## *Introduction*

This Report on patterns disclosed by the Census held on 8th April 2001, comprises three main sections, which have been printed on different coloured paper. It is hoped that this format will enable readers of the Report more readily to identify and refer to the various statistical materials annexed to the Report.

**Introductory**

1. Section 5 of the Census Ordinance (Title 62.1) reads —

5. The Attorney General shall, as soon as may be after the taking of Census, prepare reports on the census patterns and every such report shall be printed and laid before the Legislative Council.

2. A considerable amount of work goes into the organisation of a Census. An important preliminary task is the drafting of the Census Form. This was undertaken by a Working Group consisting of the Registrar General John Rowland, Principal Crown Counsel Graham Cripps, Government Secretary Peter King, Economic Adviser Richard Wagner and Fiona Didlick of FIDC. A great deal of preparatory work in the organisation of the Census was undertaken by the Registrar General. As was the case in respect of the 1996 Census, my special thanks go to Nikki Buxton of Synergy Information Systems Ltd who has prepared the Census statistics on the basis of the data contained in the Census Forms completed by members of the public. This report has annexed to it the 2001 Census Statistics (printed on pink paper), including pie charts and graphs to illustrate the various Tables. The results of the 1986, 1991, 1996 and 2001 Censuses are set out side by side in the various tables printed in a separate section on blue paper. Because Mount Pleasant was not included in the 1986 and 1991 Censuses, the 1996 and 2001 figures used in that section are nett of the population at Mount Pleasant.

3. Section 5 of the Census Ordinance requires me to come to conclusions. An easy conclusion is that the Falkland Islands now have the highest population they have ever had at the time of any Census. Table 1 shows the population on Census Day as being 2913<sup>1</sup>. For comparison purpose the 534 persons at MPA should be excluded<sup>2</sup>. This produces a population of 2379<sup>3</sup>. For a true comparison with Censuses before 1991, which counted persons temporarily absent from the Falkland Islands, the estimated number of persons temporarily absent on Census Day (112) needs to be added. This gives a figure of 2491<sup>4</sup>. The highest previous comparable figure is that for the population in 1931<sup>4</sup> (2392).

**Population movements**

4. Table 2 shows that the population of Stanley is now 1989, compared with 1636, a growth in population of 353 (21.58%). On the other hand the populations of East Falkland has diminished from 233 to 208 and that of West Falkland from 174 to 144. That of the Islands (other than East and West Falkland) remains the same. The loss of population in Camp (leaving Mount Pleasant out of consideration) since the 1996 Census is 56 people. This is, of course, the net figure as

there has also been movement into Camp in the last five years (see Table 5A). This is so, even in respect of West Falkland which, in percentage terms, shows the greatest population loss in the last five years (loss of 31 of its 1996 population of 174: 17.82%). East Falkland suffered a loss of 25 of its 1996 population of 233, a loss of 10.73%. The total population of the outlying Islands remained at 38<sup>5</sup>. The cause of the population decline is well-known: the long-term fall, in real terms, of wool prices

5. The trend of loss of population from Camp is, sadly, a continuing one. In 1986 West Falkland had a population of 265 and East Falkland had a population of 388. However these 1986 figures included the population of the Islands which were not separately recorded until 1991. Since 1986, Camp has lost 40.43% of population with the highest losses in terms of numbers and percentages occurring between 1986 and 1991.

6. The growth in the population of Stanley from 1232 in 1986 to 1989 in 2001 (a growth of 766 or 62.18%), cannot be attributed simply to a drift from Camp to Stanley. Clearly there has been some movement from Camp to Stanley as Table 6 illustrates but that Table illustrates that there has also been movement the other way, particularly to other parts of East Falkland.

7. It is clear that the major cause of population growth in Stanley has been immigration from overseas, some of it clearly is attributable to temporary contract workers<sup>6</sup>, although some of these, as some of their predecessors did, may settle in the Islands permanently.

8. Footnote 6 may indicate that some of the population growth is temporary and extremely vulnerable to a down-turn in the Falkland Islands' economy.

9. The inherent British nature of the Islands nevertheless remains practically unaltered. There were on Census Day 2350 British citizens and 443 British Dependent Territories citizens: 94.01% of the total of 2971<sup>7</sup>. The 1996 percentage was 96.3%.

