DALADIER TO THE FORE.

A message from Paris states that M. Daladier has accepted the President's invitation to form a Cabinet and it is anticipated that it will be completed to-day.

Daladier announced that "It is my intention to form a Government of vigorous and respected men which will re-establish the authority of the State and an unshakeable confidence in the destiny of the Republic."

Unofficial forecasts indicate that Daladier will become the Minister of National Defence, combining the Ministries of War and Marine. The number of ministries is expected to be reduced and Chautemps will not be included.

INDIA & LANCASHIRE.

A feature of the opening meeting of the Indian Cotton Committee at Bombay on Monday was the distinctly friendly tone of all the speeches which expressed the desire to overcome the difficulties waylaying the achievement of a settlement with Lancashire.

Lord Brabourne, Governor of Bombay, said that Lancashire now realised how much she stood to gain in improving her commercial position if she extended her purchases of Indian cotton.

BAIKAN PACT PROGRESS.

A report from Belgrade states that the Foreign Ministers of Rumania, Turkey, Greece, Jugo-Slavia are meeting there on Friday with a view to reaching an agreement on the Balkan Pact.

It is understood that the Pact will be definitely signed at this meeting whether Bulgaria agrees to come in or not.

From Bucharest it is reported that Titulesco has resigned following Premier Mushenoff's refusal to sign the Pact.

NO MONARCHY FOR GERMANY !

Hitler's Two Hours Speech.

The prominent features of Hitler's long awaited speech on the anniversary of his accession to power, given in Germany on Monday, were conciliatory overtures to France and the dismissal of the royalist hopes by declaring that the nation had no need for a monarchy.

Referring to his foreign policy Hitler said he hadn't given up the hope that the will of France and Germany would result in a real amity with the final burying of the historical war hatchet.

He hoped the Saar problem would be settled in a spirit of mutual understanding without a plebiscite, regretting that France did not share this view. The questions of equality were not an attack on French security and it was significant that Britain was endeavouring to pave the way towards such an understanding.

While the relations between Austria and Germany were not satisfactory the fault was not Germany's and the assertion that violation was planned was absurd.

Dealing with home affairs the Chancellor said that the National Socialist Government did not mean disrespect for other people or races but their intention was to keep their own race pure.

THE FRENCH CABINET.

A late message from Paris states that in announcing the new Cabinet Daladier pointed out that he had not troubled about party calculations and personal antagonisms but that he was endeavouring to form a government of reform and republican authority to end mistakes "if necessary, with ruthlessness and full publicity", with speed and with vigour.

The general opinion in the capital is that if Daladier had been able to fulfil his original plan the chances of putting his policies into force would have been excellent but the various parties have now prohibited the use of a free hand and the new Cabinet embodies neither personality nor independence.

The Cabinet consists of : - Foreign Office - Daladier, Justice - Penancier, Interior - Frot, Finance and Budget - Pietri, War - Fabry, Marine - de Chappedelaine, Air - Cot, Education - Berthod, Commerce - Mistler, Posts Bernier, Public Works - Paganon, Agriculture - Queville, Pensions - Ducas, Health - Lisbonne, Labour - Valadier, Overseas - de Jouvanel, and Mercantile Marine - Lachambre.

U.S.A. GOLD NATIONALISATION.

According to a report from Washington President Roosevelt has signed the Gold Bill and subsequent to this he issued executive orders governing the nationalisation of all gold.

When the Treasury gold transfer is completed the President will issue a proclamation definitely fixing the dollar's new value in terms of gold but the devaluation announcement is not expected for a day or two.

The Senate has approved of the Navy Programme providing for the building to full treaty strength at an estimated cost of 616,250,000 dollars.

The Senate Banking Committee is opening its investigation into the New York Stock Exchange next week.

THE FRENCH QUOTAS.

The French attitude relative to the Quotas is unrelaxed inspite of the British Note and semi-official opinion takes the view that "the new trade policies are to be applied to all" with the citation of the United States and Belgium as being countries making important concessions adding, "We are prepared to bargain but not to make presents."

A Cardiff message states that France has restored the 100 % coal quota.

A Dublin report states that the Irish Free State's trade returns for December last show an increase in the adverse balance of £427,000.

ANOTHER EGG RECORD.

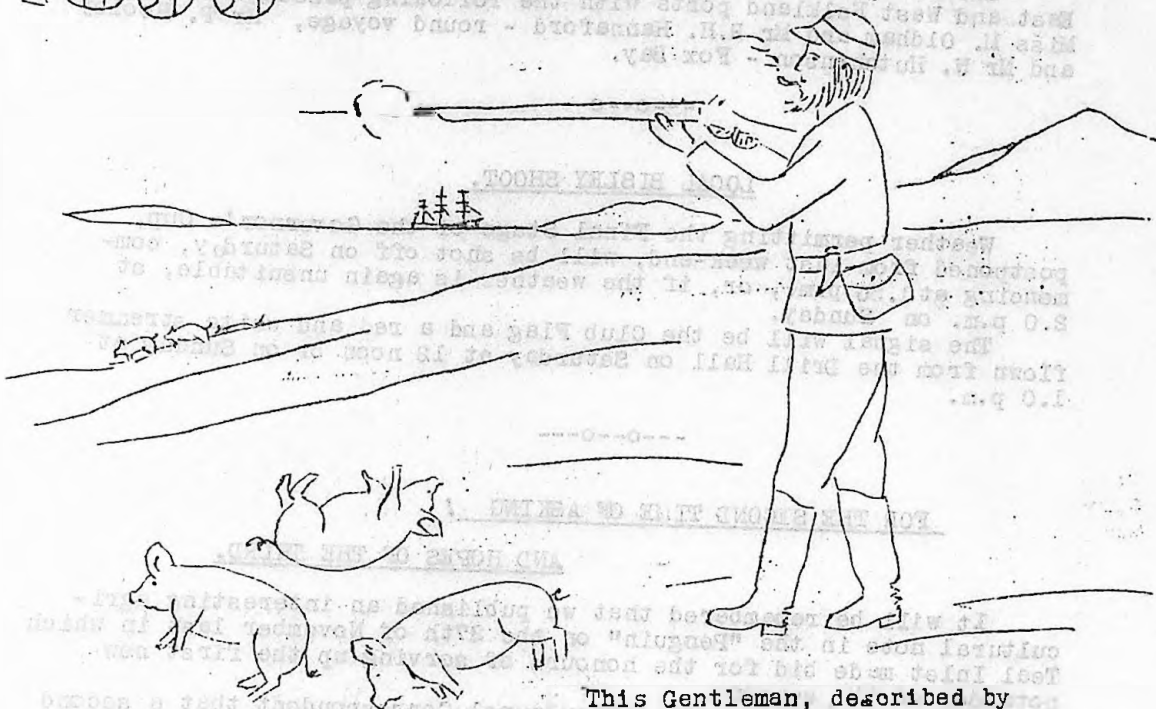

GERMAN SNUB FOR AUSTRIA.

The German reply to the Austrian allegations of German complicity in the Austrian Nazi campaign is a complete refutation, adding that German opinion is that the dispute is unsuitable for international settlement.

FRANCE'S REPLY TO QUOTA NOTE.

The French reply to the British Note on the Quotas was delivered to the British Embassy in Paris on Thursday but though the details are not officially disclosed it is understood that no satisfaction has been given to the demand for the full restoration of the Quotas, with the point stressed that it is essential for France to make good the deficit on her trade balance.

