## Introduction

This Report on patterns disclosed by the Census held on 24 April 1996, comprises three main sections, which have been printed on different coloured paper. It is hoped that this format will enable readers of the Report more readily to identify and refer to the various statistical materials annexed to the Report.

*Introductory*

1. Section 5 of the Census Ordinance 1990 reads—

5. The Attorney General shall, as soon as may be after the taking of a Census prepare reports on the census patterns and every such report shall be printed and laid before the Legislative Council

2. This duty is not one which would ordinarily fall upon an Attorney General and is explained by the fact that the Census is organised and conducted under the supervision of the Registrar General and her staff, who fall within a Department of which the Attorney General is the Head. It would be churlish for me at this stage not to acknowledge the work, in addition to more day to day tasks, undertaken by Mrs. Greenland, the Registrar General, and her staff, and the work done on my behalf by Mr. Titterington, Senior Crown Counsel, who was Acting Attorney General on 24 April, Census Day. I was one of the 140 persons usually resident in the Falkland Islands who were absent from the Falkland Islands on that day and who therefore only figure in the 1996 Census Statistics in a footnote to Table 1.

3. My special thanks go to Nikki Buxton of Synergy Information Systems Limited who has prepared the Census Statistics on the basis of the data collected in the Census Forms members of the public completed. The Report has annexed to it the 1996 Census Statistics (printed on pink paper) which include pie charts and graphs to illustrate the various Tables. I believe that these will help the ordinary reader. On this occasion, for the first time the Report also has annexed to it a separate section (printed on blue paper), in which the results of the 1986, 1991 and 1996 Census figures are set out side by side in the various Tables it contains, so that they can readily be compared. People will be able to draw some conclusions for themselves from these, although comparative data is of course only available where the same questions were asked. I am required to report on the patterns disclosed, and of course I must in doing so draw attention to the results of the earlier censuses. The 1986 - 1996 Comparative Census Statistics make my task far easier. These comparative statistics are important because the 1996 figures it uses for comparison purposes are net of the population at Mount Pleasant, included (for the first time) in the 1996 Census.

4. Section 5 of the Census Ordinance requires me to come to conclusions. I hope that these will be regarded as tenable and not generated purely by idiosyncrasy, even though the conclusions may not always be what the reader would have wished I could come to.

5. Finally I would express my gratitude to residents of these Islands who took the time to complete and return the Census Form. The data which has been obtained from the Forms will provide a useful base from which to measure developments in the Islands if the search for offshore minerals progresses to full exploitation.

*The Scope of the Census: see Table 1 1996 Census Statistics*

6. For the first time, the census figures include civilians resident at Mount Pleasant, other than service people's families. Until that is taken into account, at first sight there appears to have been a large *increase* in population since the 1991 Census. Discounting those at Mount Pleasant included for the first time in the recent Census, the number of persons (other than temporary residents) *present in the Falkland Islands* on 24 April 1996 was 2081. That appears to show a slight decrease (of 10) in the population. However, in 1991 the estimated number of persons temporarily absent on Census Day was 119; in 1996 it was 140. The *adjusted* total population figures in 1991 and 1996 respectively (i.e. discounting civilians at Mount Pleasant and counting back persons temporarily absent) were 2210 and 2221. I conclude that there has been no significant alteration in the total population figures (discounting Mount Pleasant, as to which I can of course make no comparisons ).

*Population changes in Stanley and Camp*

7. The population of Stanley has grown to 1636<sup>1</sup> from 1580 in 1991 and 1232 in 1986. The population of Camp has continued to decline, and in 1996 totalled 445 (511 in 1991 and 653 in 1986). These facts will not be likely to surprise anybody in the Falkland Islands. However, the increase of 404 in Stanley's population in 10 years is not wholly attributable to a drift of people from Camp to Stanley, because the decrease in population in Camp since 1986 is 208. There has been net immigration to Stanley from overseas. 417 of the 1996 population of Stanley were resident overseas in 1986<sup>2</sup> and 208 of that population were resident in Camp 10 years ago.

8. Only 800 of the 1996 population of Stanley were living in Stanley in 1986, 208 of that population were then living elsewhere in the Falklands and 417 of them were then living overseas. This demonstrates a considerable level of population turnover in Stanley<sup>3</sup>, and that the increase in Stanley's population is predominantly due to immigration from overseas<sup>4</sup>. A much higher proportion of the population of Camp

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<sup>1</sup> Throughout the Census Statistics, in respect of persons present within the Falkland Islands on Census Day, they have been counted in respect of the location in the Islands at which they usually live. Thus a person visiting Stanley from West Falkland has been counted as part of the West Falkland population. Persons temporarily overseas and temporary visitors to the Falkland Islands have not been included in any of the Tables.

was living in the Falkland Islands in 1986, but it should be noted from Table 6 at page 4 of the 1996 Statistics (pink sheets) that 43 of the 1996 population in Camp were living overseas, and 45 of that population were living in Stanley, in 1986.

9. Analysis of the Statistics therefore shows that the picture is much more complex than a simple increase in the population of Stanley caused by a drift from Camp. The changes are due to the net effect of movements between Stanley and Camp, immigration from overseas and emigration. Those who are disheartened by the movement of people from Camp may be able to take a little encouragement from the fact that 88 people over 10 years of age have moved to Camp since 1986.

10. Without the net immigration mentioned in the preceding paragraphs, the population of the Falkland Islands would have markedly declined since 1986.

### ***MPA***

11. The civilian population at Mount Pleasant, figuring for the first time in the 1996 Census, is necessarily not taken into account in the comparisons made in the preceding paragraphs. That population was 483. 12 of them had been resident for more than 10 years, 56 of them had been resident for between 6 and 10 years and 121 of them had been resident for 3 to 5 years.<sup>5</sup> It is not possible to regard Mount Pleasant as an altogether suitable environment for long term civilian residence and the very marked imbalance of numbers between males and females (353:130) could generate problems.

### ***Educational attainments***

12. Table 7 at page 5 of the 1996 Census Statistics (pink sheets) depicts the information extracted from answers to questions on the Census Forms. There are two points I should make in relation to that Table. The first is that where a person has both GCSE's and A levels he should appear in the figures given for each so that the totals in the Table do not represent numbers of persons having educational attainments within the population, but numbers of educational attainments of the various categories possessed by the population. (That can readily be seen by looking at the totals for males at MPA: the total educational attainments given in Table 7 Part A is 493, but the civilian male population at MPA appearing in Table 2 at page 1 of the Report is 353). The second point is that the number of males having professional qualifications appears in the Table as 139. That figure must, in my view be somewhat suspect, and is probably due to "professional qualification" not being clearly enough defined in the Census Form<sup>6</sup>.

The number in aggregate of males in Stanley having attainments at A level, Higher National Certificate and International Baccalaureate appearing in that Table is 105. Such attainments are usually a pre-condition to admission to a professional education course, and a number of so-called "higher" professions now require entrants to the professional courses to possess a University degree. I suspect that a number of attainments which persons have classified as professional should really be classified as vocational attainments.



13. However, there is still interesting information to be gleaned from Table 7. Remembering (Table 2) that males outnumbered females 855 : 781, females appear to have slightly outperformed males in external examinations taken at school, so the smaller number of advanced qualifications obtained by women must be attributed to the effect of (past) discriminatory effects. But since these figures include large numbers of persons who were not educated in the Falkland Islands, conclusions solely related to Falkland Islands attitudes and factors cannot safely be drawn.

14. Table 8 (page 6 pink sheets) shows that the highest number of tertiary qualifications is reported by the age 25-30 age group. Since a number of the 20-25 age group will still be in the process of tertiary education, the Table perhaps demonstrates the increasing tertiary education opportunities available in recent years.

#### *Natural increase/decrease in population*

15. Table 9 at page 7 of the 1996 Census Statistics (pink sheets) shows the number of births which took place in the Falkland Islands from 1986 to 1986 (up to 24 April). But these cannot sensibly be used, together with Table 10 (deaths) for the purpose of measuring the natural increase or decrease in the population of the Falkland Islands. Some of these births are of babies born in the Falkland Islands to the wives of persons employed on contract in the Falkland Islands, who have since left, or will leave within the course of a year or so. In addition to that, some women who are normally resident in the Falkland Islands, by reason of complications in pregnancy were sent overseas for the delivery of their babies. 69 persons normally resident in the Falkland Islands arrived within 6 months of their birth, but it is not necessarily the case that the mothers of these persons had previously been resident in the Falkland Islands.<sup>7</sup>

16. Table 10 which shows deaths in the Falkland Islands does not include deaths of a number of persons normally resident in the Falkland Islands who died overseas. Reliable natural increase or decrease figures could be calculated by obtaining information from the records of the Medical Department, but that is beyond the proper scope of the Census.

#### *National Origins and citizenship*

17. Table 11 at page 9 of the 1996 Census Statistics (pink sheets) shows that 1267 of the 2607 persons included in it<sup>8</sup> were stated to have been born in the Falkland Islands, 885 to have been born in the United Kingdom and 261 to have been born in Ascension Island or Saint Helena. Table 12 (page 11) shows that 2245 of those 2607 persons were British citizens and 265 of them were British Dependent Territory citizens. A number of persons held dual nationality, but the Census Form asked those persons to state what they regarded as their prime nationality<sup>9</sup>.

### *Employment and business activity*

18. Table 17 at page 15 (pink sheets) shows that there were 19 males between 20 and 64 not in full-time employment, and that over a third of all men between 65 and 69 years of age are in full-time employment. Taking into account that some of the men not in full-time employment are those who chose to rest over the autumn and winter months after being involved in intensive agricultural activities in the late spring and summer, that demonstrates full employment. Reference to Table 16 at page 20 of the Comparative Statistics (blue sheets) shows that the number of women in full-time employment has increased from 436 at the time of the 1991 Census to 515 in 1996, and that very nearly two thirds of all females over 15 years of age are in full time employment. The proportion of women of childbearing age in full-time employment is even higher. That has implications for the birth rate.

19. The Census was undertaken against a background of possible oil-related developments in the Falkland Islands and their waters during the next few years. The data set out in Table 17 (page 15 pink sheets) would appear to indicate that it might be difficult to accommodate any new area of economic activity (such as shore-based servicing of offshore oil-related activities) without immigration, temporary or permanent, in one form or another.

### *Fuel use and heating*

20. The traditionalist will bemoan the dramatic move from the use of peat for household heating and cooking which is demonstrated by Table 19 at page 32 of the Comparative Statistics (blue sheets). While this is more marked in Stanley than in Camp, there has been a significant changeover to other fuels in Camp as well.<sup>10</sup> There has also been a move away from the use of electricity for household heating in Stanley and it is noticeable that 66 households there now use gas for household cooking (none used it in 1986 because gas was not available locally. A number of households used gas for household cooking in 1980, prior to the Conflict). One reason for the move away from peat may be that its use is labour-intensive and that, given the higher disposable income now enjoyed by Falkland Islands residents, they have been able to afford a change to a more expensive, labour-saving fuel.

21. The increased use of central heating demonstrated by Table 20 (page 34 of the Comparative Statistics), in so far as it is not attributable to new accommodation incorporating central heating having been built, may also be attributable to increased incomes, expectations and standards of living.

### *Vehicles*

22. As might have been expected, the Census discloses yet another increase in the number of vehicles available to households in the Islands. Table 22 at page 37 of the

Comparative Statistics (blue sheets) sets out the relevant information. However, the figures do not disclose what is probably a far more dramatic rise in the number of vehicles being used in the Islands. This is the case because virtually all Government owned vehicles are not included in the figures and neither do the figures include private or other vehicles owned or available for use by those individuals living at the military garrison and who have been included in the 1996 Census.

