With reference to my despatch No. 188 of the 7th November, 1916, I have the honour to forward herewith for your information a copy of a letter from the hadistrate. South Georgia, reporting the arrival of the S.S. "Woodville" at South Georgia, with plant and factory for Jesses P. Irvin and Sons, Limited, who whaling station at that Dependency.

- 2. Tith regard to the pelection of a site for lesses Irvin's whaling station, I have instructed the lagistrate that any available site in Cumberland Bay, not included in the leases to the Argentine Company, may be selected by the representative of Messes Irvin for the purposes of a wholing station, and that immediate occuration of same may be allowed pending the issue of a second lease to lesses Irvin. The terms and conditions of the lease are stated in the Colonial Office letter No. 8724/16 of 25th February, 1916, to Messes Irvin and Sons.
- 3. I have further instructed the Magistrate that the Argentine Company hold no exclusive right to Cumberland Hay. That any claim the Argentine Company may put forward in this respect must be considered alone within the terms and conditions of the leases granted

granted to the Company, that he is not to be bluffed by the local Manager of the Argentine Company, and that he is to give every facility and assistance to Pesses Irvin and Company in placing them in occupation of an available site within Cumberland Bay, should they so desire, or elsewhere.

Sir,

Referring to your letter No. 587/16 of 10th July
I have the honour to inform you that, the S.S. "Woodville"
has arrived at South Georgia with the plant and Factory
of Messrs Irvin and Company.

- Compania Argentina de Pesca, that this Company does not anticipate surrendering their lease at Jason Harbour nor will they exchange, and as I have not yet received definite instructions how to proceed in the matter, I advised the representative of Messrs Irvin to make a tour of the Island in order to see if a suitable site could be found elsewhere; the manager has now returned and informs me that, a suitable place could be found in Cumberland Bay, to the Wast side, which is about 8-10 miles from the Grytviken station, and would not interfere with the latter station, but again the representatives of the Compania Argentina de Pesca protest.
- 3. I do not see that the Compania Arg. de Pesca has any legal claim to the whole of Cumberland Pay as they apparently imagine, their lease states 500 acres of land situate in Grytviken Harbour, in Cumberland Bay, and in the same way as at Stromness Bay, where there are three companies all working together and in close proximity to

each other, so there could be at least another Company at Cumberland Bay; the Manager is prepared to await the arrival of the Coronda from Falkland Islands before taking any steps in the matter, and failing further instructions by the Coronda, will proceed to Prince Olafs Harbour and make the best possible arrangements there.