Another source of information states that France may be reluctantly compelled to denounce the 1882 Trade Treaty if Britain carries out reprisal threats.

THE POPE & PATRIOTISM.

In the first press interview granted by the Pope since his accession, the Holy Father commented on Thursday upon the outlook of peace, stating that the exterior negotiations which have settled the apparent relations between the nations should be changed for sincere sentiments of fraternal charity.

He deplored "excessive militarism" in youth, particularly in girls, which was "contrary to the designs of human nature", under the colour of real patriotism. Commendable in itself, patriotism could be a disquieting influence when it exalted the nation above everything.

OPINIONS ON BRITISH MEMORANDUM.

So far no official comment has been received in London on the British Disarmament Memorandum from the European capitals where intense interest has been aroused, says the Daily Telegraph.

But the press comments are summarised as follows :

France universally condemns Britain's saving Germany at France's expense; Germany, though welcoming the British attitude, notes that the principle of equality in air armaments is not observed and the publication of proposals at this stage is likely to lead to a generally confused discussion; Italy expresses warm appreciation of Britain's collaborative efforts for disarmament.

A Moscow message acknowledges the Soviet's reception of the British Memorandum - and that's all.

ITALIAN VIEWS ON DISARMAMENT.

Correlative with the British White Paper on Disarmament, Mussolini's proposals, which were communicated to Sir John Simon on the 3rd of January last, were published on Wednesday night. They suggest that immediate action should be taken to end the deadlock and the limitation of arms at the present level.

The Duce insists that time presses and urges that all interested powers should reach an agreement for arms' limitation without further delay, the agreement remaining until 1940 and embracing the abolition of chemical warfare, the prohibition of bombardment on civil populations, limitation at the present levels of the military expenditure of powers not bound by the peace treaties and the limitation of land war materials to present quantities.

The Italian Memorandum points out that Germany, by limiting her demands for equality to defensive weapons, made Disarmament the sole task of the armed powers and each State must now take up a definite position as there are unmistakable and manifold signs that if the solution is further postponed re-armament would cease to be a debateable question.

GERMAN MILITARY RIGHTS.

Describing Hitler's Reichstag speech as a "popular harangue" the "Echo de Paris" comments that if satisfaction is given to Hitler then German re-armament would be accepted as if by international right and the French army be limited under the pretext of stopping Germany's growing power from going beyond the present level.

The "Republique" adopts a more conciliatory attitude by stating that the Polish Entente has dissipated some of the French anxieties and urges the furthering of negotiations with firmness and good faith, and, if Germany was sincere all the friends of peace would rejoice.

A Brussels message states that the right wing senators discussed German re-armament on Wednesday and the party adopted a resolution declaring itself against a policy of giving Germany permission to increase her military effectives.

STERLING STANDS FIRM.

Impregnable as the Rock of Gibraltar sterling withstood all attacks in the New York Money Market on Thursday and while foreign exchanges were confused at the opening sterling regained a nominal loss and thereafter remained stationary while the dollar failed to decline in relation to gold currencies.

The largest trading volume since last July was registered on the Stock Exchange and 4,500,000 shares were turned over with the Government Bonds and Commodities strong.

It was reported from Washington that both hope and anxiety has been aroused by the President's policy and it is realised that this most important step ever undertaken relative to the monetary system is intended to bring back the commodity prices to the 1926 level, but the theorists' battle concerning the probable results continues and the rising prices have already had an effect on the United States living costs.

ROYAL MEDALS FOR POETRY.

An Empire Honour.

We have received from the Poet Laureate, Mr John Masefield, through the Colonial Secretary's Office the following announcement which we have much pleasure in publishing :

"The King has graciously signified his intention of offering each year a gold and silver medal for poetry in the English language published in volume form within the Empire by British citizens.

"The following committee has been appointed by the King to act as judges :

"Mr John Masefield (Poet Laureate), chairman, Mr Laurence Binyon, Mr Walter de la Mare, Professor Gilbert Murray and Mr I.A. Richards.

"A small sub-committee will be appointed abroad to recommend books from India, the Dominions and Colonies.

"The Medals will be awarded towards the end of each year for works published during the preceding year. The first awards will be made in December, 1934, for works published during 1933.

"The medals will be given either for a poet's first or second volume of verse or to a poet still under thirty-five years of age.

"The committee is empowered to withhold any recommendation for the medals in any year in which they consider the work submitted is not of a sufficiently high standard.

"Only works that have been published in volume form will be considered, and all communications relating to these medals should be addressed to the Poet Laureate."

The Poet Laureate adds a note that any eligible books or recommendations of books sent to him at Pinbury, Cirencester, Gloucestershire, will be examined.

BLUE RIBBON OF ATLANTIC.

Britain To Make A Bid For It ?

The important negotiations which have been taking place between the Cunard Steamship Company and the White Star Line are likely to have two important results. One is the completion of the unfinished Cunarder 534, on the Clyde, and the building of a sister ship, and the other is the elimination of competition between the Cunard and the White Star companies on the North Atlantic route.

This last result, it is understood, would be gained by the setting up of a new company in which each of the two companies would be shareholders. Such a scheme necessarily involves an enormous amount of thought and organisation, but it is understood that the negotiations between the two companies are proceeding satisfactorily.

The new company would approach the Government for financial assistance in respect of 534 and her sister ship. It is estimated that the 534 could be launched this year and be finished twelve months later. By that time the sister ship could be built and both vessels would be on the North Atlantic service by 1937. The projected new ships would eclipse in size and speed any vessels now plying on the Atlantic.

AMUNDSEN'S OLD SHIP.

News Of The Maud.

News was received in Oslo recently that Captain Roald Amundsen's old polar ship, The Maud, after having been left by its crew long ago, has drifted from Victoria Land, north of Canada, to a place about seven miles from Wainwright, Alaska, and is now frozen in the ice.

The Polar explorer, Captain Wisting, says that The Maud may eventually come out between Spitzbergen and Greenland, but that she may take two or perhaps three years to do it.

When The Maud returned from its long voyage in the Arctic in 1925 it was sold to the Hudson Bay Company and employed as a fur carrier along the North-West Passage until, a few years ago, it stranded in Cambridge Bay and was left there by the crew. It has been repeatedly suggested that the ship ought to be re-purchased by Norway, but sufficient capital has never been forthcoming.

The Hudson Bay Company paid 40,000 dollars for her. It would cost at least 100,000 dollars to build as strong an ice-ship to-day.

ISLANDS WITH ONLY 2 INHABITANTS.

Two of the Channel Islands, Jethou and Lihou, each had a population of two - one of each sex - on the Census night in 1931. This fact has been revealed by the volume dealing with the Channel Islands which was issued recently.

These couples had plenty of room to move in, for the Jethou pair shared forty-four acres and the Lihou pair thirty-eight acres.