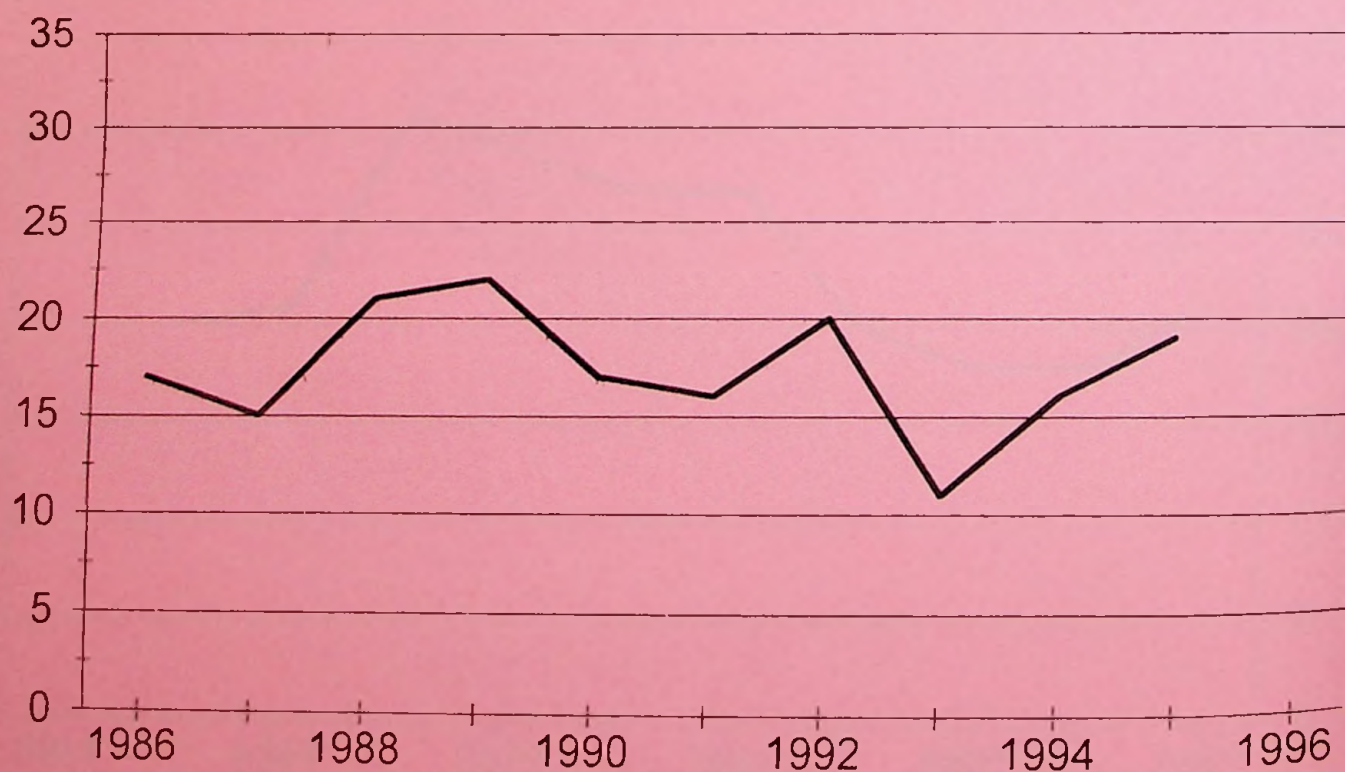

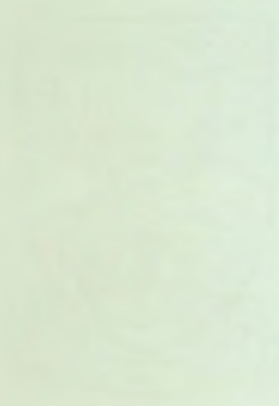

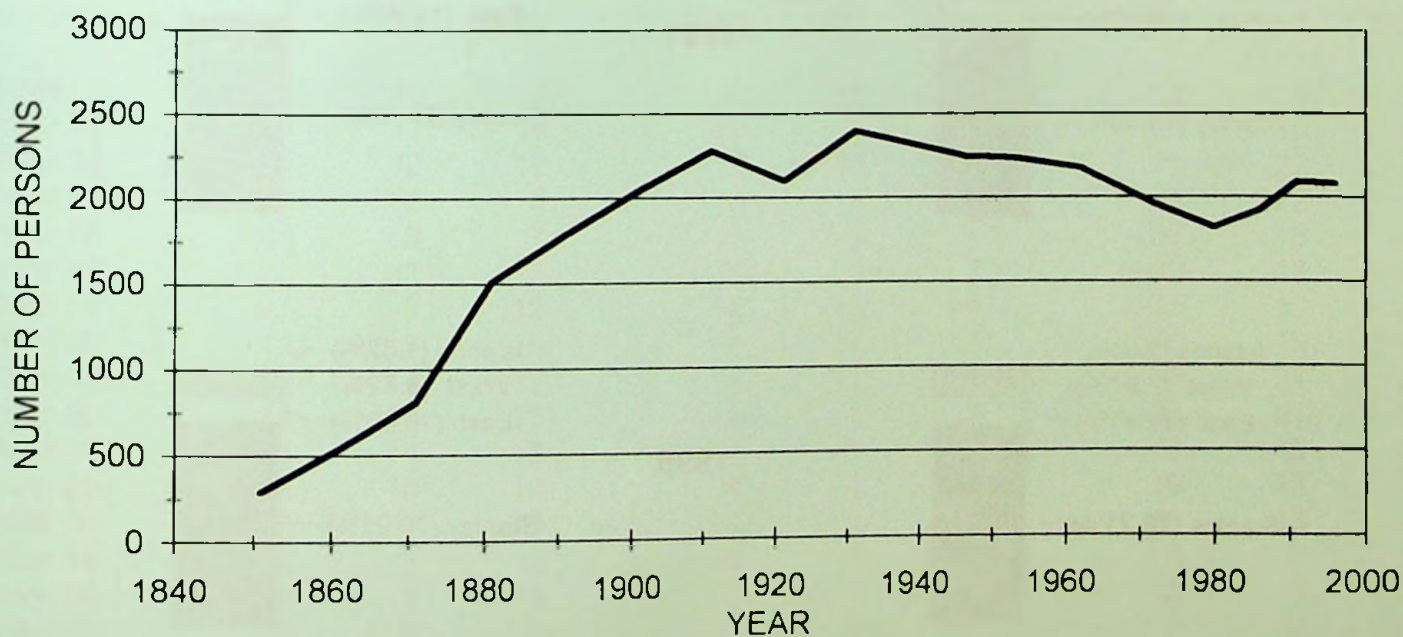


Figure 1. Population as at census, 1851 to 1996.

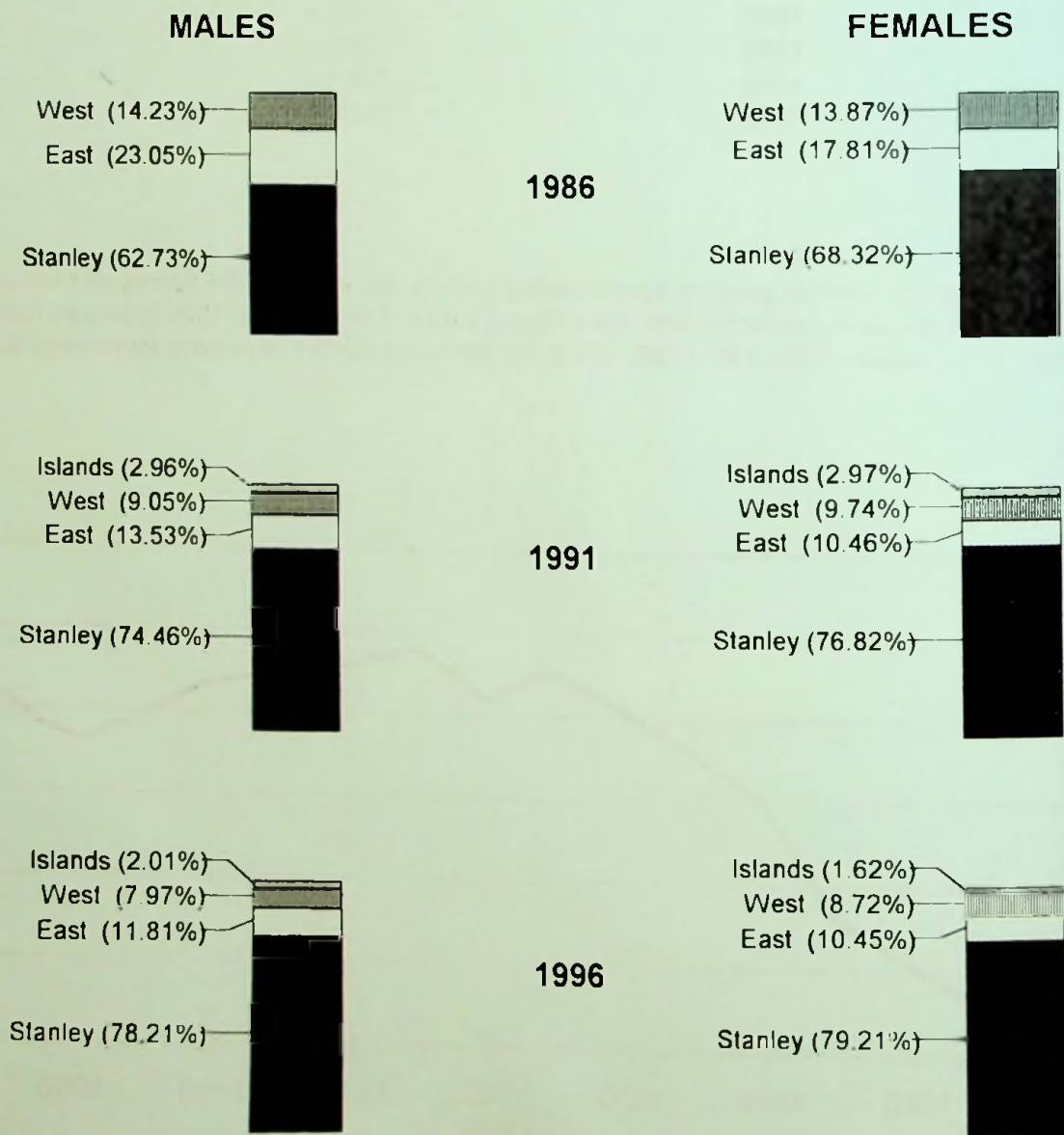


Figure 2. Location of population by sex as at census. East Falkland includes all persons living outside Stanley on the East and Islands includes all persons living on islands other than East and West Falkland.

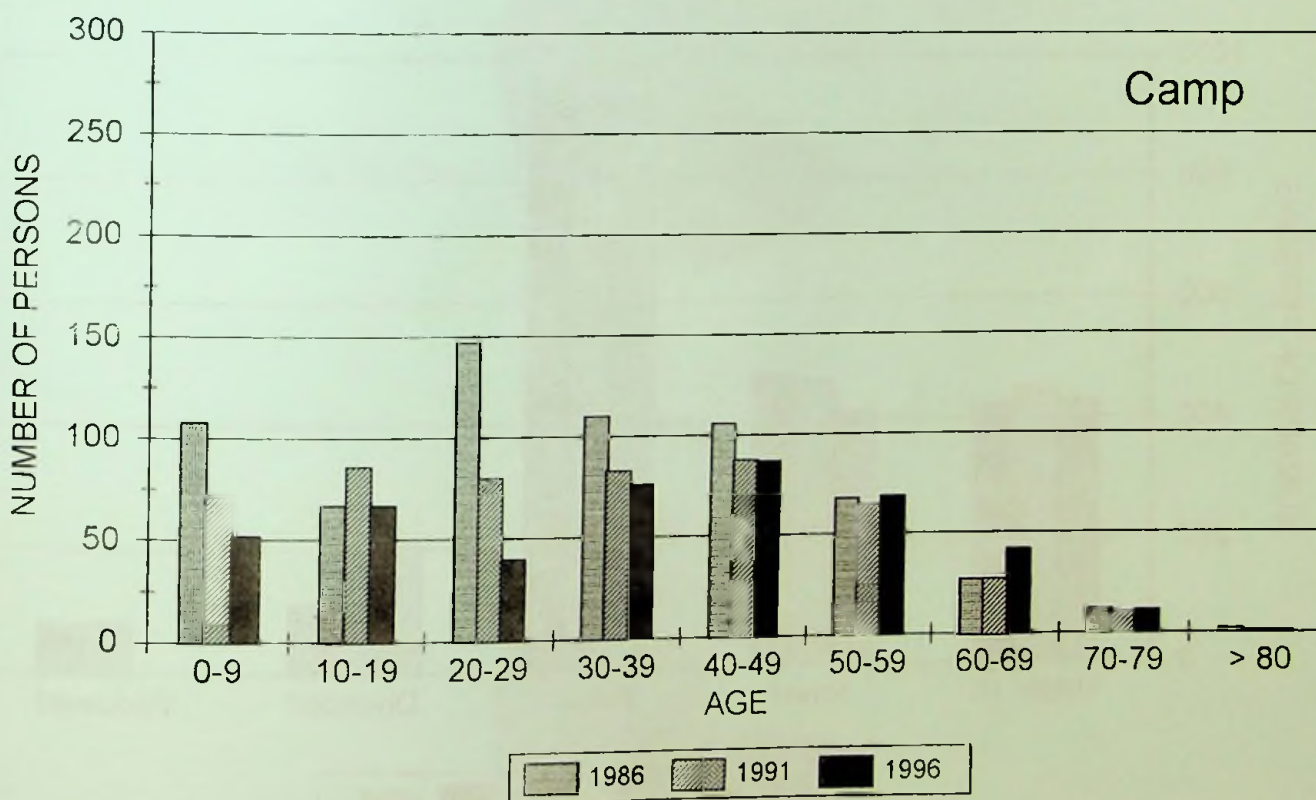
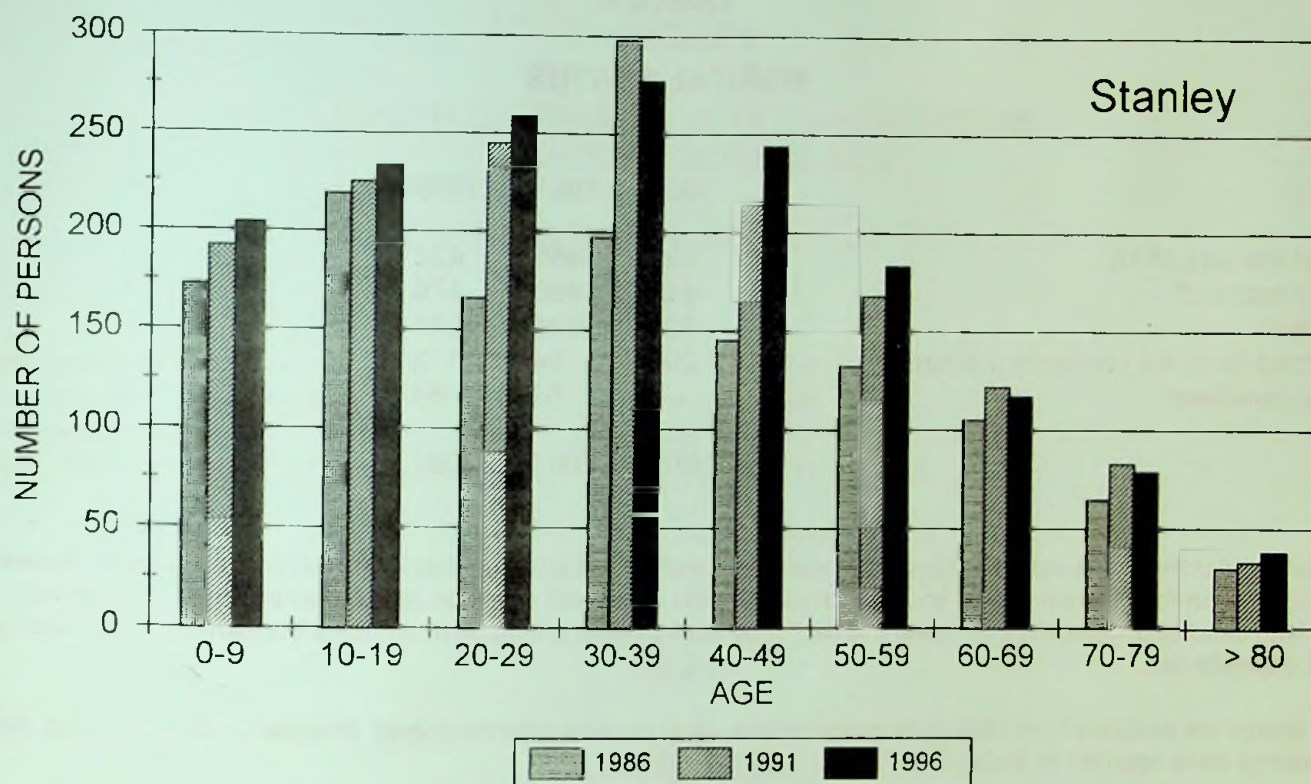


