Foreword

by His Excellency the Civil Commissioner SIR REX HUNT, c.m.g.

1983 marks the 150th Anniversary of the permanent settlement of the Falkland Islands by the British. Early history is uncertain but probably the first sighting of the Islands was made by Captain Davis in the Elizabethan ship "Desire" in 1592. The first known landing in the Islands was made by Captain Strong in 1690. He named them after the then Treasurer of the Navy, Viscount Falkland. Commodore Byron surveyed the West Falklands in 1765 and hoisted the Union Jack at Port Egmont on Saunders Island, where Captain Macbride founded the first British settlement of approximately 400 in 1766. Unknown to Byron or Macbride, Bougainville had founded a French settlement in Port Louis in East Falkland in 1764. In 1767 he sold his interest in the Falkland Islands to the Spanish. Britain protested but the Spanish settled in Port Louis which they re-named Puerto del Soledad and in 1770 they forced a small British garrison at Port Egmont to withdraw in the face of an overwhelmingly superior naval presence. Britain and Spain almost went to war over this incident but in 1771 the Spanish monarch disavowed the action taken by the Governor of the River Plate and ordered full restitution to be made. The British returned to Port Egmont but were withdrawn in 1774 for reasons of economy. The Spanish remained in Puerto del Soledad until 1811 when they withdrew. The United Provinces of La Plata attempted to claim sovereignty over the Islands from 1820 onwards but no proper administration was established until 3 January 1833 when Captain Onslow on HMS Clio rehoisted the Union Jack. From 1833 the British enjoyed peaceful, effective and continuous possession until the unprovoked Argentine aggression on 2 April 1982. The Argentine invaders were defeated and British administration reinstated on 14 June 1982.

Short History of local Clubs and Associations

Falkland Islands Rifle Association

There are scant records of rifle shooting in the Falklands dating back to the 1880's but the Falkland Islands Defence Force Rifle Association as such was founded in 1927 by the late Sir Arnold Hodson, K.C.M.G., then Governor of the Islands, and an accomplished marksman. He captained the first team from the Falklands to compete at Bisley, Surrey, England in 1928. Since then many teams have visited Bisley with considerable success, the latest being in 1980 when our team won the Junior Mackinnon Trophy against strong opposition. Bisley teams are not state supported on their overseas ventures and although funds are raised by means of an annual lottery, those who attend do so at considerable personal expense.

There is a following of around 20 - 25 members and competitions include spoon shoots, the Easter Prize Shoot, and a three days event, modelled on the Imperial meeting held at Bisley, in which several trophies are shot for including the championship cup, over ranges from three hundred to one thousand yards.

Shooting took place from around October till March on an excellent five target range, but during the Argentine occupation the range, butts and pavilion were destroyed. The re-building or the position of a new range has not yet been agreed upon.

1982 however ended for the Rifle Association on a much happier note as a two man team comprising of Gerald Cheek (Captain) and Tony Pettersson were able to represent the Falkland Islands at the XII Commonwealth Games held at Brisbane, Australia in October.

The Falkland Islands Sheep Owners Association Ltd.

The formation of a Committee or Association in London of Falkland Islands Sheep Farmers or Sheep Owners was contemplated as far back as the year 1919, but no active steps were taken towards the formation of an Association until the year 1928, by which time the cost of Government of the Falkland Islands had increased considerably with the development of whaling in the Dependencies. It was felt that that industry, which had not contributed anything towards the cost of establishing settled Government, was enjoying the advantages of it without paying its proportionate share of the administrative costs, which had practically doubled since its advent. The incidence of taxation was consequently unfair to the sheep farming industry, which was (and must remain) the mainstay of the Colony.

It was desirable therefor to form some body which would watch its interests and make any necessary representations, and a meeting, attended by 88% of that industry, was held at the Cannon Street Hotel in October 1928, and the Sheep Owners Association was thereupon formed.

Mr. Rhodes Hawtyn Cobb was the first Chairman of the Association, and Mr. G. Bonner, Mr. E. J Mathews and Mr. W. A. Harding were selected as Members of the Committee, Mr. Harding acting as Secretary. On the death of Mr. Cobb in 1931, Mr. George Bonner was appointed Chairman, and Mr. G. T. Dean elected as a Member of the Committee.

The affairs of the Sheep Owners Association were entirely conducted from London until about 1938, when Association meetings began to take place within the Colony and were attended on behalf of the absentee Owners by the various Managers of the farming properties.

In 1971 the Falkland Islands Sheep Owners Association Limited was duly incorporated under the Companies Acts of 1948 and 1967.

The liability of Members is limited by guarantee but as a legally instituted Company it could carry out normal Company's business.