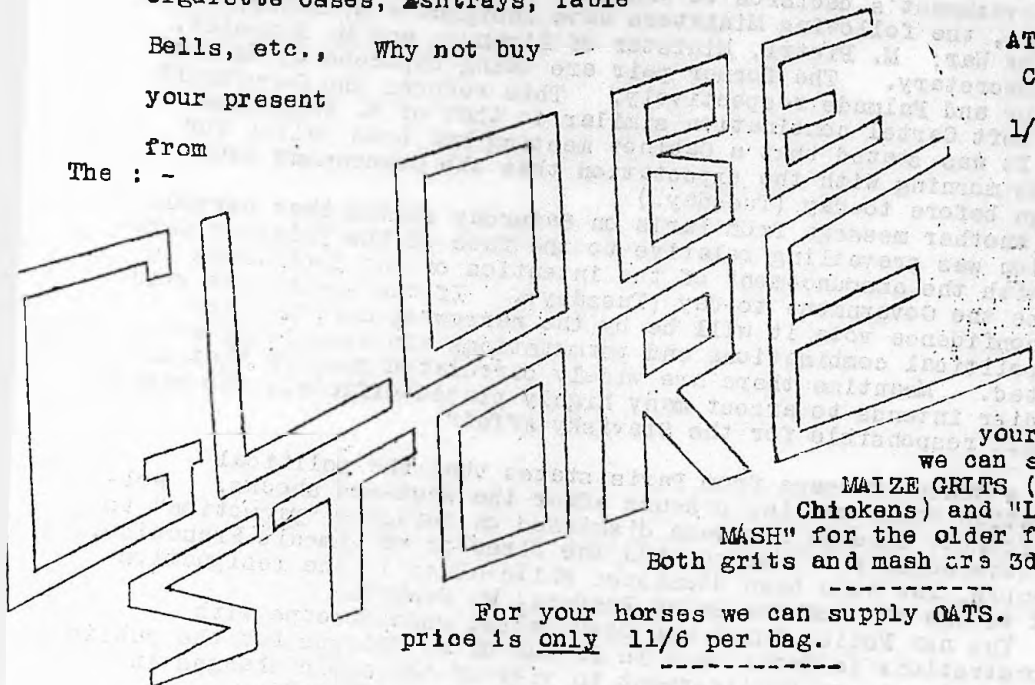

A SHORTLIVED REGIME.

French Government's End Expected.

A message from Paris on Saturday stated that following upon the Government's decision to transfer the Police Prefect, M. Chiappe, the following Ministers have resigned - M. Fabry, Minister for War; M. Pietri, Minister of Finance; and M. Doussaint, Undersecretary. The former pair are being replaced by Ms Paul Boncour and Palmade respectively. This reduces the Government to a Left Cartel combination similar to that of M. Chautemps.

It was stated that a Cabinet meeting had been called for Sunday morning with the expectation that the Government would resign before to-day (Tuesday.)

Another message from Paris on Saturday stated that nervous tension was prevailing relative to the fate of the Daladier Cabinet with the announcement of the intention of the Socialists to oppose the Government to-day (Tuesday). If the Government wins the confidence vote it will be by the narrowest margin since the political combinations and permutations are apparently exhausted. Meantime there are widely circulated rumours that M. Daladier intends to arrest many highly placed officials who might be held responsible for the Stavisky Affair.

A Sunday message from Paris states that the political situation still remains obscure after the week-end shocks. Police Prefect Chiappe has been dismissed on refusing "promotion" to the Governorship of Morocco and the Director of Comedie Francaise, M. Fabre, has also been dismissed while added to the resignation list is the name of the Seine Prefect, M. Renard.

The new Police Chief has been called upon to cope with demonstrations in Paris made in favour of M. Chiappe but the public attitude is one of bewilderment in view of the rapid changes in the personnel of the Cabinet and the Government's policy.

M. Daladier is uncertain as to whether he will be able to secure the confidence vote in the Chamber to-day (Tuesday) and M. Doumergue, who is mentioned as his successor in the event of his defeat, visited President Lebrun on Sunday.

THE BALKAN PACT.

Ministers Initial Text.

A news report from Belgrade on Friday last states that the Foreign Ministers of Turkey, Greece, Rumania and Yugo-Slavia were in conference on the Balkan Pact and the talks were proceeding favourably with various views being described as identical one with another. The terms of the Pact were expected to be decided upon definitely by Sunday while political circles were hoping for a formula to be evolved permitting of the admission of Bulgaria and Albania.

An official communique on Sunday announced that the Balkan Pact text had been initialled by the Ministers that day and it had been decided that the official signatures should be affixed at Athens during the week subsequent to the publication of the terms.

No reference, however, has been made concerning Albania and Bulgaria becoming signatories.

INDIAN RIOTS.

Fierce communal rioting broke out in the Punjab over the weekend, states a message from Sialkot on Saturday. At Kashmir Moslem demonstrators were parading the capital and members of the police have been stoned. The military were forced to fire upon a mob of 8,000 at Avantipur where an endeavour was made to wreck the Treasury.

The trouble is due to a dispute on religious grounds relative to camping sites.

A later message reports that a military curfew has been enforced in the Punjab and police patrols to reinforce the local patrols are arriving. Two people have been killed and nine injured in the clashes between the rioters and the police and the situation is still threatening between the Hindus and the Moslems.

Reassuring news has been received from the capital of Srinagar where concern was occasioned by the forming of a hartal but the situation is now under control.

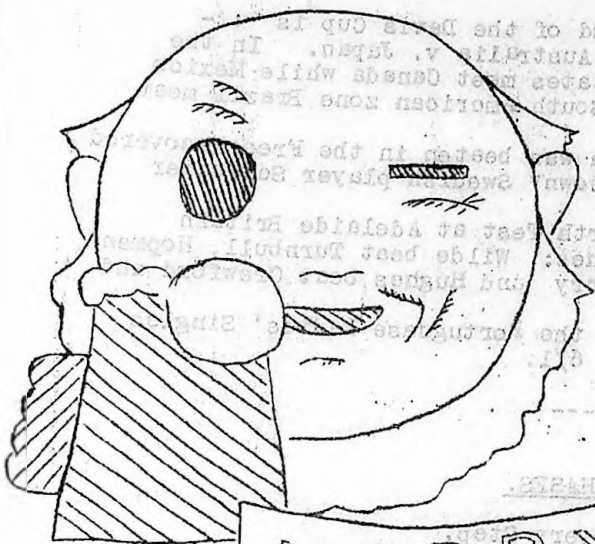

GERMANY REJECTS FRENCH PROPOSALS.

Germany has rejected the French disarmament proposals says a message from Berlin, the official text stating: "We have grave doubts whether a solution to the disarmament problems in accordance with justice and serving as an endurance for peace could be found along these lines."

The principal objections are: Germany would be restricted over a period of several years to the Versailles requirements while heavily armed States would retain their materials; the inequality of the number of troops; the non-allowance of an Air Force; the unfairness of the control system; and the lack of justification for continual discrimination against Germany.

GOLD PURCHASES.

America's Recovery Step.

A message from London reports that as a direct result of
President Roosevelt's gold policy the London gold price has reached
a new high level of 139/6 and, with wide fluctuations in the ex-
change rate, the dollar eventually reached its highest level for
three months.

Gold shipments amounting to several millions are en route to
the United States, including a million pounds' worth of bar gold
that had been flown from Amsterdam. From New York it is reported
that the purchases of foreign gold amount to 11,900,000 dollars
while official circles announce that the new policy is conceived
in no spirit of hostility to other nations but that it is being
engaged in as a means of general world recovery.

The ratio between the pound and the dollar is still uncertain
but inspired statements indicate that the private monetary talks
with Britain are either progressing or are about to begin with the
frank statement that a currency truce is preferred to a currency
war.

According to a Washington message the Senate has passed the
Johnson Bill forbidding private financial transactions with any
foreign government which is defaulting on war debts.