Figure 3. Breakdown of population by location, age and sex for people normally resident in the Falkland Islands.

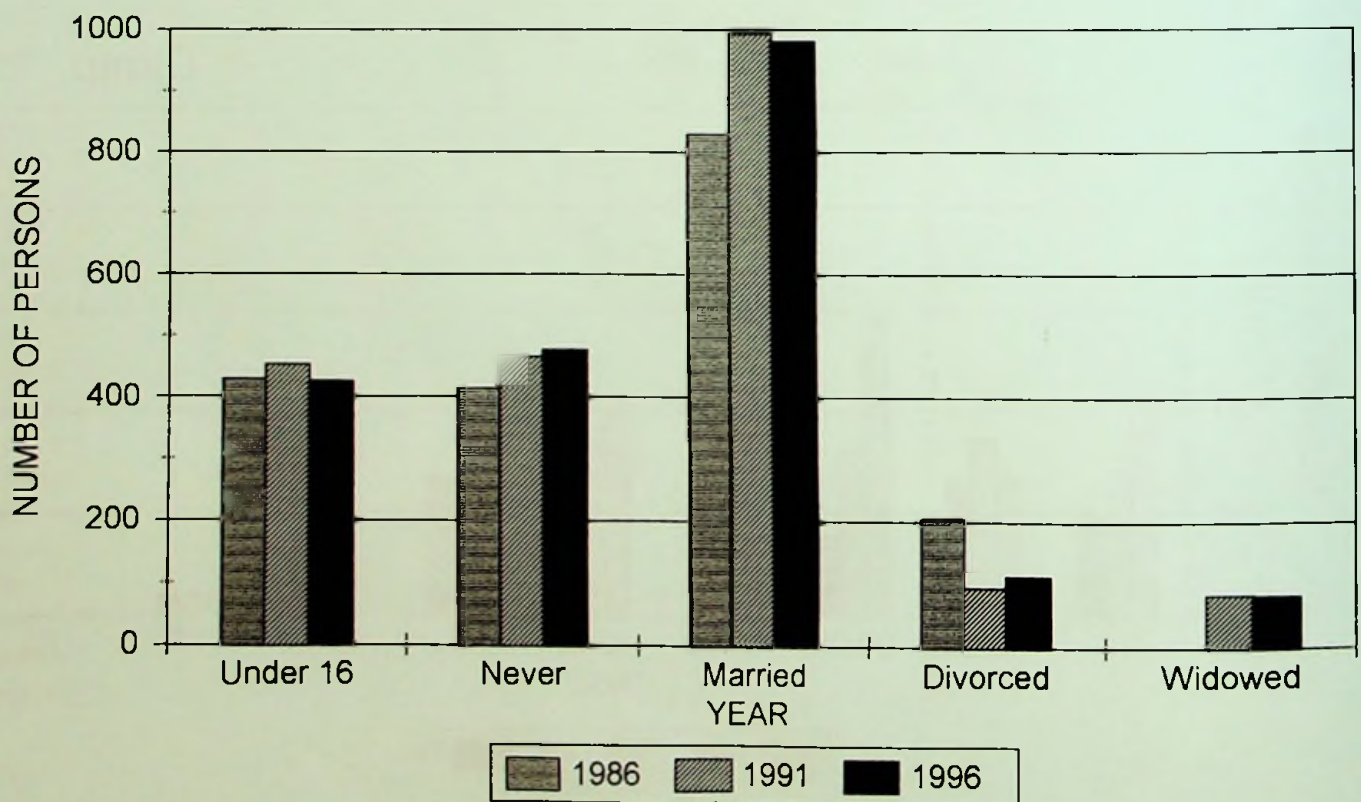

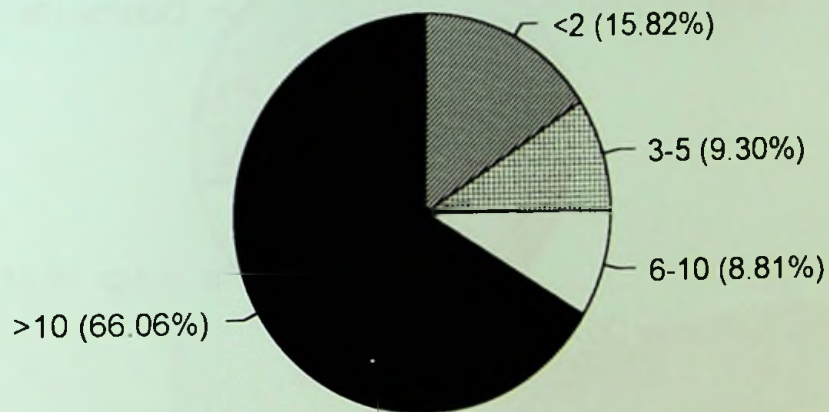

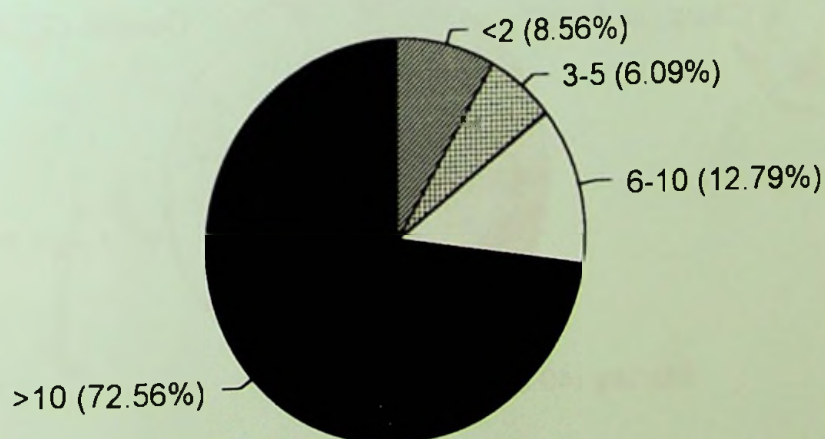


Figure 5. Length of residence of persons more than ten years of age. This question was not asked in the 1986 Census.



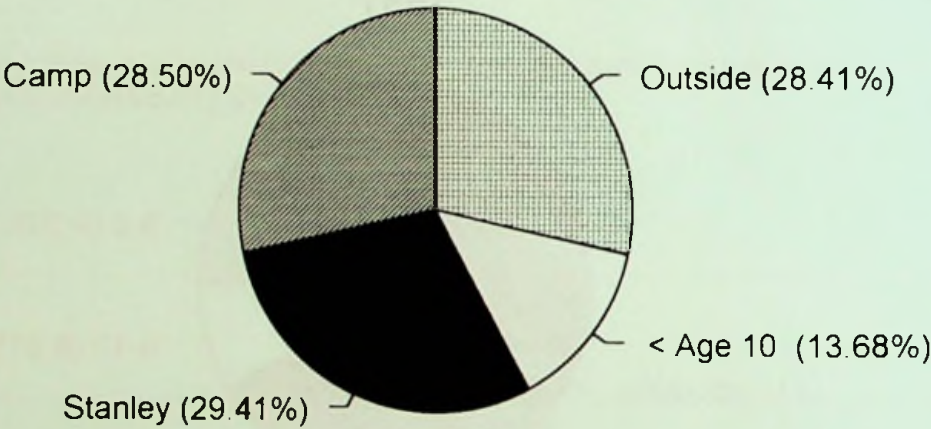

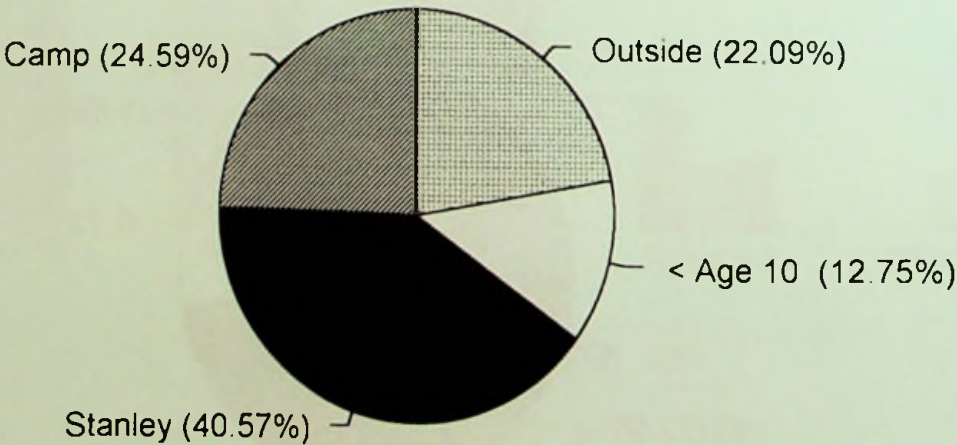


Figure 6. Residence of population ten years previously. This question was not asked in the 1986 Census.

