For your guidance I submit in synthesis, report of meeting held in Colonial Secretary's Office on Monday 25th. August 1958 requested by the Stanley Town Council to explain to Government the actual situation of the Stanley Fire Brigade.

Those present were:Mr S.G.Tress the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary-The Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the Stanley Town Council, Messrs J.Allan and H.F.Luxton respectively, Mr D.J.Clark the Town Clerk and the Chief Constable.

Both the Chairman and Deputy Chairman of Council gave an outline of the present position to Mr Trees, pointing out the lack of equipment and the general disorganization of the Fire Brigade. Mr Clark stressed the importance of organizing the Brigade and suggested that Government forma nucleus from its own personnel, to place the Brigade on a sound basis. This staff could fill key positions in the Fire Brigade and would be responsible to Government, and any other matters could by agreement be administered by the Stanley Town Council.

Mr Trees pointed out that he could not at present commit Government but did promise his support for financial aid from say: £3000 to £5000, suggesting that Council call the Public meeting it had in view and then prepare a detailed report that he would put to the Legislative Council, for their consideration at a meeting to be held in November.

Mattters not fully discussed: The acquisition of a Self propelled Fire Fighting Unit - Purchase of Hose- Construction of Ramps-Repairs to Fire Engine Sheds -a natural Water deposit between the Met: & W/ Station.

The Acting Colonial Secretary visited all the Fire Stations on Thursday morning the 28th.August, together with the Chairman, Town Clerk, Superintendent and Maintenance Officer.

A Public meeting will be held in the T/Hall R/Room at 8 PM.Friday the 29th.August.





STANLEY FIRE BRIGADE



At Town Council's request a meeting was held in the Colonia Secretary's Office on Wednesday March 4th.1959-Present were: Honourable Colonial Secretary, Messrs R.L.Robson, Chairman Town Council, D.J. Clark, A.Livermore, A.R.Biggs & Town Clerk.

Meeting commenced 2PM.

Chairman. -explained to Honourable Colonial Secretary members wish to discuss present situation Stanley Fire Brigade informing him that Mr Clark would act as spokesman for the Town Council, in this respect.

D.J.C. Gave detailed exposition of present organization. The belief held by Council after a Public meeting held on 29th. August 1958, when Mr A.L. Hardy was appointed Superintendent and J.Booth as instructor, that the Fire Brigade was in capable hands, and everything would work out satisfactorily.

Unfortunately and contrary to what members thought, only two fire practices were held in the last six months, both of which were completely unsatisfactory, and it was felt by Council that an outbreak of fire could have serious consequences in view of the lack of organization of the Stanley Fire Brigade. Apart from this it was impossible to impose any strict ruling in the case of a voluntary force and many members may not be on call in the event of an emergency. Consequently Council suggested that a nucleus of the Fire Brigade should come under Government control.

H.C.S. Expressed his first reaction to this suggestion which in his view would be a destructive step, if Government should have to take back the Fire Brigade.

 $\underline{\text{D.J.C.}}$ Council are not anxious to hand back Brigade to Government but do wish to find a satisfactory solution.

H.C.S. Enquired as to Superintendent's attitude. Mr Livermore explained Superintendent had expressed that in his opinion the Brigade be handed to Government, he not wishing to serve Council unless a full time Maine tenance Officer was engaged.

• • • • • • • • • • • •

Purchase of Self contained Fire Unit considered.

D.J.C. In favour one Central Unit and one large Fire Engine (cost £6/8000)

H.C.S. In view of main Stanly labour force held by Government and the Falkland Islands Co.Ltd., suggested present 4(four) Units be absorded in to two.The Fire Brigade to be administered in two sectors, one controllled by Government and one under the Falkland Islands Co.Ltd., supervision. The Honourable Colonial Secretary favoured the purchase of a small Land-Rover type self contained fire engine. (£2200/2400)

H.C.S. Finally recommended Messrs Robson, Clark interview Manager Falkland Islands Co.Ltd, and see if agreeable to above. Another meeting would then be held to discuss this matter further.