The United States Treasury returns indicate that the country's
public debt has increased during January by 1,254,000,000 dollars.

OLD BAILEY TRIAL OF

LONDON SALVAGE CHIEF.

The trial of Captain Eric Miles, the Chief of the London Salvage Corps, opened on Monday at the Old Bailey. Captain Miles has been apprehended on nine charges of conspiracy with the convicted fire raiser Leopold Harris to pervert the administration of justice, contravention of the Corruption Act, corrupt acceptance of money and effecting public mischief.

WILL DALADIER REMAIN IN POWER ?

A French Crisis.

According to a message from Paris a state of tension prevailed in the French capital on Monday with popular feeling running high in favour of the dismissed Police Prefect, M. Chiappe, while there was a report of intended demonstrations against the Government when the Chamber met the next day (Tuesday.)

Threats of trouble come from the Ex-Soldiers' Union, the Royalists, the Communists and the Fascists. But, notwithstanding many conflicting reports; it was officially stated on Monday that there had been no re-inforcement of the garrison while it was denied that a Tank Corps had been moved into the capital. The troops were ordered to remain in the barracks but the police forces were strengthened however, stated the Daily Telegraph correspondent.

The Chamber sitting was expected to be heated and to continue far into the evening. But according to the latest estimates Daladier was assured of a majority. The division was to have been taken at the end of the debate on a ministerial declaration and it was regarded as certain that the Socialists would now vote with the government.

RECOVERY ACT DISCOVERIES.

The Professors Points Of View.

In reviewing the operation of the American Recovery Act, eleven professors, under the chairmanship of Dr Murray Butler, the President of Columbia University, consider that it is based on "dangerous economic fallacies" of increased prices as a sign of increasing prosperity.

They suggest that free competition is for ever dead in the United States and urge the Government to pursue agreements for reciprocal tariff reductions. The report further suggests the importance of seeking an international monetary standard with an interim linking of the Federal Reserve System with the Bank of International Settlements while monetary stabilization "should be sought without delay."

The reports of the business leaders, issued through the National Association of Manufacturers, has also envisaged a "day of reckoning which may bring on worse conditions than any yet experienced."

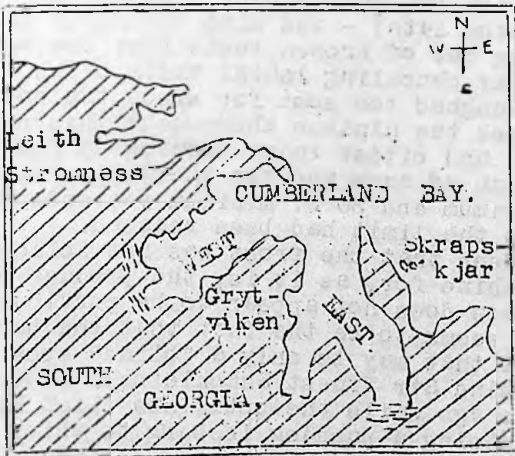

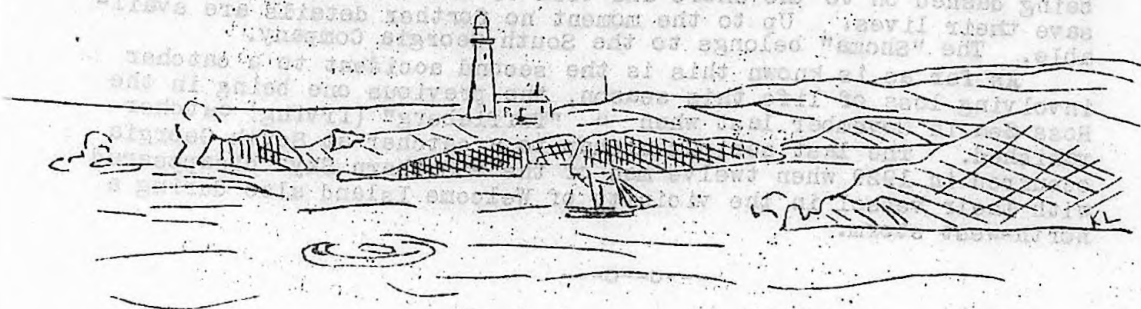

immediately made, the vessel being found apparently abandoned.

A careful search of the coast has been carried out and the lifeboat has been found bottom up but with no trace of the crew. A north-west storm was raging at the time and it would seem that the crew, with their vessel at the mercy of the elements, feared being dashed on to the shore and took to the boat in an effort to save their lives. Up to the moment no further details are available. The "Shoma" belongs to the South Georgia Company.

As far as is known this is the second accident to a catcher involving loss of life this season, the previous one being in the Ross Sea in November last when a "Taffleberg" (Irving) catcher vanished. The last serious mishap to a catcher at South Georgia occurred in 1929 when twelve men of the "Southern Sky" disappeared with their vessel in the vicinity of Welcome Island also during a north-west storm.

HOCKEYS.

The announcement in yesterday's "Penguin" about the opening of the Race Course next week reminded me that it was about time I made a tour of the stables for the latest information about form. In this I was disappointed for, try as I might, I could only get sulky answers "straight from the horses' mouths."

"On tuning in on Darwin we feel slightly comforted in learning that our friends in the Camp are mostly worse off than we from the point of view of shelter and so on, but handicapped as they are, they are hopeful of producing good form because King's 'Maggie' has been kept out there to show them the way home and they all want to pass the post before her if possible.

"If the weather should improve next week we may come out of our present snug quarters so as not to disappoint the sporting members of the public who will want to have their 'bob' on us in the Tote."

From the above readers will know the state of the horses minds and who can blame them? To get such awful weather when we were hopeful of a steady spell of sunshine makes us wish the races could be held when the weather was fine and not on a fixed date.

General O'Duffy said their objective was to free a peaceful and self-respecting people and to reunite a prosperous nation, declaring that de Valera had not the courage to leave the Commonwealth decently or stay in decently and the country was suffering as a result. The United Ireland Party's intention was to advance towards reunification and obtain an advantageous settlement of the financial dispute with Britain with a trade treaty securing favourable terms for Irish goods.

Mrs O'Driscoll, a sister of the late Michael Collins, said that General O'Duffy had seventy-five per cent of the country's women supporting him.

THE FRANCE UPHEAVAL.

Doumergue Takes The Reins.

M. Daladier resigned on Wednesday "to prevent further bloodshed" and M. Doumergue, the seventy-year-old ex-President, has agreed to endeavour to form a Ministry of National Union. M. Doumergue, at first, refused to act in response to the request of President Lebrun, but the former Premier, M. Laval, appealed to Doumergue's patriotism stating "The Chamber, Senate, Paris, Municipal Councils and all Frenchmen want you to return to the leadership."

M. Doumergue accepted and is now en route from Toulouse to take over his State duties. It is understood that his conditions are : That the general election should be postponed for six months but that the Chamber should be dissolved immediately.

The rioting was extended to the provincial centres on Wednesday and from Rouen, Lyons, Lille Arras and Nancy reports were received of demonstrations being held, marked with mourning emblems and in sympathy with those killed in the previous evening's encounters in Paris. Further rioting developed on Wednesday night but no details were available owing to censorship. The Government has issued a prohibition order on civil flying.

FEARS OF NEW MONETARY CRISIS.

Will France Go Off Gold ?