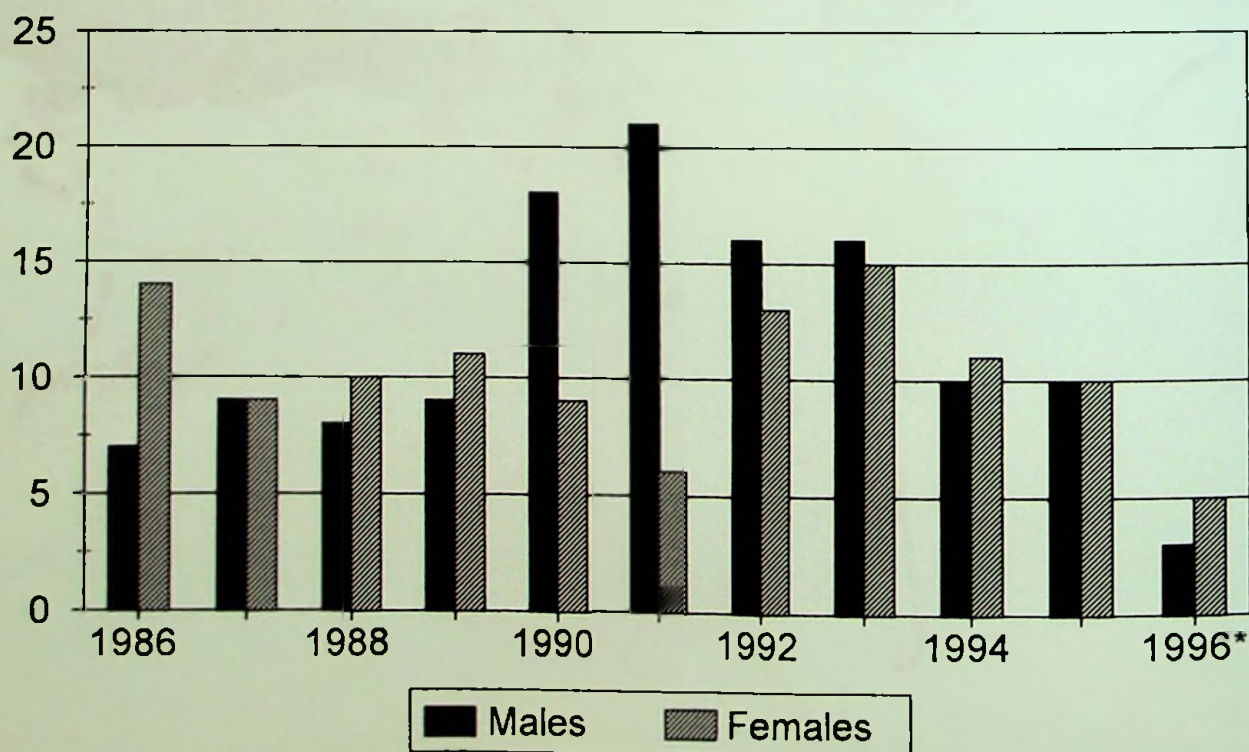


Figure 8. Births registered in the Falkland Islands, 1986 - 1996, by sex. The 1996 figure includes births on or before Census Day (24 April).

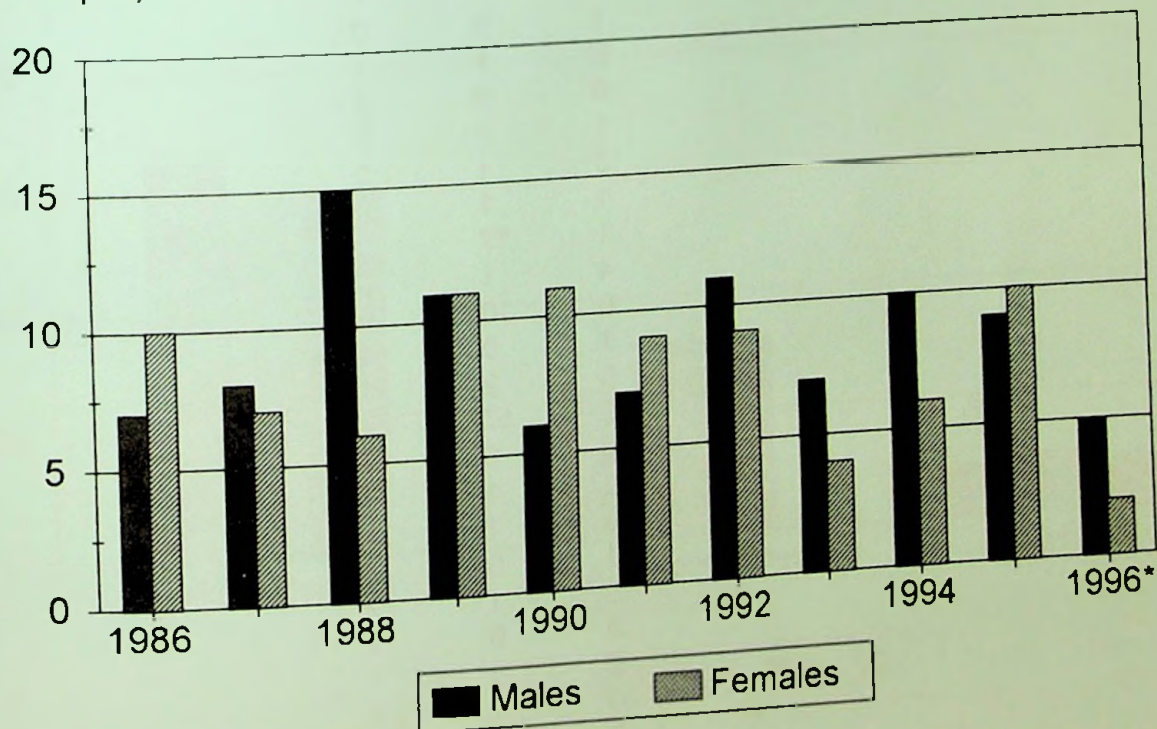

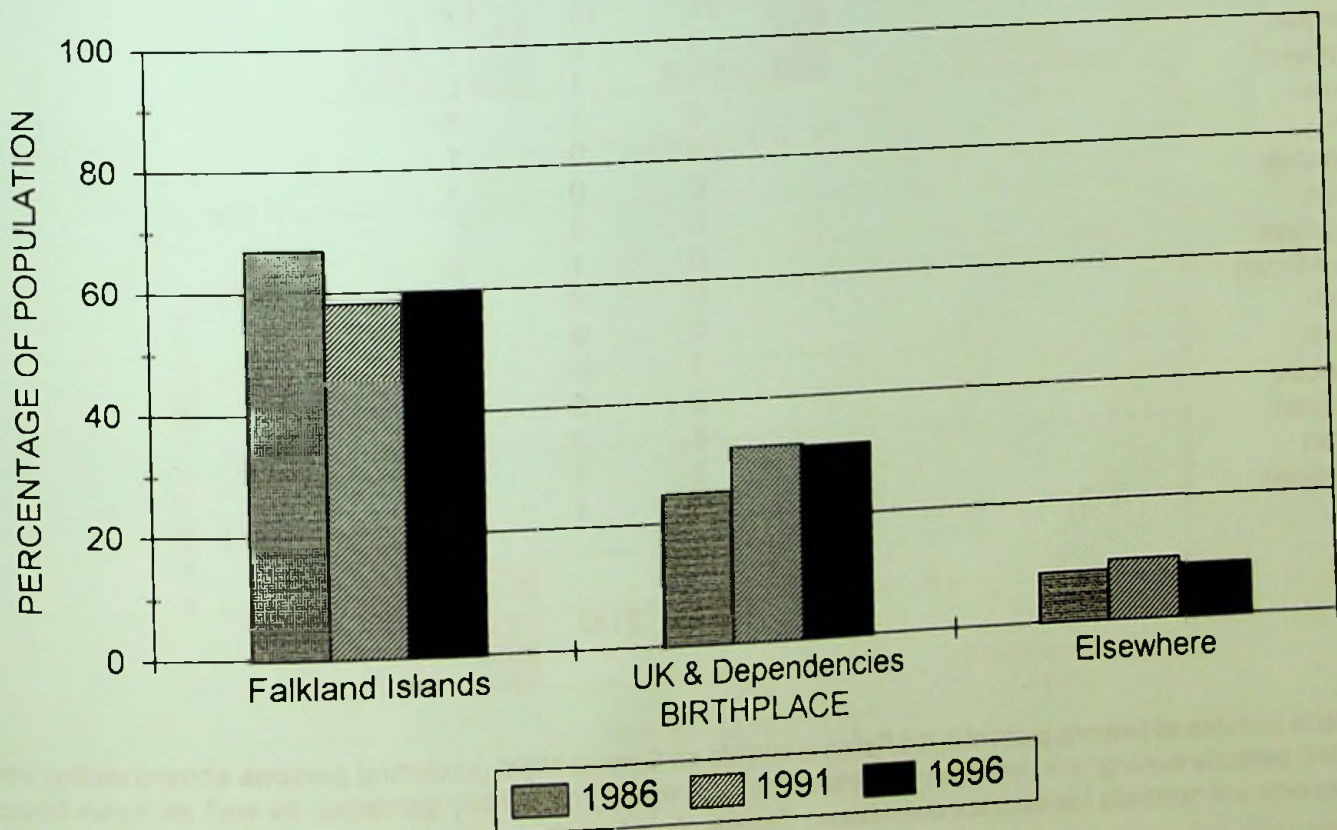


Figure 10. Population by birthplace, in three categories (Falkland Islands, UK and Dependencies, and Elsewhere) by year.

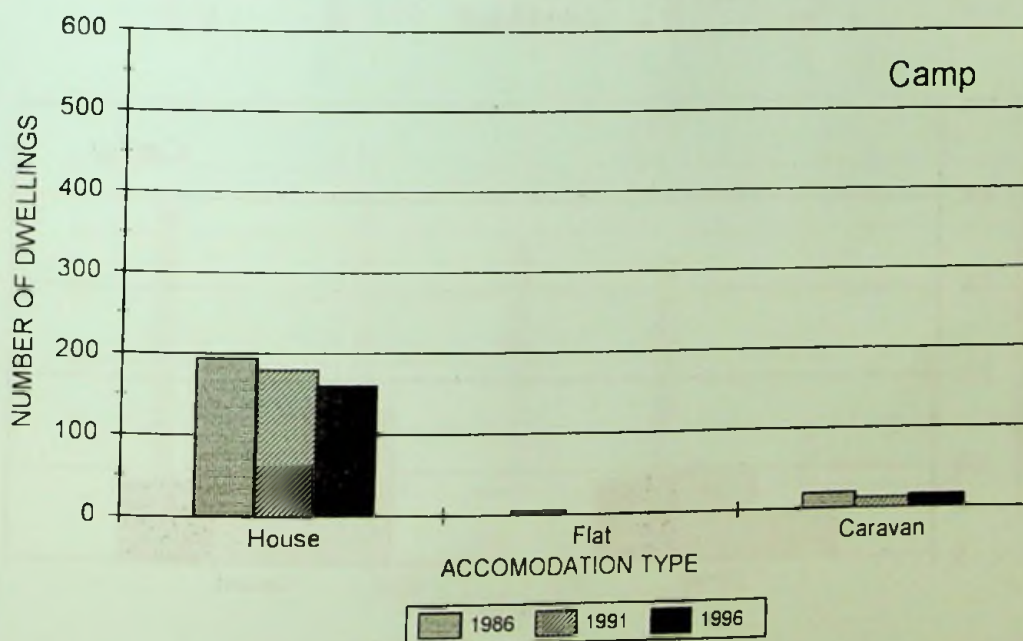
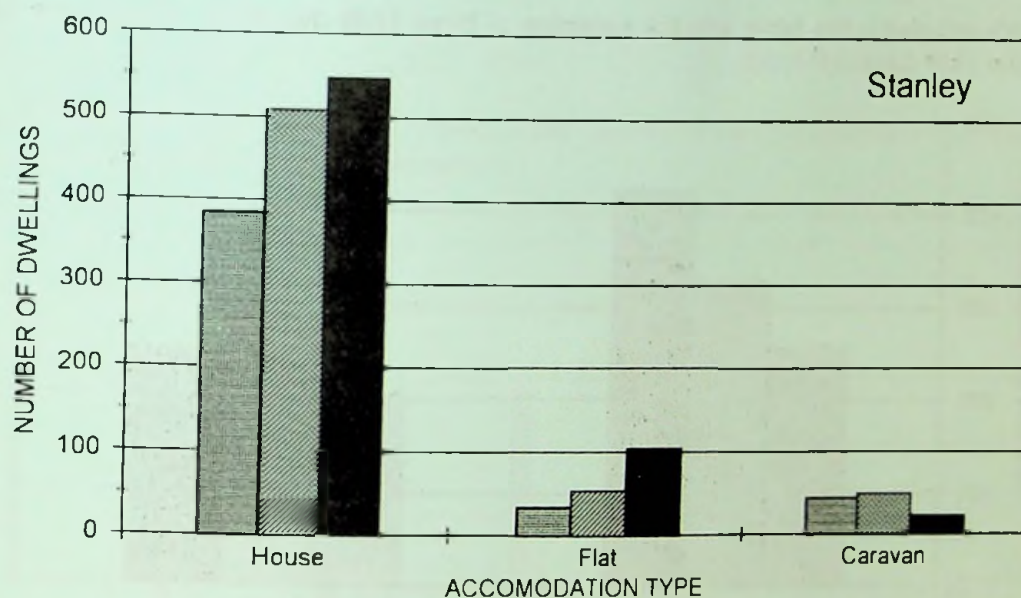


Figure 12. Distribution by dwelling type, 1986 - 1991. The 'Caravan' category includes all mobile homes and other temporary structures. Hotels and Guest Houses are included under houses. The 'Islands' category was not separated out in the 1986 Census.

