CITY OF AMOY

The *City of Amoy*, an iron ship with a Gross Registered Tonnage of 994, was built in the shipyard of Barclay, Curle & Co. and launched 1863.

The *City of Amoy*, a British barque of 994 tons under John SWAN with a crew of 28, arrived 8 September 1872, 59 days out from Glasgow bound for San Francisco with general cargo. She called in as her cargo had shifted. No clearance date was recorded. [SHI/REG/1] [B15; pg 372] The *City of Amoy*'s account was sent by J Langdon to his London Office 30 September 1872. [FIC/D3; 151]

The *City of Amoy*, a British barque of 990 tons built in 1863 was sold to Bramwell & Gardener, Glasgow in 1882 and renamed the *Amoy*.

"The Amoy from Paranagua for Valparaiso was totally wrecked on Point William on the 29th ult. in endeavouring to enter the harbour. The ship was unmanageable, owing to the foul conditions of her bottom, and the Master was acquitted at the enquiry...." [FIC/D8; 78-79 – Nov 1889]

30 October 1889: Frederick Cobb, Manager of the Falkland Islands Company Ltd applies on behalf of Captain Crouch of the late ship *Amoy* for an official enquiry into the wreck of the vessel on Point William on the 28th inst. [H44; 122]

2 November 1889: Evan Bowen wrote from the First & Last Hotel, Stanley to E Pakenham Brooks "...I have to inform you that my health is not in a state to stand any excitement and must therefore hope to be excused from attending the Enquiry on Monday" [H44; 126]

8 November 1889: J B Luchtenborg reported himself to Frederick Cobb, the German Consul in Stanley. [H44; 130]

11 November 1889, Shipping Master to Board of Trade: "...I have also to report that the British Ship "Amoy" No 45960 of the Port of Glasgow went on shore on Point William and became a total wreck on the 30th October ultimo, and the crew with the exception of James Mullen AB and J Luchtenberg AB are being sent on to Montevideo by this mail."

On the 30th October the British Ship "Amoy," of Glasgow was coming in for provisions and water, when she went ashore on Point William, and became a total wreck. The master and crew were safely landed in Port Stanley and left for Monte Video in S.S. Karnak

Tho "Amoy" was bound for Valparaiso with a cargo of 'Mate,'-and Mr. Williams of Stanley. who bought the wreck and cargo, has been very fortunate in salving a great portion of it.

The S.S. "Karnak" arrived here on the 7th November, eight days before her time. General cargo for Stanley.

Passengers for Stanley: P. Dunn, H. H. Cobb, C. Williamson, W. Mc.Gill, J. Poppy, T. Taylor, F. Howard, A. Sardella.

She remained here until the 11th and took away Captain's Crouch & Bowen of the "Amoy and Wm. Davie." James Walters, mate, and E. O'Brien, A.B. of the "Wm. Davie." G. Mc. Kenzie, mate, 3 apprentices and 13 seamen of the "Amoy." John Chambers 2nd mate, 1 apprentice and 4 of the crew of the "Arethusa," and Mr. Withers passenger by the "Amoy," Mrs. & Miss Rummel. Cargo for England, 173 bales of Sheepskins.

AMOY (2)

The Amoy, a British barque of 299 tons (master not recorded) with a crew of 9, arrived 17 August 1872 from London bound for San Francisco with general cargo. She cleared 19 August 1872. J Langdon, acting manager of the Falkland Island Company Ltd, stated that she had put in for water and that he was taking the opportunity to send a despatch by her to his London Office.