Excitement in the gold market, a London message reports, was reduced considerably on Wednesday, the amount sold on the market being reduced to £1,250,000. The flow of metal from the continent is also diminished although approximately £1,000,000 was being shipped on Wednesday, the bulk of which being by French liners though one ton arrived from Amsterdam.

Shipments to New York continue and the insurance companies are quoting 25 per cent as against the normal 1 per cent for the ordinary trans-Atlantic voyages.

Washington messages indicate that there is a fear that the present situation may force France off gold thus creating a new world monetary crisis but New York messages, based on Paris information, state that the United States Equalization Fund has been put into operation.

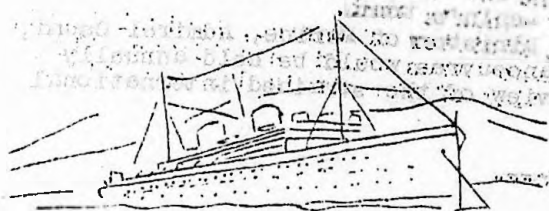

THE WHALER CATASTROPHE.

On the thirtieth anniversary of the Japanese attack on Port Arthur on Friday last, the Red Army paraded Moscow's Red Square. During a snow-storm 30,000 men and 585 tanks assembled and Stalin took the salute from the roof of Lenin's tomb.

Simultaneously the Japanese Minister of Marine, Admiral Osumi, stated in Tokio that the grand manoeuvres would be held annually instead of every three years in view of the strained international situation.

A message from New York on Saturday revealed that forty deaths had taken place in the United States, with seventeen in New York State, on Friday when the temperature was 14 degrees below zero and was the lowest recorded in the country's history.

KING ALBERT OF BELGIUM KILLED.

Mountaineering Accident.

It is with deep regret that we have to record the death of King Albert of Belgium. His Majesty was killed instantly at Marchelesdawas, near Namur, on Saturday.

The king who was a keen mountaineer, had motored to the scene with his equerry who remained with the car while His Majesty continued ascents in the vicinity.

The equerry, perturbed by King Albert's long absence, made an investigation but without results and then telephoned for the local officials who organised search parties in the falling darkness.

At 2.0 yesterday morning the body was found at the foot of a 250-foot crag, with a deep wound at the base of the skull, and a reconstruction of the tragedy shows that a rock, forming a handhold, had been split in recent frosts and had given way, throwing the king backwards into the ravine.

Early yesterday morning the Cabinet called an emergency meeting and have arranged for the funeral to take place on Thursday if the Crown Prince approves.

Crown Prince Leopold, who was holidaying in Switzerland at the time, was expected to arrive at Brussels last night. The Cabinet will continue to transact business until the new king takes the Oath of Accession.

A sympathetic message from London was broadcast throughout the British Empire last evening by Sir John Simon, Foreign Minister, and this message was picked up by Stanley Studio and relayed to local listeners. After the message a two-minute silence was observed in honour of the late king, concluding with the National Anthem of Belgium.

CLEARING UP IN PARIS.

The voting of the French budget is practically assured by the end of the month, a report from Paris affirms. The Chamber Finance Commission has approved of a Bill providing that the estimates be voted en bloc in a single division.

The Government secured on Friday a further confidence vote by 430/150 on their request for the objection of the amendment conferring judicial powers on the Commission of Inquiry into the Stavisky case.

As a result of the recent riots Paris Municipality must replace 456 lamp-posts, 260 traffic signs, 1,500 gratings, 160 seats, 50 trees, 20 newspaper kiosks, 11 clocks and many police cycles besides making good the damage to private property which is considerable.

A REICHSTAG FIRE MOVIE.

Following the granting of citizenship to the Bulgarians Dimitroff, Tanoff and Popoff who have been acquitted of complicity in the Reichstag Fire the Soviet, says a message from Berlin, have lost no time in befriending them.

The Soviet Ambassador handed a note to the Government in Germany on Friday requesting the freedom of the three men and permission for them to proceed to Russia, stressing that there are no further charges to be made against them.

THE STANLEY SPORTS MEETING.

"Bambina" Gets The Governor's Cup Again.

"Mr Jim" Wins The Douglas Plate.

Fine Fight For The Colonial Secretary's Plate.

Once more the Annual Meeting of the Stanley Sports Association has
come and gone, leaving in its trail, as always, a host of hints and
suggestions as to how future meetings could be conducted for the better-
ment of this annual holiday in Stanley.

For some time past the weather has been anything but propitious and
up to the morning of the first day of the meeting, Thursday, the 15th
instant, nobody could tell whether or not the elements would permit rac-
ing at all. Owing to the rain no chance of practice had been possible,
the course being prohibited as the Course Committee - quite rightly
too - feared that the track would so suffer as to affect the running of
the horses on the sports days. In consequence of this considerable
speculation was rife as to how the horses would respond on a track with
which they had had no opportunity of becoming acquainted.

To the great relief of all Thursday's weather could hardly have
been more suitable and though the number of runners this year proved less
than at previous sports - the Maiden Plate (open to horses which had
not run previously) and the 900 Yards Open having to be excluded because
of the lack of entries - the events were closely contested and full of
sporting rivalry.

On both days the attendances at the Sports were good and foremost
among the spectators was His Excellency the Acting Governor, accom-
panied by the Hon. M.C. Craigie-Halkett O.B.E. (Acting Colonial Secre-
tary). His Excellency showed himself keenly interested in the course
of events, not hesitating to express his appreciation of the conduct of
the meeting to the jovial and popular chairman of the Association, Mr
R. Greenshields.

The Horse Events.

"Bambina" only entered for three events this year but seemed to
have little difficulty in maintaining her reputation, taking the most
important trophy - The Governor's Cup - with the West Falkland Plate &
the Salvador Cup. These three prizes she also carried off last year at
the Centenary Meeting.

"Monty", Bob Hutchinson's well-known racer took most prizes this year and, in the most thrilling encounter of the day - The Colonial Secretary's Plate - he revenged himself on "Nini II" who beat him narrowly at the Centenary Meeting in the same event, "Nini II" this time being second. It was, however, only after a very stubborn fight including a dead heat, that this purpose was accomplished. As seen in Saturday's issue of the "Penguin" "Monty's" bag included the II Louis Williams Cup and the Stanley Challenge Cup with a second in the Weddell Cup.

Two outstanding surprises were the results of the F.I. Maiden Plate won by Bob Hutchinson's "Centenary" with G. Cletheroe up, and "Mr Jim's" gaining of the Douglas Plate from "My Lord" (A. Bonner up and owned by Mike McCarthy) with "Ramona" (M. Hardy owner and jockey) third. It will be remembered that "Centenary" won the prize in its class at the Centenary Stock Show last year.

"Mr Jim" whose fourth attempt this was to secure the Douglas Plate, had to compete against the veteran "Charabelle" (J. Butler up and owned by R. Greenshields) which, however, emulated the tactics of many favourites by coming in last. Some years ago "Charabelle" was one of the crack horses on the course. The first year of competing in this race "Mr Jim" took third prize, the second year the second prize, while last year he was unplaced. But at last, the one-time much fancied Caster has achieved success in this and we heartily congratulate Phil Hardy, his owner, and J. McKay the jockey.