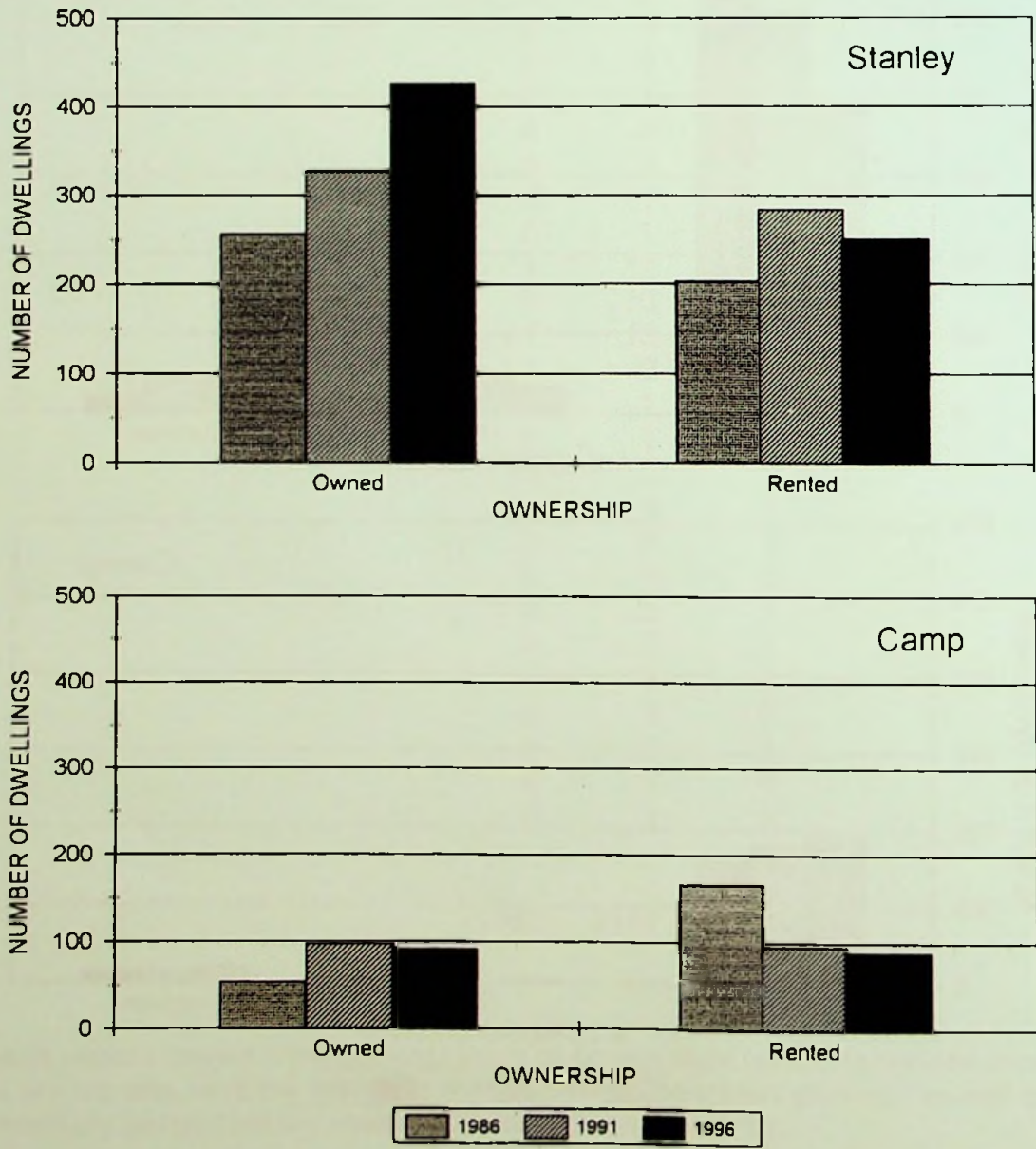


Figure 13. Home ownership and rented accommodation, 1986 - 1991. The 'Islands' category was not separated out in the 1986 Census.

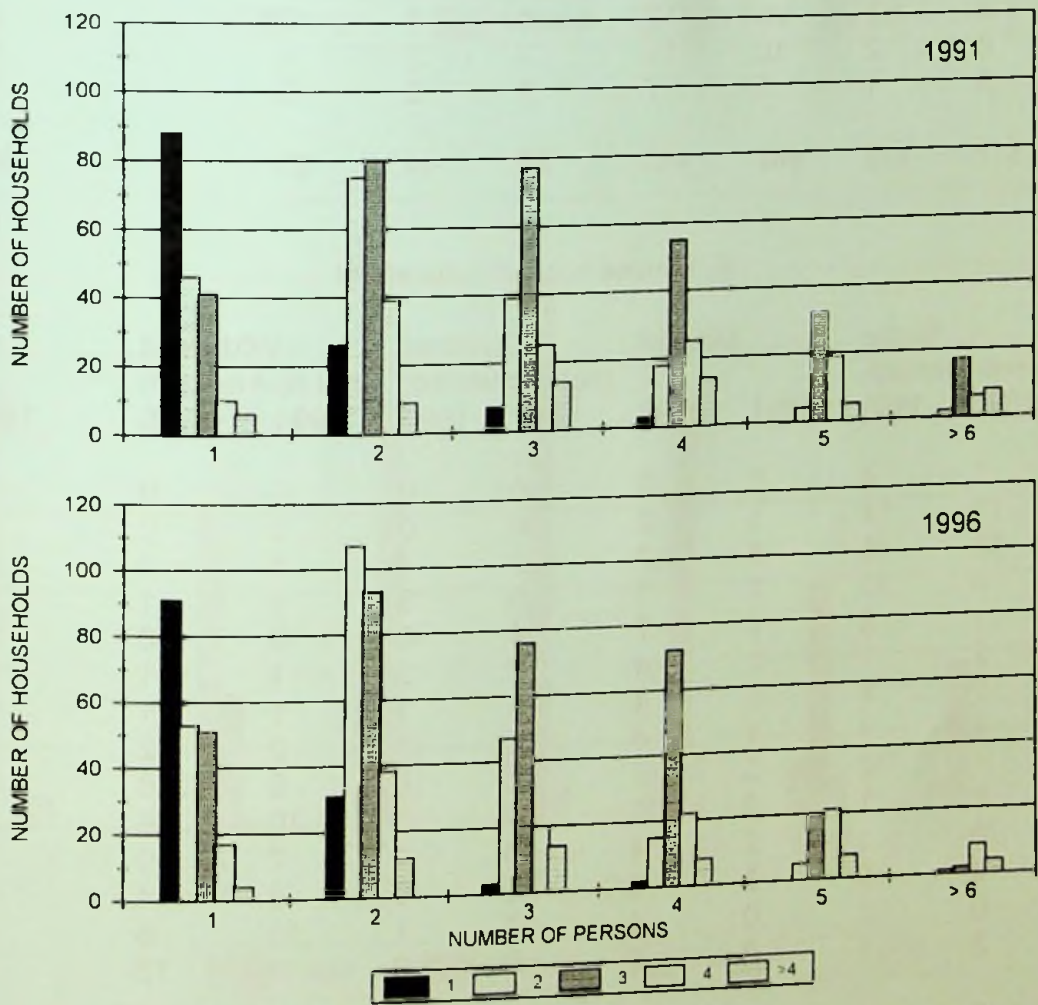


Figure 14. Household size in relation to size of accommodation, or number of persons per number of bedrooms (classes 6 through > 9 combined). This question was not asked in the 1986 Census.

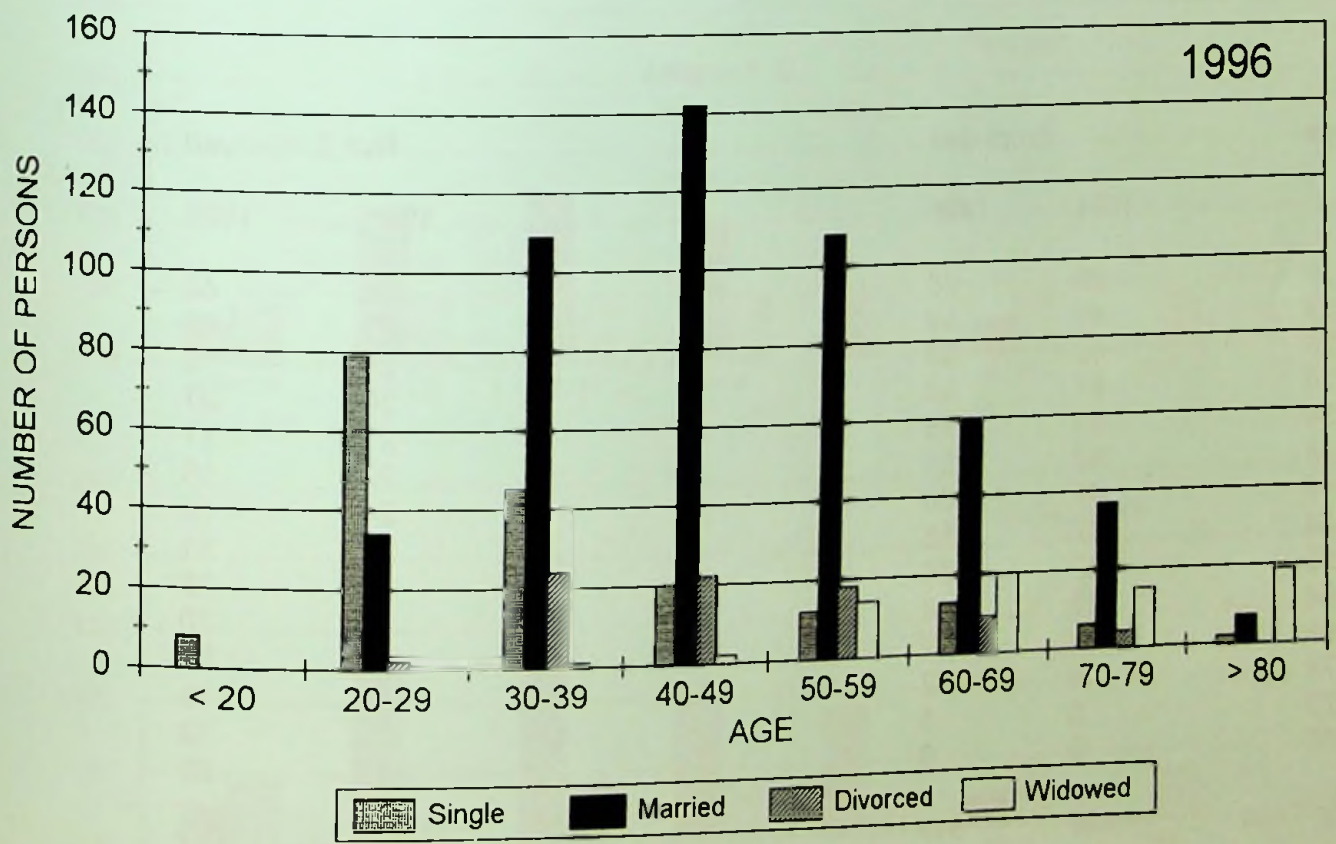
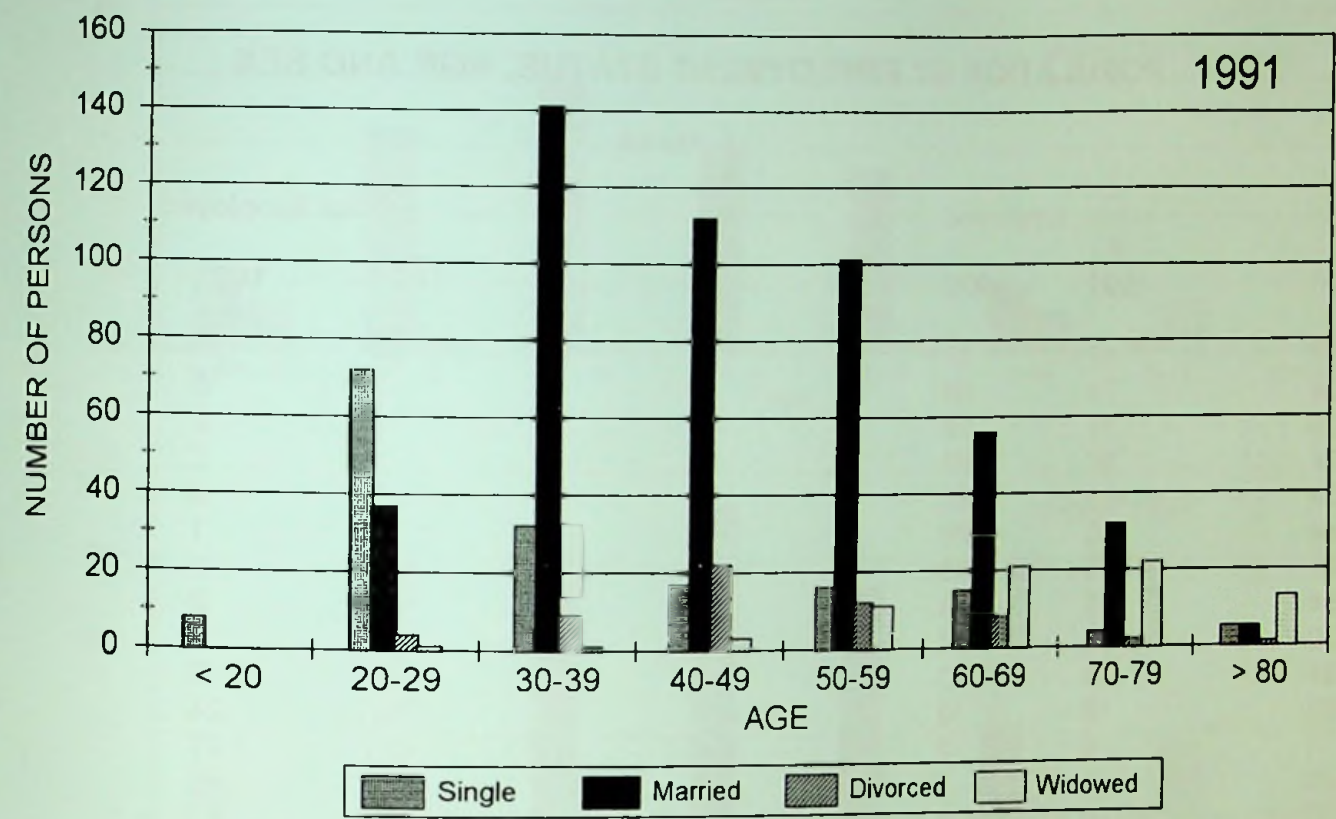


Figure 15. Households by age and marital status of the head of household (sexes combined). This question was not asked in the 1986 Census.