The normal annual business of the Association is in general to maintain and carry out all the interests of the sheepfarming community which compose its membership, and where necessary to approach Government in any matter which concerns its membership. It also has authority to approach overseas bodies or companies.

The Falkland Islands Sheep Owners Association is operated for day to day business by an Executive Secretary who is answerable to a Board of Directors, seven in number, including a Chairman and a Vice-Chairman.

The Association is now in its 54th year of existence.

Stanley Benefit Club

The Stanley Benefit Club was formed in 1859 and is the oldest Club in the Falklands. As its name implies its function is a beneficial one, and members draw sick benefits during illnesses. The next-of-kin of a deceased member receives a sum to help defray the cost of burial.

Members pay a monthly subscription and, for a number of years, an entrance fee was levied – this latter fee was abolished about 30 years ago.

The sick benefits were a boon to members in the days when pay was low, and assisted in paying for medical examinations and medicines.

Celebrations were held in the Drill Hall in August 1959 to mark the Club's Centenary.

The Club has given a very useful service during the past 123 years, for which all members are grateful, but it is now in danger of closing down, as it is becoming increasingly difficult to recruit a Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer.

Stanley Sports Association

The first mention of horse-racing in Stanley was made by the Falkland Islands Magazine and Church Paper in 1907. The race meetings at that time were run at Whale Bone Bay. The 1910 meeting was the first to be held on the present course.

The most important race at each meeting is the Governor's Cup Race run over 700 yards. Records show that the first winner of this race was Mr. H. Clifton in 1907, and the first lady to win it was Mrs. S. Hadden on Sinfonia in 1953.

The Colony's Centenary Meeting was held in February 1933 when the Governor's Cup was won by Mr. J. Middleton on Bambina. Both jockey and horse again won the Cup at the December 1933 meeting.

His Royal Highness Prince Philip rode in and won the Sailor's Race in 1957 on Itata.

A combined meeting of the Stanley and Darwin Sports Associations was held on the 23rd February 1963 to celebrate the 50th annual meeting of the Stanley Sports Association, on this occasion the totalisator staff introduced the Tote Double for the first time.

History was made on the racecourse on the 28th September 1966 when a hi-jacked Aerolineas Argentinas D.C.4. landed there. The hi-jackers eventually surrendered to the Falkland Islands Defence Force and the D.C.4. was flown back to the Argentine. A good deal of repair work was necessary to the course after this incident.

From 1967 until the last meeting on 26th and 28th December 1981 the races were held and enjoyed by both spectators and jockeys, but the Argentine invasion on the 2nd April 1982 and occupation of the racecourse which they used as a mine and bomb dump and helicopter pad created havoc to the course and buildings. With the aid and enthusiasm of many volunteers, including the Army and British Jockey Clubs, much of the damage has been repaired in the short time available so as to ensure that we have a race meeting included in the programme of events to celebrate the Colony's 150th Anniversary.

The Falkland Islands Horticultural Society

On February 4th 1867 "A meeting was held in the Boys School Room in pursuance of an advertisement. His Excellency Governor Robinson was in the Chair and moved that a Society should be formed for encouraging improvement in Colonial produce. Seconded and carried unanimously." This was recorded in copper plate by the then Secretary in the "Minute book of Falkland Islands Improvement Society also Flower Show and Industrial Exhibition." This seed flourished, and, despite short gaps in its history, grew into the Horticultural Society we know today, having received the active support of successive governors and their ladies. Today the Society receives much popular support and each year it holds its Flower. Vegetable, Home Produce, and Gardens Show in Port Stanley with exhibits drawn from the whole of the Falkland Islands. Those who have viewed the hundreds of items exhibited each year do not doubt that the Falkland Islands Horticultural Society will continue "encouraging improvement in Colonial produce."

Sheep Dog Trials in the Falkland Islands

There are two recorded organised Trials held in Stanley just before the 1914-18 war. These are briefly noted in the Falkland Islands Church Magazine and were arranged by Harry Townson, then Inspector of Stock, and Roy Felton, Manager for Vere Packe at Fitzroy.

The first fully organised Sheep Dog Trials were held at the Colony's Centenary celebrations on February 14th, 1933 on a not very good course adjoining the racecourse and behind the Government bungalows. There were 15 entries and such entries were confined to one dog per person and a maximum of two dogs per farm. The rules were based on those used in Britain by the International Sheep Dog Society of Great Britain.

Since those official Trials of 1933, so great an interest was maintained on the West Falklands that Trials were held at all annual Race meetings on West Falklands from 1934 onwards, except during the war years from 1940 up to 1949, the year that West Falkland sports meetings were renewed at Port Stephens.

The Darwin Harbour Sports Association added Dog Trials to their annual Sports meetings in the early 1950's and Championship Trials, held each winter covering the first three dogs from each Association were begun in 1955. A third Association, the North Camp farms, maintained their Trials for about ten years, but this movement died some eight years ago, and at present the Championship Trials, held in midwinter are between six dogs - three each from the East and the West Falkland Associations.