H.C.S. Maybe at a later stage and after cosultations with the Finance Committee, the question of a Central Fire Station and the purchase of a large Self contained Fire Engine could be considered.

The meeting closed at 4.15 PM.

A meeting to continue considering matters relating to the mey Fire Brigade, was held in the Colonial Secretary's Office at 4.30PM Friday 6th. March 1959. Those present were: Honourable Colonial Secretary, Messrs.R.L.Robson, D.J. Clark, A. Livermore, A.R. Biggs and the Town Clerk.

The Chairman of the Town Council Mr R.L.Robson, informed the Honourable Colonial Secretary that both Mr Clark and himself had interviewed Mr A.G. Barton, Manager of the Falkland Islands Company Ltd., in respect of the proposed new set up of the Fire Brigade as indicated by the Honourable Colonial Secretary, and that Mr Barton had accepted to cooperate.

It was then agreed that the Falkland Islands Company take over and maintain two engines & equipment on the East Section of Stanley, and that Public Works Department would do likewise on the West Sector.

One engine in need of repairs was to be taken the following day to the Public Works Dpt.Garage, to be attended to.

The T/Clerk handed to the Hon: Colonial Secretary a list of members of the Stanley Fire Brigade indicating their respective living quarters. Hast & West of Dean Street.

H.C.S. Enquired if the present Superintendent would be prepared to continue as such in the proposed new organization, if not, he would like to propose the Chief Constable to act in this capacity.

It was decided to call a Committee meeting and obtain the Superintendent's views.

H.C.S. Considered Town Council should continue to finance Maintenance etc. This was agreed to.

The new organization would have two maintenance men, but otherwise generally is to remain the same.

Other points mentioned at these two meetings were condition of Fire Stations, hoses, ladders, eqipment in general etc,

The Hon. Colonial Secretary handed the T/Clerk for members perusal, illustrated pamphlet re:Fire Engines.

Meeting closed at 5.15 PM.

On Saturday 7th. March at 10.30 AM a Fire Brigade Committee meeting was held in the Town Council Office when the Superintendent was invited to attend and in the presence of Mr A.Livermore, Mr A.R. Biggs and the T/Clerk - Mr. Robson gave Mr A.L. Hardy an outline of the meetings held at the Colonial Secretary's Office and asked him if he would continue to act as Superintendent under the new composition of the Fire Brigade.

At the Superintendent's request and with the Hon. Colonial Secretary's permission, Messrs R.L. Robson, A.L. Hardy and A.Livermore, interviewed the Hon. Colonial Secretary in his Office at 11 AM the same morning.

The Town Clerk was later advised by the Chairman Mr R.L. Robson, that Mr.A.L. Hardy had accepted to continue acting in the capacity of Superintendent. A portable trailer pump would be put at the disposal of the Fire Brigade (ex-Nava Wireless Station) The Chairman also advised the T/Clerk that an agreement in writing is still to be reached between Government and the Falkland Islands Co.Ltd re: the Stanley Fire Brigade.

 - c) to operate under Government supervision.
- 5.- I respectfully submit the above as instructed, and will be grateful for a reply which will be presented to the Stanley Town Council as soon as possible, at an extraordinary meeting to be held for this purpose.

A meeting between the Covernment Standing Finance Committee and members of the Town Council was held at 4.30PM, on Tuesday 28th.April, 1959.

The Following were present: The Honourable the Colonial Secretary, Mr. A.G. Denton-Thompson, the Chairman of the Town Council Mr.R.L.Robson, Council members Messrs, J. Allan Deputy-Chairman, A.L.S. Biggs, J.D. Williams, A.R. Biggs, Dr.R.S. Slessor and Mr A.L. Livermore. Finance Committe members Messrs.M.G. Creece, Hon.L. Gleadell & Mr A.L. Hardy-Superintendent of the Stanley Fire Brigade.

The meeting was presided by the Hon: the Colonial Secretary, who invited all present to have an informal discussion on several matters relating to the Fire Brigade, making it clear at the outset that Covernment are not anxious to assume responsibility for the supervision of the Fire Brigade, and requested that the Superintendent put forward his main problems.