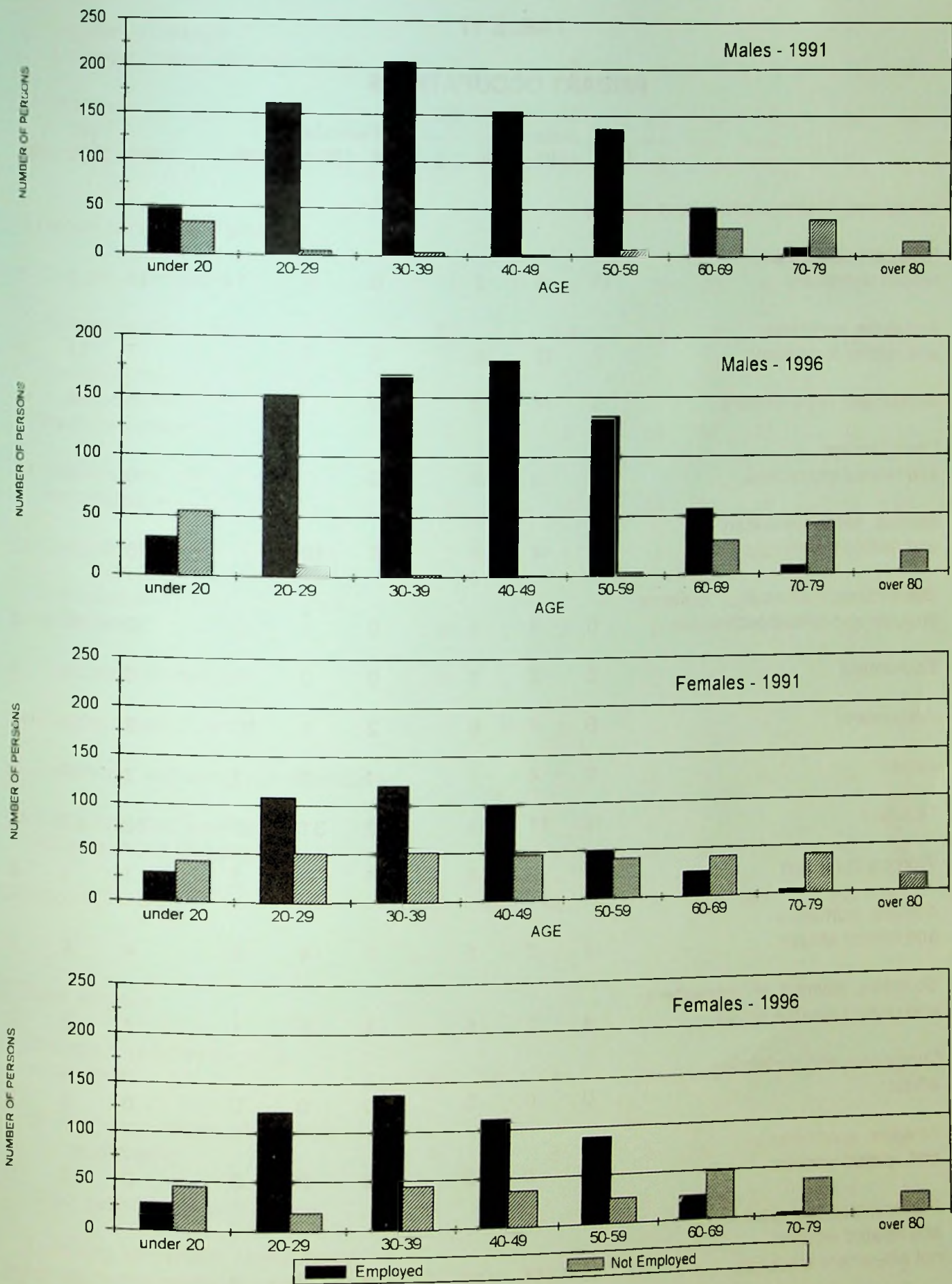


Figure 16. Population by employment status, age, and sex. This question was not asked in the 1986 Census.

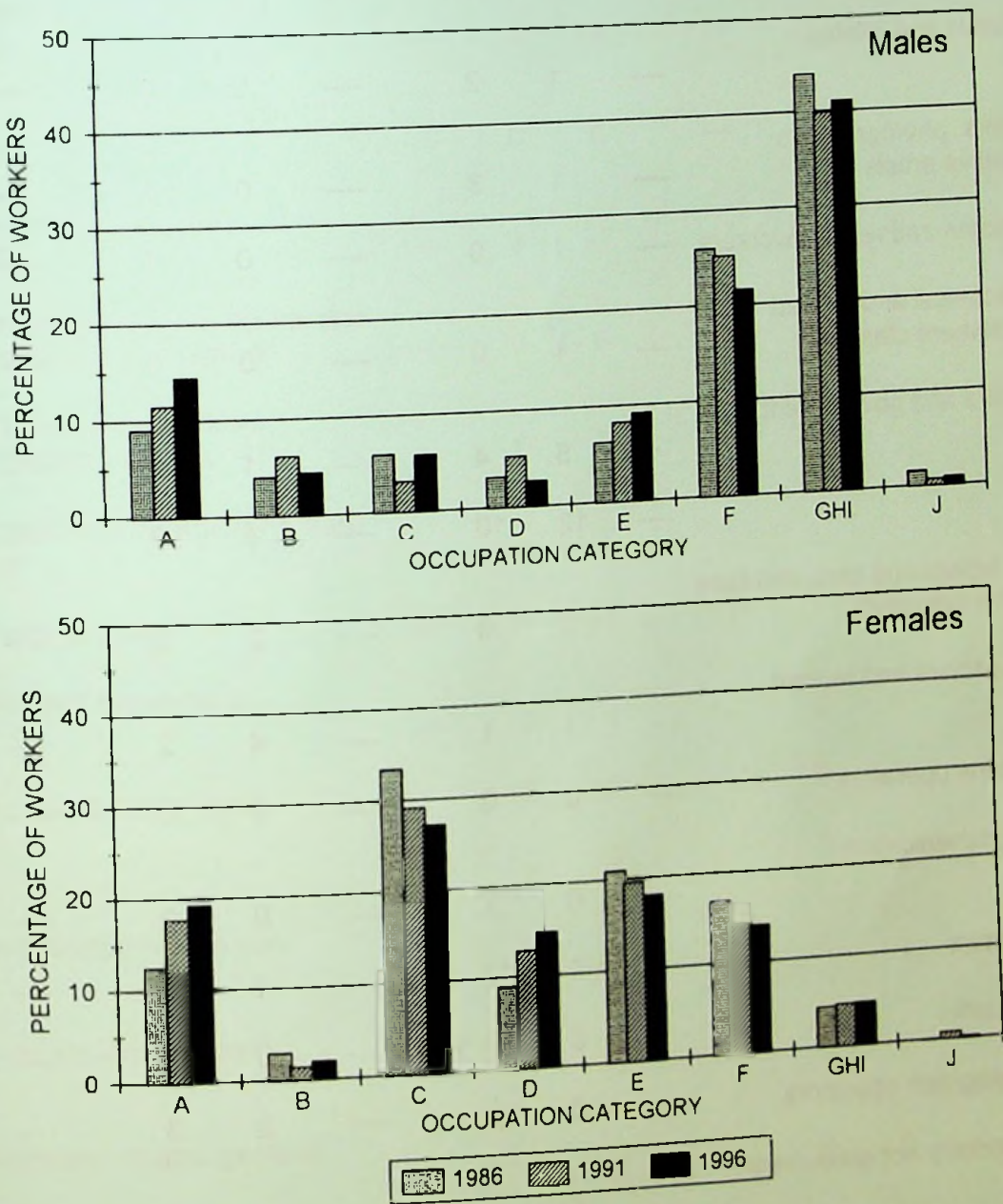


Figure 17. Primary occupation category by sex (A = Professional and Technical; B = Administrative and Managerial; C = Clerical; D = Sales; E = Service; F = Agriculture; GHI = Production; J = Unclassified).

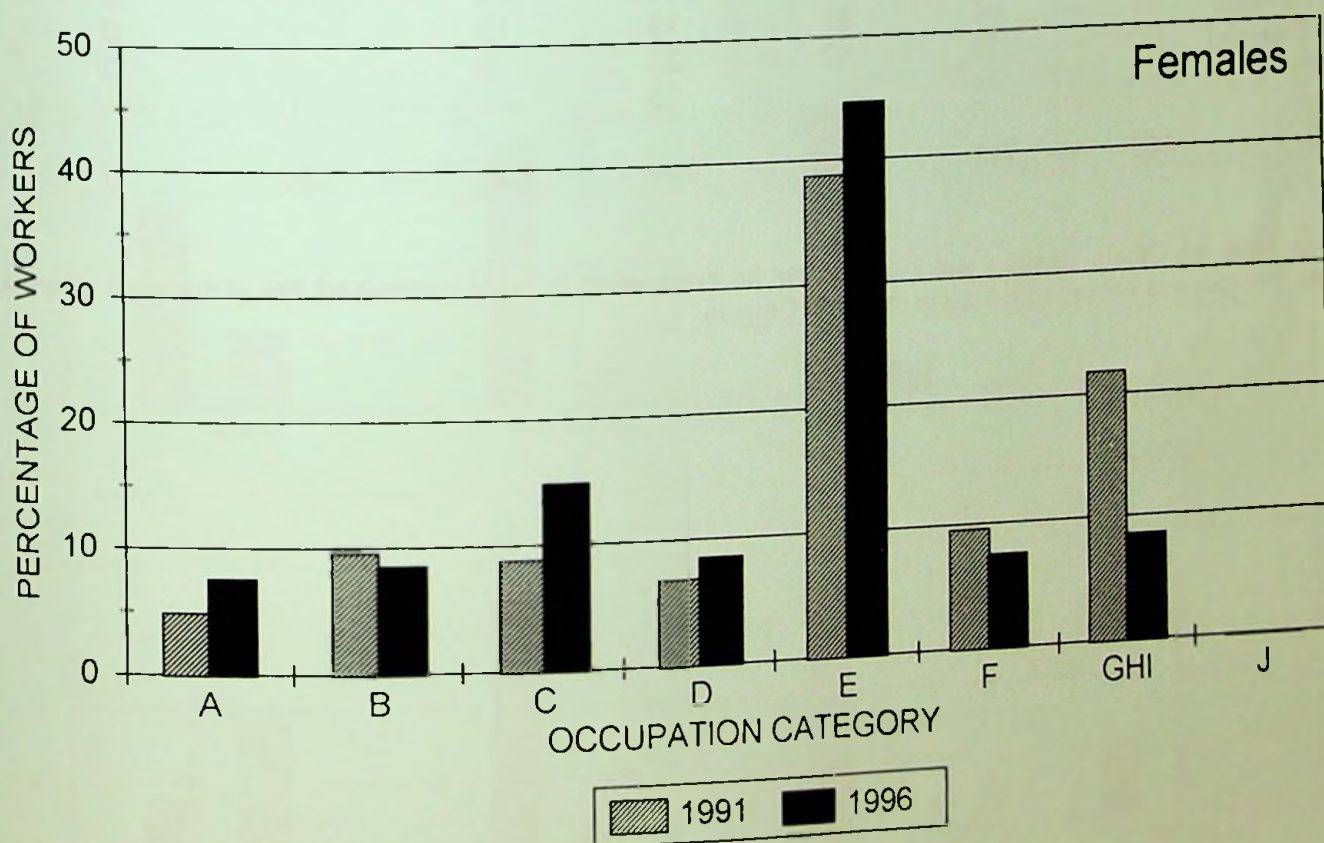
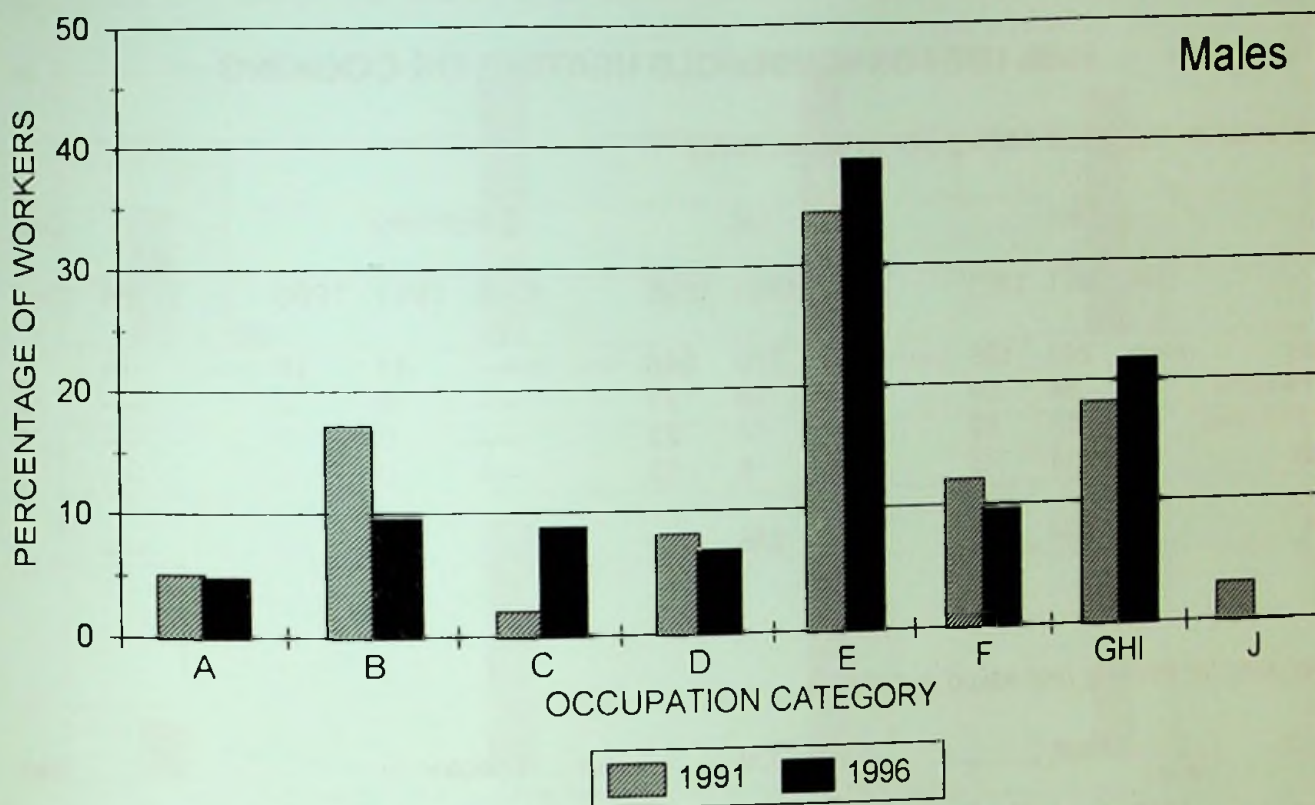