Among other horses to the fore was Mike McCarthy's "Sally" with A. Bonner up, which won the San Carlos Prize and the Defence Force Club Race while L. Reive's "Nellie Gray" easily accounted for the two main trotting races in which she was ridden by H. Jennings and Miss Smith. In congratulating those successful we cannot conclude without commiserating with at least one of those not so fortunate, namely, Buss Aldridge's "España" whose presence we sorely missed. Dogged by misfortune "España", like Cockles with one eye, never gave up hope, but lameness brought her down at the end and she could not appear at all.

The Gymkhana And Foot Events.

Though the weather was cold and dull on Friday for the Gymkhana & foot events there was a better response to the call for entries even though the old favourites L.W. Aldridge (100 & 220 yards), F. Sullivan (440) and S. Bennett (1 mile) again took their respective events without being unduly harassed. Bruce Bonner and Phil Hardy, however, showed themselves to be promising athletes of whom more should be heard at subsequent meetings.

The Ladies' Mounted Race was won by Mrs F. Sullivan who beat her sister, Mrs L.W. Aldridge, by a short distance, while Miss Ada Short put up a good performance to win the Ladies' Foot event. The Military and V.C. races, won by C. Cletheroe and S. Aldridge on "Estrella" and "Dobbin" respectively, caused plenty of fun and uncertain wagering at the Tote while that hardy annual "Musical Chairs" with a bell, had lost none of its interest. Eventually it was won by L. Cletheroe on "Maiden". So popular was the Stepping The 100 Yards that a second "round" was arranged later in the day but even these did not create the same enthusiasm as was evinced in the tug-o'-wars. Mr E.J. McAtasney's team won their event but only after a herculean struggle which was a credit to their opponents, Mr Reive's team. The Ladies' tug-o'-war (Married versus Single) went to three pulls and perhaps provided the most interesting and exciting contest of the day with the Married 'Uns emerging victorious after much hard pulling and vociferous encouragement from the onlookers.

With such a finale it had seemed that at the last the old tone and spirit of the Stanley Sports Association's Meetings had recovered its pristine ebullience and that the feeling of disappointment that might have been gaining ground in the breasts of some could be relegated to the depths once more.

SUCCESS OF THE SOCIAL FUNCTIONS.

The Fancy Dress & The Official Dances.

While the number of entries at the Sports might have given temporary cause for alarm the numbers attending the social functions served handsomely to show that the old spirit of revelry and enjoyment was far from waning. All the dances were held in the Town Hall.

At the Fancy Dress Dance on Wednesday last, jollity was the keynote of the evening with many of the dancers appearing in fancy dress costumes which showed considerable ingenuity and skill, particularly since the majority of them were home-made. One of the most outstanding was that of the Breton Fishing Girl. Soon, however, one's attention was turned to sailors and soldiers of all nationalities of the imagination, pierrots and pierrettes, Harlequin and Carnival, Uncle Sam, Turks, Dresden Shepherdesses, Gypsies and golfers yet to be seen chasing the little pills, Eastern Princesses hob-nobbing with tramps, with an absent-minded professor "nursed" by Sarah Gamp and a real old sea-dog making many more knots round the hall than the more up-to-date road hog, muffled to extinction in furs and coats. Penguins studied form with jockeys while convicts studied "Moonbeams" and naval captains went their rounds with clowns.

Though no one could deny that the Fancy Dress Dance was as successful as any dance could be, it did not outdo the Official Dance of the Association held the following night (Friday) when His Excellency the Acting Governor attended, accompanied by the Hon. M.C. Craigie-Halkett O.B.E. (Acting Colonial Secretary) and Mrs Halkett, being welcomed by Mr R. Greenshields and Mrs Greenshields. The dance was most enjoyable and finally ended at 2.0 o'clock Saturday morning.

The Distribution Of Prizes.

Douglas Station's Public Spirit & Enthusiasm.

On Saturday evening the third dance was held for the purpose of the distribution of the prizes by His Excellency the Acting Governor. Again there was a good attendance and the applause accorded the winners as they received their awards from His Excellency was given unstintingly,

His Excellency, who was accompanied by the Hon. M.C. Craigie-Halkett O.B.E. and Mrs Halkett, was met by Mr Greenshields (chairman) and Mr V.A.H. Biggs (vice-chairman,) and introduced by Captain D.R. Watson (joint hon. secretary.)

In his remarks His Excellency said ; "Mr Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen. I thank you, Mr Chairman, the Executive Committee and the members of the Stanley Sports Association for your kind invitation to be with you here to-night. I am glad to present these handsome prizes to those who have done so well in winning them at the Sports Meeting which has just been concluded, but, before doing so, there are one or two things I want to say.

"This is one of the few occasions - occasions only too rare in the life of the Colony - when town and country meet and when we get together as a community, and in the name of the good people of Stanley I give very hearty greetings to our friends from the Camp (hear, hear.) I tell them how happy we are to see them and how we look forward to their coming and how their visit always seems to be so quickly past. I hope that at the next meeting of the Association we shall see them here again in still greater numbers and that they will bring their horses with them (hear, hear,) and by horses - I mean racehorses (laughter and applause.)

"I am not going into the very vexed question as to whether the Sports are better held at Christmas time or at this season of the year. That question I will leave to be decided at the proper time and in the proper place. But, frankly, the number of entries for the horse races this year was disappointing. If it had not been for the public spirit

and enthusiasm of Douglas Station, which Station sent in eleven horses, the events on the first day of the meeting would have been little short of a fiasco.

"Now, this meeting is the twenty-fifth of its series and I am sure there is no one here, no one in the Colony, who would not be disappointed and would not have a very deep feeling of regret if, on account of the insufficiency of entries for the horse races, the programme for the first day of the meeting had to be drastically curtailed.

"However, I will not be pessimistic. On the contrary, I feel confident that the next meeting, whenever it may be, will be crowned with as full a measure of success as have been the meetings in past years.

"In conclusion, Mr Chairman, let me congratulate the Executive Committee, the two Joint Honorary Secretaries and all the officials of the Association, not forgetting the unseen workers in the Totalizator Hut, on the admirable arrangements which were made and carried out in connection with the running of this Meeting (hear, hear.) It is for the enjoyment of the community that these gentlemen have given so much of their time and so much labour, and they indeed deserve, as they receive, the grateful appreciation of the community" (applause.)

Mr Greenshield's Response.

In thanking the Acting Governor at the conclusion of the prize-giving, Mr Greenshield spoke of the pleasure it gave him to welcome His Excellency back to the Colony again and thanked him on behalf of the Association for attending that evening to distribute the awards. They all knew that His Excellency was a very keen sportsman and took an interest in all sports and he only regretted that the shortness of time since His Excellency's return had not made it possible to include the prize given by His Excellency in the programme announcing the events.

Mr Greenshield, after commenting on the way fortune had favoured them as regards the weather and reiterating the Acting Governor's remark that the question of the date of future sports was a matter for decision later, touched upon the subject of the number of horses on the course. There were, he said, very few running and he supposed it meant the importing of more horses; people would have to get horses from somewhere otherwise the events could not possibly go on much longer for, more or less, the same horses were running every year.

Such a serious strain is generally foreign to Mr Greenshield's usual optimistic view and in breaking away from it he spoke more facetiously upon the popularity of the stepping of the 100 yards. That event, he affirmed, seemed to be the most popular. He, personally, liked it.

Continuing, the chairman, on behalf of the Association, thanked all the donors of prizes and the committees for all the work they had done this year, concluding in his own inimitable way with "Well, I know you people don't want to hear me talking much longer, because you want to get on with the dance. So, I will close now by asking you to give three hearty cheers for His Excellency who has come here to present the prizes."