10. Table 3, because of the presence of persons who may be in the Falkland Islands only for a contract period, does not allow detailed conclusions to be drawn in relation to the relative ageing of the population and population replacement. Comparison with Table 3 in the 1996 Census Report with Table 3 in the present Report clearly demonstrates that the numbers in the comparable cohorts in 2001, in respect of the cohorts 0-5 to 55-60 have all increased (e.g. 0-5 in 1996 was 120, 5-10 in 2001 is 146). This is caused by immigration. Some of that is permanent by settlement of some of those concerned. But some of it is temporary. It is remarkable that the population 50-55 in 1996 was 180. One would expect the comparable cohort 55-60 in 2001 to be smaller due to mortality. It is not - the cohort has increased to 188. The community is not ageing in the sense that the ratio of persons of working age to retired population is shrinking. It

is increasing. However the number of people of retirement age is also increasing. There were 39 people of 80 and over in 1996: now there are 58. Persons over 65 have increased from 129 to 151 and these figures have implications for the cost of providing services etc to the elderly. The persons of working age (15-65) has increased from 2108 to 2214 (1622 to 1680 if MPA is left out of account). That means that the retired population is 8.99% of the number of people of working age in the community outside MPA. This percentage is an extremely low one in terms of western economies. It is bound to increase if immigrant labour settles here in any numbers. At the other end of the scale, persons under 15 have increased from 401 to 438. The numbers of persons permanently resident (over ten years) has increased from 1336 in 1996 to 1558 in 2001. Nonetheless, the rate of permanent immigration may be slowing down as the persons resident from 6-10 years has dropped from 284 to 190.

11. Table 9 (Births 1991-2001) is of limited use because it includes births in the Falkland Islands of children to mothers who, in the event, have only, or will only, temporarily be present here. Additionally, it does not include children born to mothers who for medical reasons gave birth overseas. Table 11B does not redress this difficulty so far as calculation of the natural increase/decrease (i.e. net of immigration/emigration) in the population is concerned.

12. Similar problems occur in relation to Table 10, which does not include deaths occurring overseas of persons normally resident in the Falkland Islands.

13. It is important to bear in mind that Table 11 deals with place of birth, Table 12 with citizenship. The citizenship shown in Table 12 is what persons said they regarded as their principal citizenship if they held more than one<sup>8</sup>.

14. Tables 3 and 13, read together, show that only 16 males under 25 are head of their own household, while there are 74 males in that age group (not including MPA<sup>9</sup>). 18 females (17 of whom are single) are in that category, out of 78. This is partly explained by the fact that students temporarily absent are included in the figures. That explanation does not avail so much in relation to persons in the 25-30 age group where only 44 males out of 88 (not including MPA<sup>9</sup>) are head of their own household while 37 females are out of 94. The figures do not, it is supposed, illustrate that a large number of people of these age groups are living at home with parents, but that a relatively large number of contract employees, outside MPA are living in bunkhouse or similar accommodation provided by employers<sup>10</sup>.

15. Table 14 shows that, in housing terms, there is quite significant under-occupation of existing housing and little overcrowding. However there does appear to be one 9 person household living in a 2 bedroomed dwelling and one 6 person household in a 1 bedroomed dwelling and another in a 2 bedroomed dwelling. On first sight, this appears to indicate a possible small-scale housing need which ought to be investigated.

16. There is a significant increase of 77 to 121 (see Table 16 in 1996 and 2001 Census) in couples living together who are not married to each other. This has occurred elsewhere and may represent a trend. There is a big increase in the number of lodgers (15 to 76) an increase of 61, 55 of which is attributable to Stanley.

17. The working population of the Islands has increased significantly since 1996, with 17.5% more people working full time (was 1724, now 2025). Among those of working age, the employment rate in full time employment is 98.5% (men) and 79.3% (women). The adjusted unemployment rate (ie. only counting those who are available for work, and subtracting students and those who described themselves as "retired"), is a negligible 1.04%. The pressure on the labour market is also seen in the number of people having second jobs (up by 31% to 316), on the number of working women (up by 24% to 797) and on the number of people working on after normal retirement of 65 years (53 people with full or part time jobs, or 22% of the retired population). [Tables 17, 18 and 19].

18. Entrepreneurship is shown in 288 people reporting that they run their own full, or part time, business (a rise of 10% on 1996). [Table 20].

19. The population is becoming increasingly more qualified. 1338 claim secondary school qualifications such as GCSEs (a rise of 39% on 1996) and 454 claim vocational qualifications (a rise of 31%) and these figures appear to confirm the effectiveness of strong educational drives by Government and the Falkland Islands Development Corporation. [Tables 7 and 8].

20. The number of dwellings has increased nationwide (excluding MPA) from 865 in 1996 to 1073 and in Stanley from 676 to 851 (an increase of 25.89%) (see Table 21 in each Census). There have been smaller increases throughout Camp, but that for East Falkland (10) includes an increase in the number of houses occupied from 81 to 98, with fewer caravans and mobile homes.

21. Of the 1061 dwelling outside MPA, 661 are owner occupied (62.30%) (see Tables 21 and 22). The 1996 figure was 59.77%, where 517 out of 865 dwellings were owner occupied. In 1996 there were 426 owner occupied dwellings in Stanley (out of 676 (63.02%)). In 2001 542 out of 851 are owner-occupied (63.69%) so the percentage has remained almost constant<sup>11</sup>.