The Superintendent stated that the recent fire which took place at the Secretariat had the advantage of favourable winds and tides, and also the fact of the building's close proximity to the sea front, otherwise he thought that this building would not have been saved. In wishing to bring the Fire Service up to-date he recommended:

1) A permanent Caretaker

2) Hydrants to be lifted and cleared.

- 3) A Fire Box for each hydrant, and sufficient hose lengths to reach from box to box.

4) Stand-pipes and connectors for each hydrant.
5) Fire extinguishers and refills.
6) 2 Water Tanks (one in the vicinity of Hodson Villas and one between Meteorogical & Wireless Station.)

Finally he suggested that: a) The Engines had not been overauled after the recent fire., and, b) Council had no money to finance any of his recommendations.

Each point was then dealt with seperately:

Mr Livermore advised those present that as far as he knew there were no hydrants buried but if this was the case he would undertake to clear the hydrants to the level of the footpaths and have them painted white.

Mr Creece suggested that this work be done by a Caretaker, and felt there should be a permanent man for this job. Both the Hon: Colonial Secretary and the Chairman of the Town Council, agreed.

The Superintendent pointed out that all the existing hose should be renewed, the new hose to fitted with instantaneous couplings.

Dr. Slessor mentioned that 4 miles of hose would be required.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary recommended that action be taken in this respect and enquiries to be made as to costs of hose, atand-pipes etc.

The Superintendent suggested that all fire extinguishers should be uniform and after discussion it was agreed to order a light standard type.

The question of the suitability of having water tanks for fire protection was discussed and as it was agreed in principle that these were necessary it was finally decided that enquiries should be made for the tank which is at present being used for fuel storage at Albermarle.

It was agreed that any major repairs to engines should be serviced by a garage.

The Superintendent recommended a practice to be held monthly. At present he did not see how this could be done. There was nobody or anywhere to dry out hose.

Mr Livermore undertook to do this work provisionally and offered to erect a mast(within fifteen days) to dry out hose. The site agreed for the erection of the mast was the N.West corner of the Town Hall.

Maintenance Officer. Members of Council were not in favour of engaging a full time Maintenance Officer. It was felt that the work did not justify the services of a full time man.

The Superintendent maintained it did.

Mr A.L.S. Biggs & Dr.Slessor, suggested that the necessary work could be undertaken by the Public Works Department, and the job, paid for by Council.

It was finally agreed to obtain the services of a full time Maintenance Officer in view of the Honourable Colonial Sceretary's promise that Govt. would consider increasing their annual grant to Council for this purpose.

Mr Williams then asked the Hnourable Colonial Secretary if Government would consider taking over the Fire Brigade as this was one of the services which were handed to council w-ith no sources of revenue to finance it. Rates would have to be increased considerably. He also stated that the Fire Engine Sheds were in a very bad condition and in urgent need of repairs.

The Honourable Colonial Secretary did not favour Government taking over but offered to meet the capital cost of Fire Brigade requirements and asked the Town Clerk to give him the figures on recommendations agreed to at the meeting.

Mr Robson asked Mr Livermore to assist the Stanley Fire Brigade until a full time man is engage \mathfrak{g} .

The Superintendent offered his verbal resignation to the Chairman of the Town Council and asked the Colonial Secretary that Government consider the introduction of a sprinkler system for the new Secretariat building.

The meeting closed at 6.30pm.

Sir,

I am directed to refer to your letter TC/16-4 of the 30th April, on the subject of the Stanley Fire Brigade and to inform you that a minimum grant of £500 by Government to the Stanley Town Council to meet expenditure connected with the improvement of fire fighting facilities and equipment has been approved. I am, however, to say that in view of the budgetary position it is unlikely that a further capital grant will be forthcoming during the 1959/60 financial year.

In the Government's view, the grant of £500 should be spent on the following priorities:

- (a) new hose lengths and connections.
- (b) the repair of the hospital reservoir.