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
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Rules of Racing.

ENTRIES.

SEE UNDER NOTICES.

STALLIONS are not permitted to run.

STARTING.

- 1. Jockeys will be called up by loudspeaker.
- 2. Every horse shall be at the Post ready to start at the appointed time, and all jockeys on arrival at the Post must immediately place themselves under the orders of the Starter, who has power to disqualify any jockey purposely making a false start.
- 3. The horses, so far as is practicable, must be drawn up before the start according to lots drawn prior to the race. The jockey drawing No. 1 must always be placed on the left hand (north) side at the Starting Post, other jockeys taking their places in consecutive numbers from the left.
- 4. The starter may use his discretion as to placing unruly horses.
- 5. Whip Swinging. Any jockey guilty of swinging his whip when competing in any race is liable to be disqualified immediately and warned off the Course.

DEAD HEATS.

6. Dead heats will be run off at a time to be decided by the Stewards.

WEIGHTS.

- Except in Gymkhana events and Ladies' races, horses must carry at least 10 stones 8 lbs. in weight.
- Jockeys must weigh immediately after the finish of the race or they will be liable to disqualification.

COMPLAINTS.

- 9. All complaints must, within five minutes of the finish of the race, be reported to the Secretary who will bring the matter before the Stewards. Notwithstanding the foregoing it is the duty of the Stewards to take immediate action with regard to any infringement of or offence against the Rules of Racing, irrespective of whether any complaint is lodged by an owner or a jockey.
- 10. The Stewards shall have the power to suspend, for any period, any owner or jockey who is guilty of fraudulently entering a horse, or in any way intentionally violating these Rules.


- 11. Maiden Plate. Open to all horses which have not previously competed at any Race Meeting in the Falkland Islands.
- TROTTING RACE. Open to all horses which have never won a prize in a trotting race. (2 laps of ½ mile each).
- 13. Open to all horses sired in the Falklands.
- PORT SAN CARLOS PRIZE. A horse having once won this race will be barred from further entry in this event. Jockeys to be under 21 or over 50 years of age.

- TROTTING RACE. Any horse breaking the trot must stop at once and turn round before proceeding. (2 laps of ½ mile each).
- Ladies' Races. All competitors in these races must carry at least 8 stones in weight.
- 17. Andrew Bruce Trophy. A horse having once won this race will be barred from further entry.
- Consolation Race. Open to all horses which have competed but which have not won a prize at this meeting, excluding Gymkhana events.
- 19. SALVADOR PRIZE. Open to all horses which have won a prize at this meeting.
- CHAMPION RACE. Open to all F. I. bred horses which have won a prize at this meeting.
- 21. TROOP RACES. Horses competing must be bona-fide shepherding horses.
- Berkeley Sound Plate. Horses imported exclusively for the purpose of racing shall be barred from this event.
- 23. Home Charm Young Jockeys' Challenge Cup. Jockeys to be under 25 years of age. The Challenge Cup to be held by the winner for one year.
- 24. ASSOCIATION RACE. Open to all S.S.A. officials including Totalisator staff.
- 25. Two must compete to make a race. A first prize will be given when two compete, a second when three compete, a third when four compete, and a fourth when eight compete.
- 26. Open to all horses entered in Races No. 1 or 3.
- 27. Musical Chairs. Competitors in this event must not use a leading rein (cabresto) exceeding 7 feet in length.
- 28. GRETNA GREEN. Mounted. Teams of 2. Entrants must draw for partners.
- 29. VETERANS' RACE. Competitors must be 40 years of age or over.
- 30. Armed Forces Chase. Competitors in this event must pass the vetting procedure of the Military Co-ordinator.
- 31. Tug-o'-war. The Men's Shield is held for one year by the winning team. A second prize will only be given if three or more teams compete. (11 to make a team.)
- 32. Riders up to the age of 15 years who have written consent of a parent or legal guardiau.
- 33. Bransfield Plate. Open to all F. I. Bred horses, other than first sires from imported racing stock, which have not competed at any previous Race Meeting.
- 34. WALDRON TRENAGE CHASE. Jockeys to be between 13 and 19 years of age.

GENERAL.

- 35. Prizes not taken within 3 months of the date of the meeting will become the property of the Association.
- 36. The decisions of the Judges shall be final.
- 37. Age of Competitors. Competitors in mounted events (Races 9, 11, 40, & 52 excepted) shall not be less than 15 years of age and in foot events not less than 14
- 38. Open to all F.I.B. ovimals other than first sires from imported racing stock
- 39. FIRST prize sommen in events 17 A and 24 A are barred from taking part in this race