Though the itch to trip the "light fantastic" may have been pre-eminent, needless to say the cheers were given with real appreciation of His Excellency's interest and keen support in the sporting activities of the Colony.

THE LATE KING ALBERT OF BELGIUM.

A message from London reports that His Majesty King George has telegraphed the following message of sympathy to the Duke of Brabant of Belgium :

It is with the most profound sorrow that I and my people have learnt of the tragic death of your illustrious father and I hasten to offer our heartfelt sympathy to you and all the people of Belgium. The British Empire can never forget the heroic figure whose courage was an inspiration through the dark years of the war and we will join Belgium in mourning our true friend and ally."

Prince George cabled condolences from South Africa and the Court has ordered a fortnight's mourning including entourages and the British Regiments of which King Albert was Honorary Colonel.

A British Prince will attend the funeral while President Lebrun, accompanied by Marshal Pétain, will represent France. Ms Doumergue, Harriot and Tardieu have already paid a visit to Brussels but returned to France yesterday.

Mussolini, Dolfus and Roosevelt have sent expressions of sympathy but the most remarkable of the world-wide tributes has been paid by the Belgian socialist leader, Vanderveide, who has declared that though a republican, he felt a sentiment for the late monarch stronger than friendship, adding the certainty that the heir to the throne would follow the course traced by his father.

All sports events and entertainments throughout Belgium were abandoned on Sunday and the vessels in Antwerp flew their flags at halfmast. The London Belgian Embassy flag was at halfmast while Broadcasting House and many churches made a special religious observance of the monarch's death.

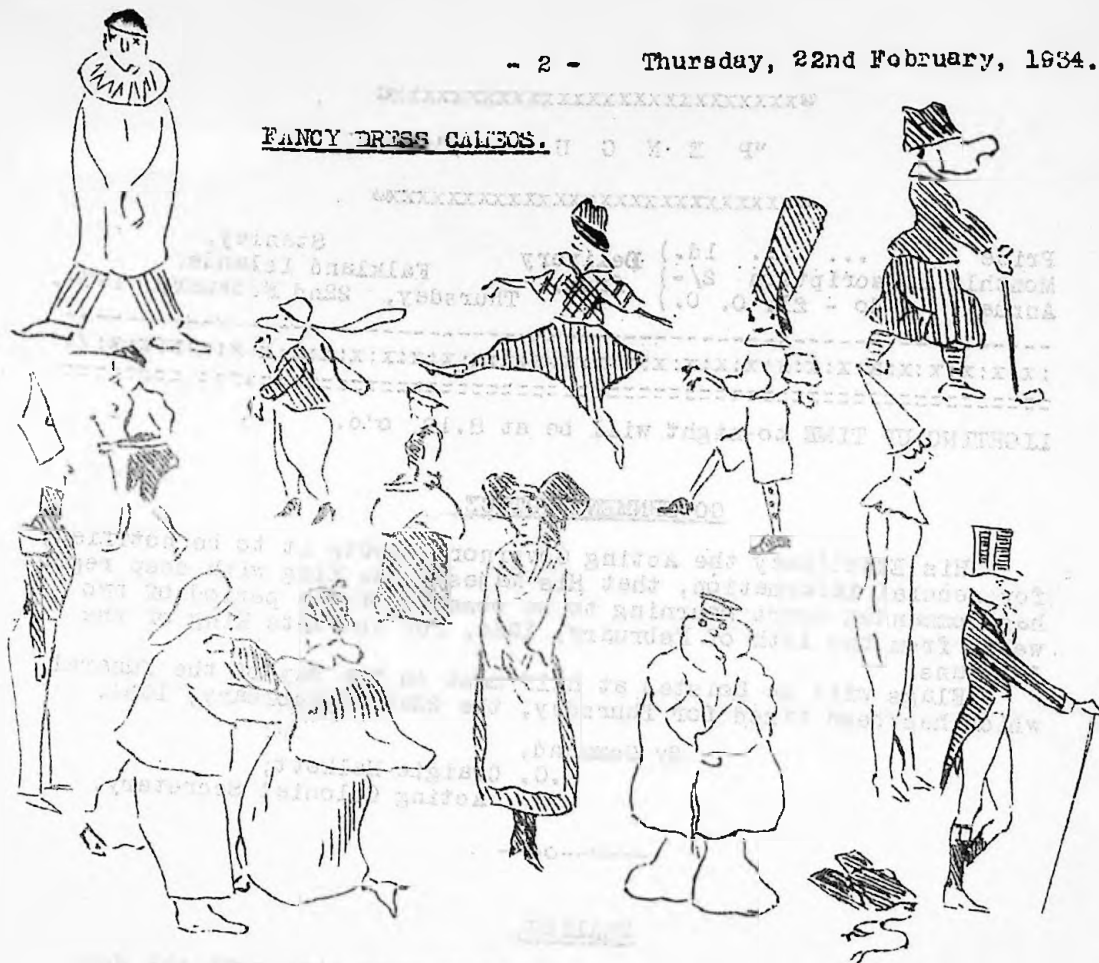

MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP.

In our issue of the 13th instant we made mention of the forthcoming resignation of the Bishop of the Falkland Islands and of His Lordship's Semi-Farewell Message to the Colony which we now publish ;

"I am writing this semi-farewell message to the Islands by means of the 'Penguin.'

"I am hoping also that Mr George Bonner will be good enough to take it out and carry it to the Dean. I am here in a Nursing Home at Clifton still lying in bed. I am, however, gradually improving and have been out of bed to-day (the 2nd of January) to try and walk in a splint by means of crutches. After being in bed since July I am not very strong.

"I very much hope that I may be able to come to Stanley once more, but, on the other hand, it is quite possible that I may not.

"I have enjoyed every minute of these fourteen or fifteen years of my Episcopate. There was no Diocesan machinery on the Coast when I first came and, for reasons that I need not go into now, things were made very difficult. The former Archbishop of Canterbury (Archbishop Davidson) warned me of it and I found it as bad if not worse than I was led to expect. But with a little tact and judgment I got over it and after that the people both in these Islands as well as on the Coast became most hospitable and friendly and helpful.

"The matter of travelling also became difficult for these Islands were becoming more and more isolated. The reason why they had been attached to the West Coast was because of the frequency of the mail steamers and it was when the Panama Canal was opened that the trouble began for, of course, the vessels all went northabout.

"I have always taken a great interest in the additions to our Cathedral. Successive Deans have done their bit and not least the present Dean.

"Talking about the Cathedral I am glad to know that Dean Lumsdale has instituted Daily Evensong as well as Daily Matins and gets a little congregation. The Three Hours' Devotion on Good Friday was well attended two years ago; also celebrations on Saints Days and on each Thursday. He has visited with the help of Mr Baines every house in Stanley so he can be said to know his people. Mrs Lumsdale is a great help and gets about among the people. I am very grateful to Mr Baines who, although he could not remain in Stanley was a great help in letting the Dean make prolonged visits to the Camps. I should also like to say that I have received help and encouragement from the three Governors with whom I have been connected. They always helped the Church work in every way. The early installation of the electric light in the Cathedral was due to His Excellency Governor Hodson (Now Sir Arnold Hodson) who is Governor of Sierra Leone.