In addition to the above I am to advise you that Government is prepared to undertake responsibility for the following:

- (a) the maintenance and periodical overhaul of the fire fighting engines. No charge will be made for permanent establishment labour, but spares and replacements will be charged for.
- (b) the putting away of fire hoses after fire practices on the understanding that the fire fighting crews will themselves put the hoses out to dry. It may be necessary to make a charge for the labour involved but this should not amount to very much.

I beg to refer to your No.0594 of the 1st.June 1959.

- 1.- Your letter was read at our last general meeting which took place on the 10th, inst., and the members of Council are sincerely grateful to Government for their grant to the Fire Brigade of £500.-
- 2.- The above will be spent in the following manner:
 - £. 360.- Purchase Fire Hose

90.- " Fittings and connections

50 .- Repairs -Hospital Reservoir

3.- Council are committed to spend a sum above their estimates for this item, during the present year, and the undersigned will in due course submit in his estimates a considerable increase in expenditure for the upkeep etc. of the Fire Brigade during the next financial year, commencing January, 1960.

Your promise in respect of maintenance is already having practical results, not only in the care of engines, but also in other repairs etc. to deficiencies which were badly in need of attention. For this, please

accept our thanks.

4.- It is a sad fact that two essential services which for too long have been left in a state of deplorable abandonment, happen to be Council committeents.

If, with justice we do feel proud of services such as the Hospital, Water Filtration and Power & Electrical plant etc, it is all the more regrettable on the other hand, that both the Cemetery & Fire Brigade have been so shamefully neglected.

5.- I mention this (and in doing so I express the feelings of all members) because, Council will further need the help of Government on another item of expenditure, i.e. our Sanitation service, which represents 25% of our rates revenue, that is to say just under £800.

There exist at present 70 properties with no water closets. 30 of these are in Davis, Fitzroy & John Street. (bviously this constitutes an anomaly, and more so, if we consider that commercial firms such as the "Globe" Store "Falkland" Store, Penguin Shop "Kelper" Store and others,

"Globe" Store "Falkland"Store, Penguin Shop "Kelper" Store and others, Stanley House (garden) Government House (garden)-are still using this

service.

This matter has been discussed at Council meetings, and unfortunately shelved. The Town Clerk will press for the total elimination of this service. But, unless and until it is entirely dispensed with, it will continue to remain a superfluous financial burden to Council. The laying down of sewage pipes would have to be undertaken by Government, in one or two outlying streets. Measures could then be taken to compel property owners to install water closets, and, I therefore on behalf of Council, respectfully beg that Government do everything in its power to assist us eliminate this nuisance. Such a step will undoubtedly redound in favour of the community.

6.- Forgive me for- deviating from the subject of your letter, but these problems are financially interrelated, in as much as the elimination of this service would considerably benefit both the Fire Brigade & Cemetery.

I beg to refer to recommendations submitted at a meeting of the 28th.March 1959, between members of the Standing Finance Committee and the Stanley Town Council held under the Chairmanship of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary.

- 2. I also refer to your favour No.0594 dated 1st.June, 1959 in respect of financial assistance from Government, to meet expenditure connected with the improvement of fire fighting facilities and equipment.
- 3. In again thanking Government for their grant of £500, may I respectfully submit for your consideration, a further grant to be included in Government's Estimates for the financial year 1960/61.
- 4. Council's estimated expenditure for the current year ending 31st.December 1960, in respect of the Fire Brigade, will be approximately £1000, mostly for the purchase of new equipment. I may add that a considerable improvement will be noticeable by March 1960 when the larger part of the equipment purchased, is due to arrive.
- Although our financial situation has improved since March 1959, and we anticipate that this should better itself when the sanitation service is dispensed with, it does not necessarily follow that Council are in a position to meet immediate expenditure in order to allow the Fire Brigade a reasonable standardof efficiency without undue delay.
- 6. It is realised that it would be a criminal folly on the part of Council to postpone attention to the minimum possible requirements of the Fire Brigade. Our commitments as regards purchases for this service should be fulfilled in 1960.
- 7. I can assure you that this will be realised with Government's financial assistance, and on behalf of Council I earnestly beseech your support, and trust that no further requests will be necessary in future.
