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LORD LLOYD.

Government and the High Commissioner's

Resignation.

- Report and Discussion.

In the report submitted to the House of Commons on the resignation of Lord Lloyd, High Commissioner of Egypt, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, the Right Honorable Arthur Henderson, gave several instances where divergencies of views had been shown. It was these considerations which led his predecessor, Sir Austen Chemberlain, to issue two days before the General Election a complete restatement of principles to Lord Lloyd, whereby the Government had decided to conduct relations between this Country and Egypt. In numerous instances the High Commissioner was clearly out of sympathy with this object and the only thing to be done was to intimate to him that the Government was disatisfied with the position as it had obtained during the past three or four years.

Differences Unbreachable.

His intimation to Lord Lloyd was :- "In the short time at my disposal since taking office, I have endeavoured to review in their broad outline the sequence of political events since 1924. To be quite candid, I feel I am bound to tell you I have been impressed by the divergence of outlook which has, from time to time, been apparent between my predecessor and your Lordship. That this difference was sincere I do not for a mement doubt but I confess it appears to me to be so wide as to be unbreachable. The success of my policy which will certainly not be less liberal than that of my predecessor, will depend on the extent to which it can be interpreted with understanding and sympathy by His Majesty's representatives. In the light of tecent correspondence I should be lacking in frankness did I not warn you that the possibility of your views harmonising with either of those of myself or my predecessor, appear to be remote and in the circumstances I should like to discuss the situation with you on your return."

Lord Lloyd arrived in England a week ago and the position was discussed with Mr. Henderson after they had been together half an hour Lord Lloyd handed in his resignation.

Premier's Tribute to Lord Lloyd.

Mr. Ramsay MacDonald paid a tribute to Lord Lloyd who, he said, went to Egypt under the most difficult circumstances. He had a great task imposed upon him and when Sir Lee Stack met his death at the post of duty, Lord Lloyd was asked to fill one of the most difficult positions in the British Empire. He accepted it and did what he considered to be his duty but he - Mr. MacDonald - claimed that the Government administering the affairs of a Colony or Dependency must have complete and full confidence in its representatives.

Healthy Activity Between Parties.

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Mr. Churchill, Ex-Chancellor of the Exchequer, said that the reading of the correspondence between Lord Lloyd and the late Foreign Secretary had undoubtedly produced a wrong impression of the actual relations between the Parties concerned. Lord Lloyd as the man on the spot, facing difficulties and risks, naturally had his point of view. That was there in Mr, Henderson's oration to show anything but healthy, active and closely reasoned discussion between the two Parties.

FIRST CHANNEL FLYER.

M. Bleriot's 20th Anniverscry.

M. Bleriot, who twenty years ago made the first flight over the English Channel, celebrated the anniversary on Sunday by flying across again. He made the journey in one of the latest machines of his own design - a twin engine bomber, Madame Bleriot also crossing in a separate machine. Eleven aeroplanes of the British Air Force escorted them into Dover where they were warmly greated by the Mayor and Sir Sefton Branker, Director of Civil Aviation.

The machines then proceeded to Groyfon where the French diman and his wife were received by Lord Thomson, Air Hinister, and represente ativos of Imperial Airways, the Royal Aero Club and the Royal Aeronautical Association. They were the guests of honour in the evening at a dinner celebrating the seventh International Aero Exhibition at which many other pioneers of aviation were present, including Sir Arthur Whitten Brown, who with the late Sir John Alcock, made the first aeroplane flight across the Atlantic.

In Twenty Yours' Timo,

In conversation M. Bleriot said that whereas twonty years ago it took him thirty seven minutes to fly the Channel he had now come across in twolve. His original flight was made in his twanty-five horse power monoplane which carried only one person whilst on this occasion he had come in a twin-engined monoplane of one thousand horse power and carrying several persons. Great as had been the advance of Aviation in the past twenty years it would be equally as great in the next twonty. By 1949 he believed there would be safe and regular services of air liners flying between London and New York as there are to-day between London and Paris.

COLMUNIST ROUND-UP.

Paris Police Activities.

One of the most successful round-ups carried out in Paris for a long time took place on Saturday. The homes of many prominent agitators in the City were raided and large quantities of documents seized.

Two of the agitators particularly sought, Semard and Lommousseau left France two or three days previously and arrived safely at Moscow.

As the result of an important conference in the Palace de Justice held between M. Bartion, the Minister for the Interior, and M. Tardieu, the Prefect of the Police and high judicial police officials, it has been decided that all allegod red ringleaders at present detained, should be brought up for trial for plotting against the safety of the State - a charge equivalent to high treason in war time. Several Trudes Union chiefs are among those arrested.

THE MINIC BATTLE.

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The mimic battle between a contingent from M.H.S. "Durban" and the Defence Force which took place yesterday, will be reported upon as soon as the offical result is at hand.

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Explosion on Cruiser "Devonshire'.

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Ten men were killed as the result of an explosion in a gun turret on the British cruiser "Revonshine" which is patrolling the Eastern Mediterraneun, on Saturday. Seven men have since died from injuries.

The funeral off ten of the gictims took place at Volo, in Greece, on Monday full military honours being rendered by the Second Army Corps of the Greek Army.

REPARATIONS CONFERENCE.

To Be Held At Hague.

It is now settled that the Conference on the Reparations and the Evacuation of the Rhineland will be held at Hague beginning probably, on August fifth or sixth. In addition to there being present delegates of Britain, France, Germany, Belgium, Italy and Japan, the Governments of Greeco, Rumania, Yugo-Slavia, Poland and Portugal are expected to send representatives. The United States Government have been invited to participate in whatever form they desire.

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"IDEAL COUPLE"

DIVORCED.

Dr. Joseph Blaki, a distinguished American surgeon Well-known for his work in France during the War, has surprised New York society with the announcement of his deverce from the former Mrs. Clarence MacKay and murriage to Miss Florence Drake.

The marriage with Mrs. MacKay was widely discussed in 1915 and they were always spoken of as an ideal couple. Norreasons have been given for the divorce and the records have been scaled by the order of the S Supreme Court of Justices.

APERICAN GOLR.

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Over two hundred entries have been received for the American Open Golf Championship which is to be played at Delmonte, California on September 2nd. Among the entries received are those of Tolley, the Sritish champion, and Bobby Jones.

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FOURTH TEST MATCH.

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The fourth Test Match between England and South Africa began on Saturday at Manchester, England scoring 437 for the loss of seven wickets.
