.—The Enumerator in Stanley and the Managers of Stations must explain to the persons receiving Schedules the nature and importance of the document, and the obligations imposed upon the occupier to give a complete and accurate statement of the several particulars required. The Enumerator must represent to the masters or resident owner of all hotels, inns, public houses, lodging houses, and the like, that they are required to give the prescribed information respecting every person who sleeps or remains in their houses on the night of the 31st March. Similar intimation should be given to the Master of ships to whom Schedules have been delivered. The Enumerator in Stanley and Managers of Stations should also intimate that the Schedules are on no account to be lost or destroyed. The Enumerator in Stanley will give notice that he will call for the Schedules on the 1st of April. Managers of Stations must intimate whether the Schedule will be called for, or is to be sent to them, by the householder within 15 days of the Census night.

5.—The Enumerator in Stanley, and Managers of Stations will read the Schedules collected to see if all particulars are correctly entered according to the instructions. To satisfy themselves upon this point they should ask all necessary questions, and if misstatements are discovered, a line should be drawn through the erroneous words, without erasing them, the correct words being entered in their place.

6.—Having satisfied themselves that the Schedule is properly filled up, the Enumerator in Stanley, and Managers of Stations must endorse upon the back of it the Settlement, Island, or place in which the house is situated, the name or number (if any) of the house, and the number of rooms in it. They must then insert the number of the Schedule in the space left for that purpose, numbering them from 1 upwards in the order of receipt.

7.—If the Schedule is found not to be filled up, the Enumerator or Manager must fill it in himself, asking all necessary instructions. Having completed his entries on a Schedule he should read it over to the person in charge of the house or apartment, and get the informant to sign it at the foot with his name or mark, witnessing himself the signature or mark.

8.—The Enumerator or Manager must take an account of all houses building and uninhabited, and of all other uninhabited houses on 31st of March.

9.—When all the Schedules have been collected the Enumerator or Manager will transmit them under Confidential and Sealed cover to the Colonial Secretary, Stanley, accompanied by a solemn declaration that, to the best of his knowledge and belief, the Schedules sent in by him represent every occupier of every house and ship, and that he does not know of any person on his station whose name is not entered in one of the schedules sent in by him.

10.—The Enumerator in Stanley, and the Managers of Stations, will also obtain by such means as they consider best adapted for the purpose, returns of any houseless persons and of any persons who, during the Census night, were travelling or on the sea, or who for any cause were not abiding in any house on the Census night. Such returns will contain, as far as possible, all the particulars contained in the Householder's Schedule, and will be transmitted to the Colonial Secretary in manner laid down in Instruction 9.

SIR,

In continuation of my Despatch No. 71 of the 17th of August, I have now the honour to submit the detailed results of the Census taken on the 31st of March last and the Colonial Secretary's very interesting Report thereon.

2. The present Report is much more exhaustive than on any previous occasion, and the great increase of detail in the information now summarized will afford a wider scope for instituting interesting comparisons with the results of future Censuses than is possible retrospectively.

3. The decades available for comparison are 1881 to 1891, and the one just ended. In the former the rural population increased 15 per cent., while in the latter the increase was under one-half per cent. In the former the urban population increased 36 per cent., and in the latter 24 per cent.

4. These figures, though hardly satisfactory as applied to a Colony about the size of Wales, are not surprising when it is borne in mind that the whole Colony is in the hands of less than thirty farmers, who permit none but able-bodied men and their families to live in the rural districts.

5. As our present printing facilities will not admit of our issuing this Report locally, I venture to invite you to sanction its publication as a Colonial Office Paper.

THE NEW YORK PUBLIC LIBRARY

The following is a list of the books in the collection of the New York Public Library, Astor Lenox Tilden Foundation, which have been purchased by the Library since the year 1900.

The books are arranged in alphabetical order of the author's name, and are classified according to the subject matter of the books.

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## FALKLAND ISLANDS.

### REPORT ON CENSUS, 1901.

1. The total population of the Islands was found by the Census of 31st March, 1901, to be 1,203 males and 840 females—total, 2,043. Table 1 compares this with the results of the Census of 1881 and 1891. The total does not include 147 officers and men of H.M.S. *Nymphe*, then temporarily stationed here, nor 42 Italian and 21 Austrian labourers imported from Argentina under contract for work on the Naval Coaling Depôt, as they do not form part of the regular population of the Colony.

2. The increase in ten years was 254 (of which the Town of Stanley alone accounts for 222), or 14·2 per cent. In the previous ten years (1881-1891) the population increased by 236 (of which 186 were in Stanley), or 11·5 per cent. In twenty years the population of Stanley Town has increased over 80 per cent.

3. The number of houses in Stanley was 168, as against 155 in 1891, an increase of only 8·4 per cent., or an average of between five and six souls per house. Table 2 shows how the people were distributed according to size of house and household.

4. Table 3 gives the relative ages of the population. The following Table shows the percentage under certain age-groups as compared with 1891 :—

showing generally that the female population has increased in 20 years in comparison with the male to the extent of 10.8 per cent.

6. The Civil Condition of the people is set forth in Table 4.  
There were 30 more husbands than wives.

7. In 1891, 27·5 of the population were married ; in 1901 the percentage was 30·2. In the case of males, the percentages were respectively 23·6 and 26·8, and, in the case of females, 33·3 and 35·1, showing that the marriage rate is increasing.

Out of 689 males over 20, 344 were married or had been, and out of 391 females over 20, 325 were married or had been, or 50 per cent. in the case of men, and 83 per cent. in the case of women. The latter figures speak for themselves.

8. Occupations are classified in Table 5. The male population of the town of Stanley consists mainly of Carpenters, Storekeepers, Mechanics, Mariners, Labourers, Shipwrights and Scholars, and in the Country Districts, of Sheep Farmers, Managers, Shepherds and Farm Hands generally, and Scholars.

A large return is made under the head of "Unemployed—Female Adults." This includes the wives of all classes not returned as having any special occupation.

The number of Scholars is returned at 231 for Stanley, and 145 for the rest of the Islands, the number of children between 5 and 15, not employed nor at school, at 56, and the number of children under 5—in most cases not at school—at 299. As education is now compulsory, it is not possible to compare these figures with those of previous censuses.

9. Birthplaces are classified in Table 6, which shows that, of the total population of 2,043, 1,202 are British subjects born in the Falkland Islands, and 638 British subjects born in the United Kingdom. In addition there were 9 naturalized British subjects, and 99 foreigners. The figures call for no other remark.

10. The Religious Census was a purely voluntary one, and Table 7 shows that the result is of no value, nearly half of the population having elected to make no return.