"On the matter of the Cathedral we all regret the death of Dean Brandon the first Dean. His name is a household word still.

"I have not resigned yet but have only given the Archbishop warning of my resignation. We are trying to decide upon a suitable successor.

"If I do not visit Stanley again, may I say that the Church does not consist of the Clergy only. The Clergy are the Officers and the People the Army - all fighting for the honour of the supremacy of the Lord Jesus Christ, our Great Elder Brother and King.

"May He bestow upon you all the Fulness of His Grace. That you may know Him more and recognise the claim that He has upon you, in that He has called us out of darkness and brought us into the Marvellous Light, and may the Blessing of God Almighty, The Father, The Son and The Holy Ghost be with you all.

January, 1934.

N.S. Falkland Islands."

THE LATE KING OF THE BELGIANS.

A message from Brussels states that in view of the late King Albert's expressed wish for no State funeral in the event of death, it has been decided to make the ceremony as simple as possible, but there will be representatives of all nations at the ceremony which takes place to-day (Thursday.)

With the Prince of Wales representing King George, the British Navy will be represented by Admiral of the Fleet Sir Roger Keyes, with a detachment of the Nore Command and the Chatham Division Royal Marines Band, and the Army by Field Marshal Lord Allenby with seven officers and 100 other ranks of the Royal Inniskilling Dragoons of which the late King was Colonel-in-Chief. The Royal Air Force will also be represented.

Among the foreign representatives will be President Lebrun and Marshal Petain (France); Von Kallar representing President Hindenburg and Germany, Brussels having made no reply to the ex-Crown Prince's expressed anxiety to attend; Prince Humbert of Italy; King Boris and Prince Cyril of Bulgaria; Crown Prince Olaf and Princess Martha of Sweden; Prince Paul of Yugo-Slavia; His Majesty the King of Siam; Prince Nicholas of Rumania; Prince Axel of Denmark; General Kowarzewski of Poland; the London Minister of Czecho-Slovakia; the Foreign Minister of Portugal; and M. Standman of Esthonia.

U.S.A. BLIZZARDS HAVOC.

According to information received from New York violent blizzards have cut off the New England cities with all means of transport utterly dislocated. A ten inches fall from the eastern seaboard has paralysed the traffic and temporarily suspended the opening of the Stock Exchange with four-foot drifts mounting along the Broadway.

Business has been suspended owing to the inability of suburban dwellers to reach the city while schools are closed owing to the lack of pupils. Several long distance omnibuses are missing.

At Brookville, Pennsylvania, a fire broke out in the Memorial Home for the relatives of war veterans and as a result the institution has been razed to the ground with a death-roll of ten women.

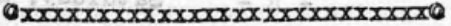
It will be seen that this year holds the record for this period though it is only by the narrow margin of four days that it has beaten the early fall of 1924.

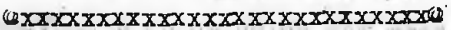

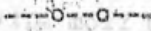

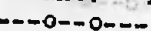

THE LATE KING ALBERT OF THE BELGIANS.

Deeply Impressive Funeral Ceremony.

Prior to the funeral of the late King Albert of the Belgians on Thursday, a procession of 30,000 ex-soldiers filed past the palace in regimental formation, the first lines passing at 7.30 in the morning. Their standard bearers subsequently fell out taking their station for cortege duties where the colours of Belgium, Britain, France and Italy were seen in place.

Troops lined the route from the palace to Sainte Gudule and ex-soldiers from the church to the crypt. All church bells were tolling during the procession which was headed by mounted gendarmes. Then followed in this order the First Regiment of Guides, the British Fifth Inniskilling Dragoons, Marines and Air Force, the French Marines, Chasseurs, Infantry, and Air Force, and the American combatant representatives.

The coffin was borne on a gun-carriage drawn by six black horses with the following as pall-bearers - Mr Digneffe and Poncelet, the Presidents of the Senate and Chamber, Comte de Broqueville, the Premier, the Ministers of Justice and Interior and three Belgian Generals with His Majesty's charger "Titanic" following. On foot were Princes Leopold, Charles and Umberto, the French President, M. Lebrun, King Boris of Bulgaria, the Prince of Wales and then delegations of foreign princes and other high personalities and judicial authorities with the touching spectacle of three Swiss alpine guides bringing up the rear carrying ice-picks and mountaineering cords across their shoulders. Two artillery regiments closed the procession.

Although good order prevailed the pressure of the crowd along the densely packed route was such that the barriers were broken in many places and the ambulances were kept busy.

The Prince of Wales remained in Belgium for the Accession Ceremony which was held yesterday when the Duke of Brabant was crowned King Leopold the Third.

Memorial services were held throughout South America, Canada, the United States, Australia, Europe and in outlying British Colonies on Thursday.

A Brussels message on Thursday stated that the Nationalist Flemish deputies in the Chamber had decided to absent themselves when King Leopold took the Constitutional Oath on the pretext that they "had nothing to do with this Belgian Ceremony."

They were given to understand that in the event of a demonstration at Friday's ceremony prompt expulsion would be certain.

GERMANY & DISARMAMENT.

According to a message from Berlin the official communique issued at the conclusion of Mr Anthony Eden's visit says "Some progress has been made in the way of a disarmament convention" while it is understood that Germany tentatively accepts the British Memorandum as a possible basis of agreement.

H.M.S. Exeter has a displacement of 8,400 tons with a draught of 18 feet 4 inches. Her length is 575 feet with a beam 58 feet and she can develop a speed of 32 knots. Her armament consists of six 8-inch guns, four 4-inch, high angle guns with six 21-inch torpedo tubes besides two Fairey III F seaplanes mounted on two catapults.

The ship was laid down at H.M. Dockyard Devonport on the 1st of August, 1928 and was launched on the 18th of July, 1929 being first commissioned for service on the 21st of July when she served with the Atlantic Fleet. She has a complement of 45 officers and 532 men.

GERMANY COMPLETELY AIR MINDED.

According to a press message from Berlin, General Goering is losing no time in giving practical effect to his declaration that Germany "must become a nation of flyers."

General Goering has circumvented this prohibition by the creation of a "German Air Sports Association" to control all private flying, states the Sunday Times correspondent.

Every German boy and girl physically fit is being examined and classified and schooled in aviation. Theoretical training begins at the age of twelve and actual flying at sixteen.

Thorough and successful preparations are being made to take full and immediate advantage of any concession obtained through a disarmament convention.

POPE SPEAKS AGAINST HITLER.

In addressing a group of cardinals and prelates assembled on Saturday at the Vatican for the reading of a decree for the canonisation of the Blessed Conrad of Parszhan, a German, the Pope attacked the present "pagan tendencies" in Germany and uttered his first public criticisms of the Hitler regime.

He said that there is in Germany an exaltation of thoughts, ideas and practices which are neither Christian nor humane, and the exaltation of pride of race which can only produce pride of life contrary to the Christian spirit and the spirit of humanity.

THE AIR ESTIMATES.

According to the Daily Telegraph the Air Estimates being presented to Parliament shortly leave Britain's aerial defence on a still greater level of inferiority compared with other powers.

The estimates will provide for the addition of three regular squadrons and the slight strengthening of minor units, bringing the total strength to forty-five squadrons which is seven squadrons below the minimum considered necessary for safety in 1923.

There is a growing opinion among government supporters that there should be an addition of at least ten squadrons with a future extension of the programme based on the action of other powers.