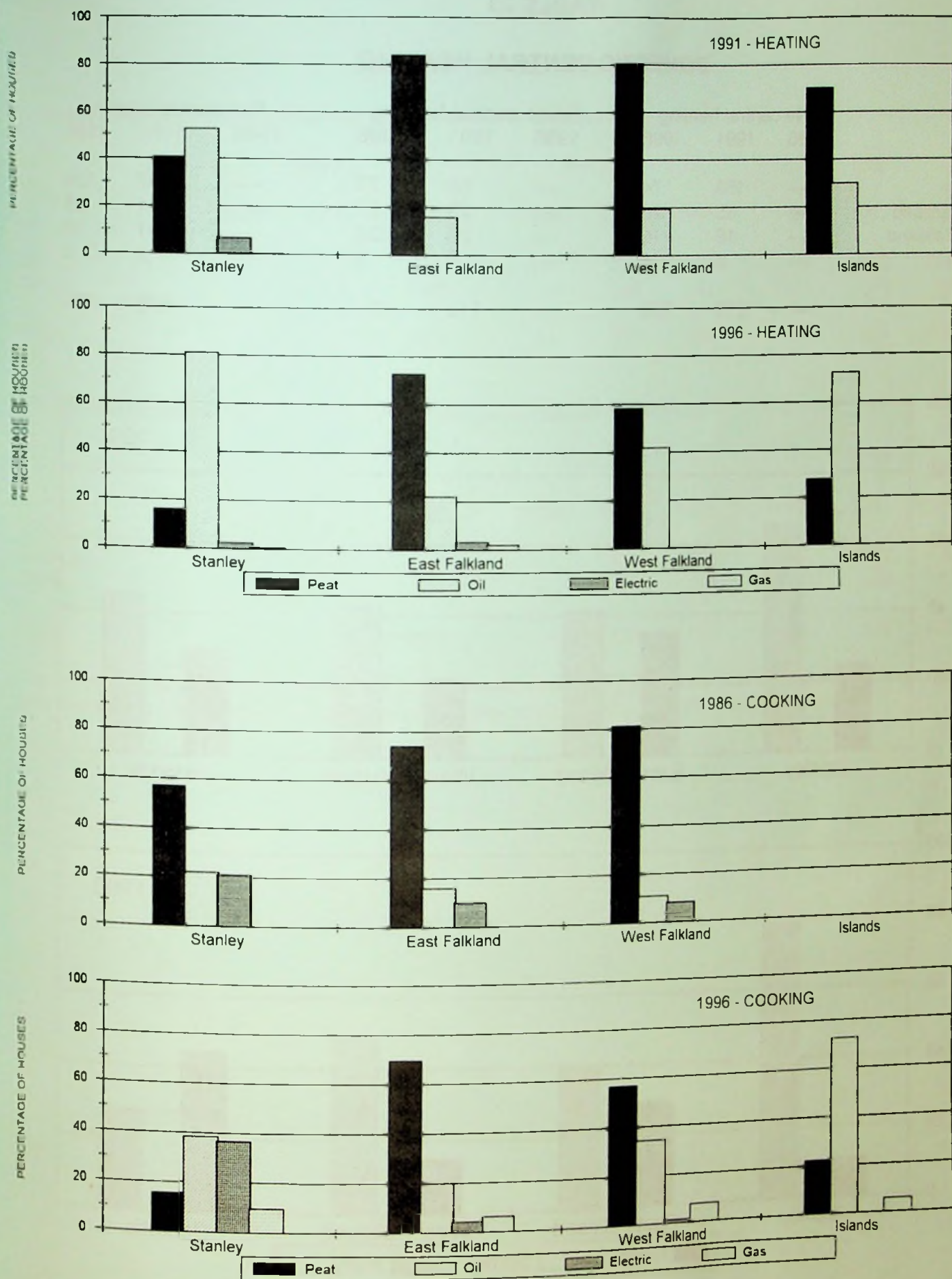


Figure 19. Fuel use for household heating or cooking. The 'Heating' category was not included in 1986, and the 'Cooking' category was not included in 1991.

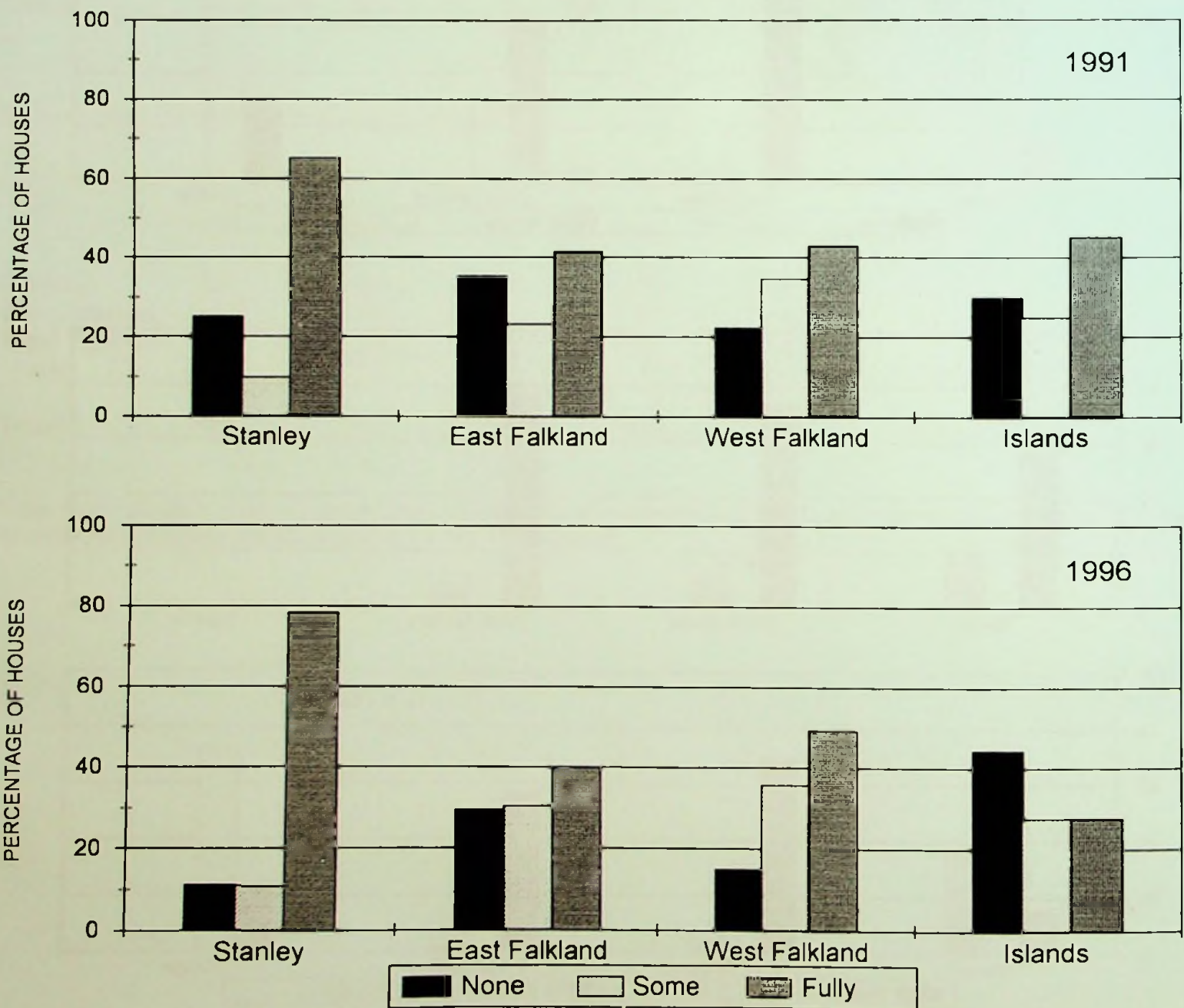


Figure 20. Domestic central heating by location, 1991 - 1996. This question was not asked in the 1986 Census.