22. There has been a significant change in the fuel used for household heating (see Tables 25 and 26), a trend which has continued since at least 1991 (see Table 19 in 1996 Census). The use of peat for household cooking has declined from 404 in 1991, 221 in 1996 to 101 today (Table 26 2001 Census). Kerosene is the main heating fuel (618 out of 1061 households including MPA). Diesel is used in 311. In houses built in the last five years 136 out of 148 use kerosene. The remainder of those houses use diesel. Only 3 houses built in the last ten years use peat.

23. Electricity is the dominant means of cooking (410 households from 250 in 1996), but there has been an increase in the use of gas from 78 households in 1996 to 364 today. 97 households still use peat for cooking. There were 488 households using peat for cooking in 1986 and 213 in

1996. The decline in the use of peat is dramatic, and appears likely to continue. Only 62 households, outside MPA reported that they had no central heating, as against 120 in 1996. Of the 148 dwellings built in the last 5 years, only 1 is without full central heating.

24. Another indicator of standard of living is the number of household appliances (Table 28 of the 2001 Census). Comparison with Table 23 in the 1996 Census shows the vast increase since 1986 of the ownership of material goods right across the community.

25. Of the 1052 households outside MPA, 542 have a computer and 454 have internet access. 536 have a fax machine. The most common household appliance is a television set.

26. The number of vehicles available to households in Stanley is now 1054 (553 in 1986, 790 in 1991 and 878 in 1996). Within those numbers there are some interesting changes. In 1986 there were 126 motorcycles in Stanley. These have progressively declined to 54 today. The number of cars (2 wheel drive) reached a peak of 246 in 1991 and has declined to 153.

27. There has been an increase in vehicle availability to households in Camp. There are 258 vehicles available for use by 105 households in East Falkland and 204 vehicles available for 68 households in West Falkland.

28. Table 30 shows what people stated as their total combined household income. The information in that Table is regarded as being extremely unreliable. It illustrates the futility of asking questions of that type in a Census questionnaire.




Figure 1. Population as at Census, 1851 to 7 April 2001.




Figure 2. Location of population by sex, of people normally resident in the Falkland Islands.





Figure 3. Breakdown of population in Stanley and Camp by age for people normally resident in the Falkland Islands.




Figure 4. Marital status of the population as at census. In 1986, all persons who described themselves as widowed, separated or divorced were counted as a unit, so no Widowed category appears for that year, and the Divorced category is inflated.




Figure 5. Length of residence of persons more than ten years of age. This question was not asked in the 1986 Census.






Figure 6. Residence of population ten years previously. This question was not asked in the 1986 Census.




Figure 8. Births registered in the Falkland Islands, 1986 – 2001, by sex. The 2001 figure includes births registered on or before Census Night (7 April).




Figure 9. Deaths registered in the Falkland Islands, 1986 – 2001, by sex. The 2001 figure includes deaths registered on or before Census Night (7 April).




Figure 10. Population by birthplace, in three categories (Falkland Islands, UK &amp; Dependencies, and Elsewhere) by year.




Figure 12. Distribution by dwelling type, 1986-2001.







Figure 13. Home ownership and rented accommodation, 1986 – 2001. The 'Islands' category was not separated out in the 1986 Census.




Figure 15. Households by age, sex and marital status of head of household (sexes combined). This question was not asked in the 1986 Census.




Figure 16. Educational attainments as a percentage of the population over 16 years of age by location and sex, 1991-2001. The Secondary Education groups include persons also reporting tertiary or vocational qualifications. This question was asked on the 1986 Census Questionnaire, but was not included in the 1986 Census Report.




Figure 17. Population by employment status, age and sex. This question was not asked in the 1986 Census.




Figure 18. Primary occupations by sex (A – Professional and Technical; B – Administrative and Managerial; C – Clerical; D – Sales; E – Service; F – Agriculture; GHI – Production; J – Unclassified)




Figure 19. Secondary occupations by sex (A – Professional and Technical; B – Administrative and Managerial; C – Clerical; D – Sales; E – Service; F – Agriculture; GHI – Production; J – Unclassified)




Figure 20. Fuel use for household heating and cooking, in Stanley and Camp, by percentage of houses. The 'Heating' category was not included in 1986, and the 'Cooking' category was not included in 1991.




Figure 21. Domestic central heating by location, 1991-2001. This question was not asked in the 1986 Census.





Figure 22. Number and type of vehicles by location and year. The 'Other' category includes lorries, tractors, forklifts, boats, 3 and 4-wheel bikes and boats.




Figure 23. Number and type of household appliances in Stanley and Camp by year. This question was not asked in the 1991 Census.