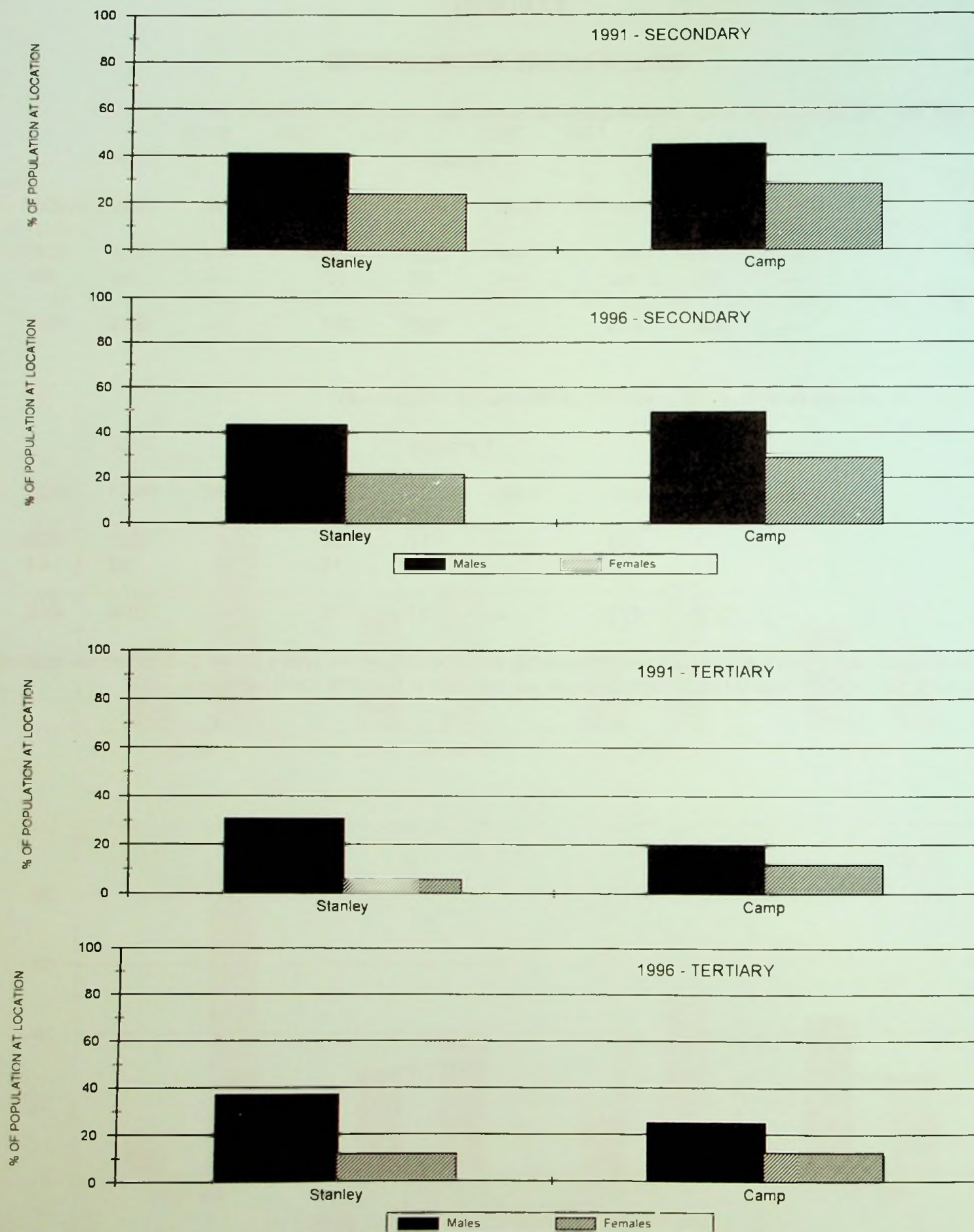

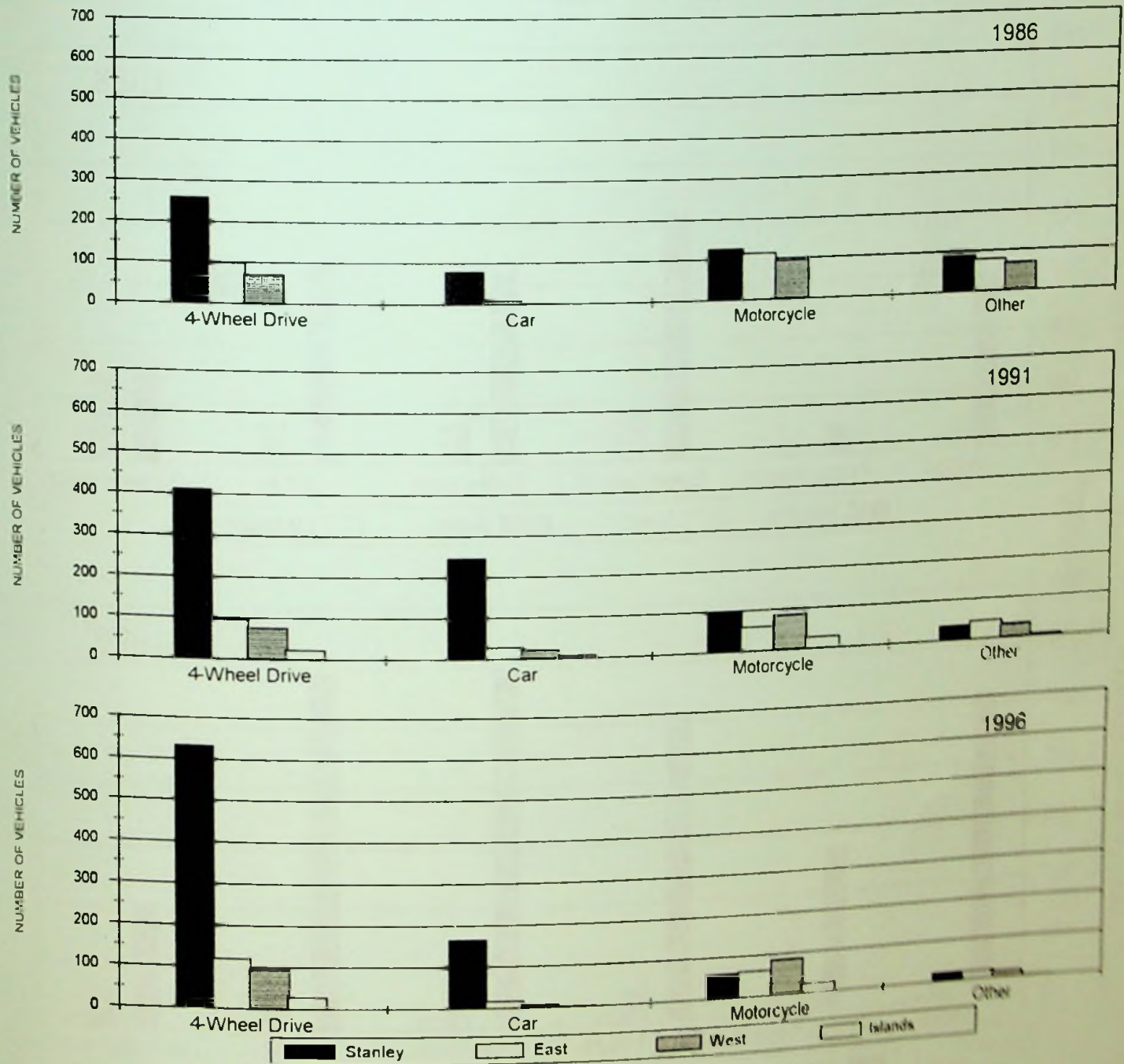


Figure 22. Number and type of vehicles by location and year. The 'Others' category includes lorries, tractors, forklifts, and boats.

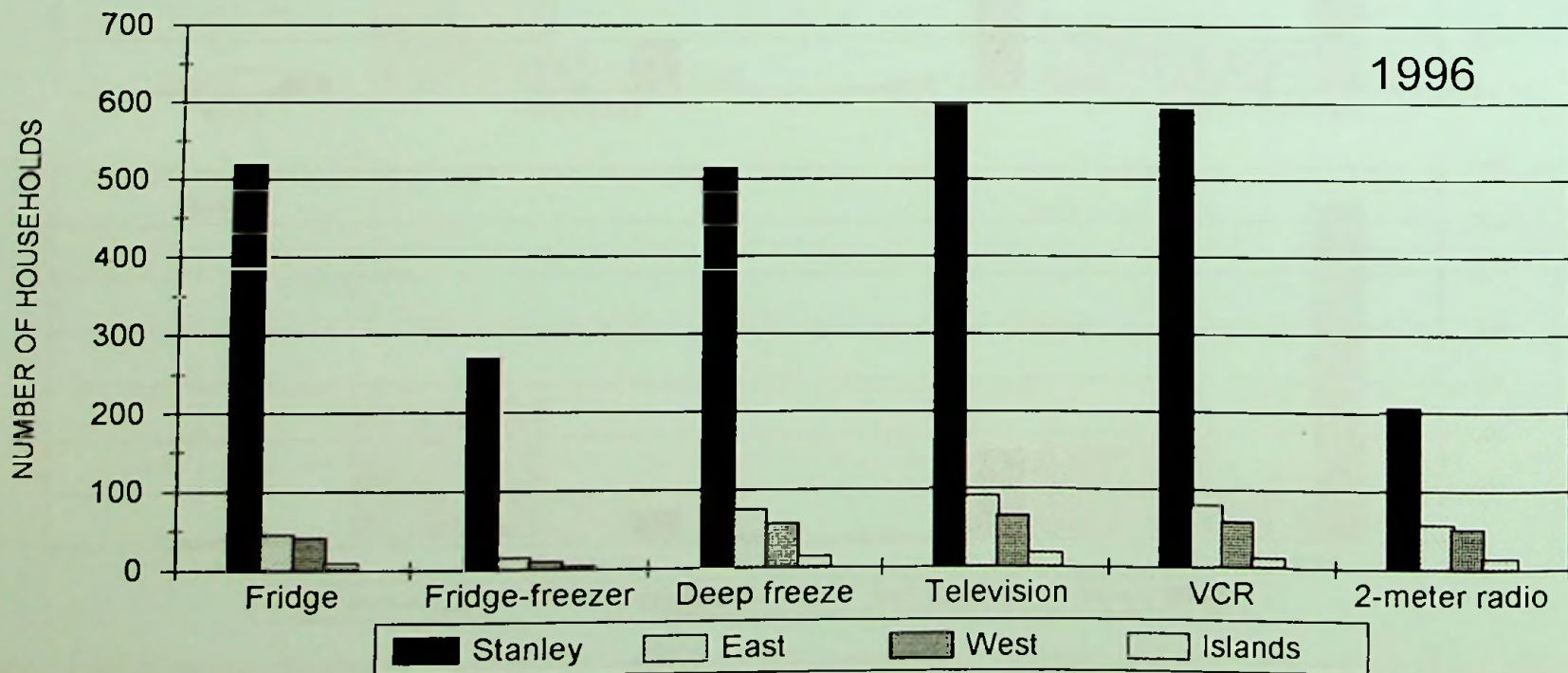
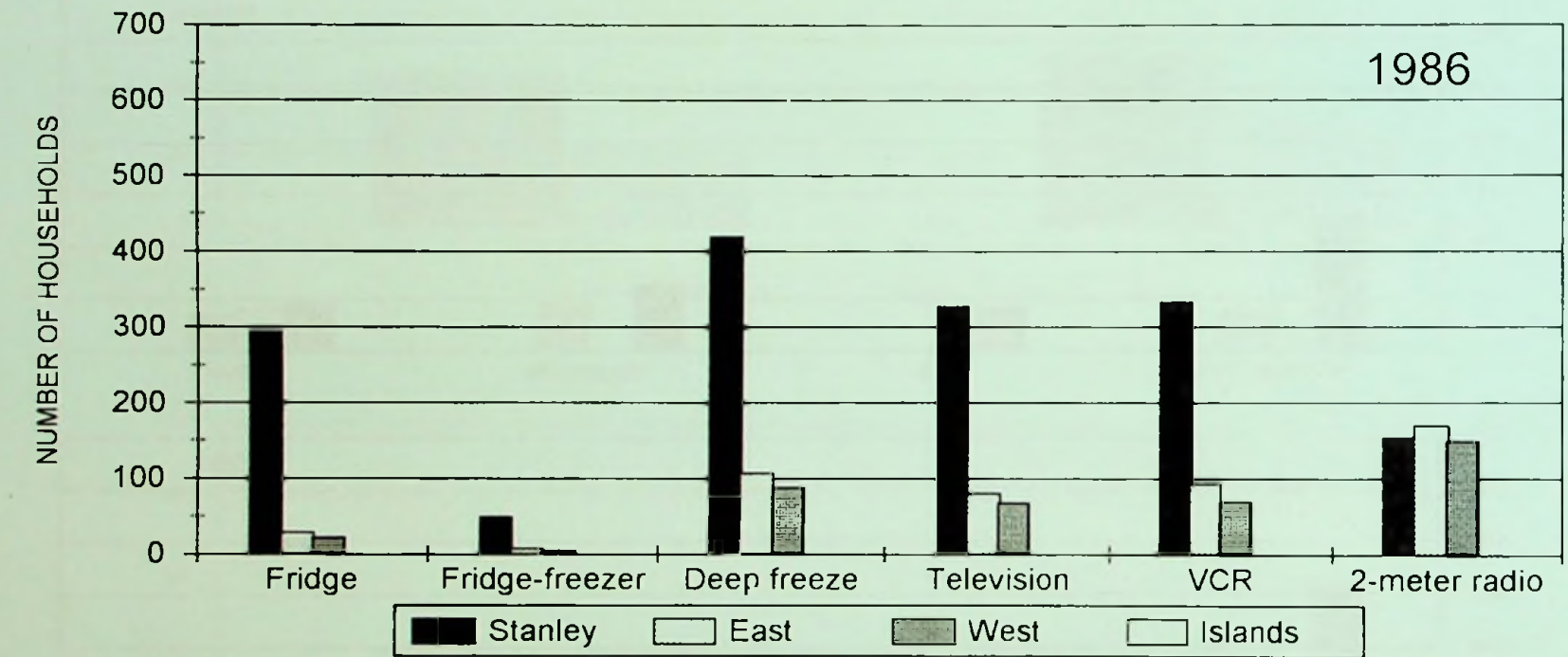


Figure 23. Number and type of household appliances by location and year. This question was not asked in the 1991 Census.
